

A BIT OF AUSTIN FAMILY HISTORY

The focus of this article is the verbatim copy of a notice of a lawsuit filed in Washington County, Missouri. The notice was published in the Missouri Republican in May 1827. It is interesting and informative in that it concerns the family and business associates of the Father of Texas, Stephen F. Austin, his father Moses, and others of the Austin and intermarried families.

Reference is made to a Bill in Chancery which lists several dates, as early as 20 years prior to the filing date of the lawsuit. Especially significant is the period of time and the setting of the principal acts alleged to have occurred.

Early Missouri, like the early history of any state, is difficult to research due to the sparsity of data. An experienced family history researcher has learned to accept data from whatever source may offer it. There is no more reliable source than the original records of the various counties' courts.

The question arises: Who was William H. Austin? Did he have a part in the establishment of Texas' "Old Three Hundred"? He seems to have been a cousin of Stephen F. Austin.

No, there is no family connection with this writer. As with the previously published article about Will Rogers, the data came to hand while searching for my Bacon ancestors in Missouri, quite by accident - and should be of interest to Texans.

It appearing to the Court, from an affidavit filed, that Stephen F. Austin and Moses B. Austin, heirs of Mary Austin, deceased, and William H. Austin, one of the heirs of Margaret Austin, deceased, are not residents of this state: Therefore, upon motion of John Brickey, solicitor for complainant, it is ordered, that a notice to said Stephen F. Austin, Moses B. Austin and William H. Austin be published in some newspaper printed within this state, for eight weeks successively, the last insertion to be at least four weeks before

the next term of this court, and which notice shall briefly set forth the objects of said bill, and require the said defendants to appear, on the first day of the next term of this court, and answer said bill, or the same will be taken for confessed.

To the aforesaid non-resident Defendants.

A Bill in Chancery, for the conveyance of the undivided half of a house and lot, in the town of Potosi; the said lot was purchased by the complainant and Zoper P. Evans, from Moses Austin, in the year of 1807, for the purpose of erecting a work shop, to carry on the business of cabinet work, house-joiner and carpenter business; that said Austin gave a bond to make a deed to the complainant, and said Evans; that in the year 1813 the complainant returned to the state of Kentucky, and left the bond for a deed with said Evans; that in the year 1814, said Evans obtained a deed to said lot, to be made to Nancy Evans, the wife of said Zoper P. Evans, and gave up the bond to said Austin; that said Evans and wife have since deceased, and you, with other heirs as named in said bill, are heirs of said Nancy Evans, deceased; that the said lot being thus fraudulently conveyed to an improper person, the bill prays relief in the premises, and that you, and each of you, make answer thereto, as required by the above order.

Some Tips on Publishing One's Own Book Reprinted by
"Popular Request"

It may seem the height of egotism for your editor to print her own talk in the Quarterly, but many [according to a recent article, "many" means four or more] of the audience insisted that those who were unable to attend the meeting would like to read it. And the argument was advanced that it would be helpful to readers who might need practical advice on this subject far in the future.

The fact that I had postponed research for the long article of this issue because of time spent preparing for this talk to the Society was also a strong incentive to accede to the flattering request. Therefore, after politely demurring for a considerable length of time [say ten seconds], I agreed. So here it is, with such asides as I remember and such additions as now appear to be needed:

THE GESTATION AND BIRTH OF A BOOK

Greetings, fellow sufferers of genieallergy! The reason for the biological title of my talk this muggy evening will be apparent presently. My book is entitled BROWN, WILLIAM AND MARGARET (PEGGY FLEMING), DESCENDANTS OF. You needn't try to politely hide your snickers--my daughters were aghast when they heard it, too--even the librarian who I thought would be delighted. But there's a method in my madness which I'll explain later.

My book could be compared to an elephant in many ways. First, an elephant is BIG; my book is 8½ by 11 inches, two volumes, almost a thousand pages, and very heavy when I'm standing in line at the post office, holding several sets.

Second, an elephant is famed for its memory. This book is mainly composed of memories, either human or the official-record type. But I personally cannot vouch for the complete accuracy of the memory of either Homo sapiens or Elephas maximus.

Then of course an elephant is expensive. You've all heard about the King of Siam who wanted to ruin a man so he gave him a royal elephant. The recipient of course could not get rid of a gift from his ruler, so he went bankrupt trying to feed it. Although there are many expenses involved in compiling, printing and marketing a book, mine was not that expensive [How much is that?], for it is not of royal breeding with jewel-encrusted trappings (such as linotype setting and hard binding)--mine is more of a runt-of-the-litter, wild type of animal.

Now an elephant looks clumsy, but actually is very precise in its movements and can perform many tasks skillfully. The title of this book may seem awkward, but it will jump out at you in a card catalog or bibliography, and precisely reveal its subject matter. It will show up in both Title and Subject card files, and reveal which Brown of umpteen million was the immigrant ancestor.

Over the years, by word of mouth I learned that there were pertinent Brown data in books with such flowery titles as Threads of Ancestors, Southern-Born and Bred, My Great Grandfather, Make Way for the Great, The Winning of the West, etc.--titles that would never reveal their contents to anyone looking for Browns in a card catalog or its computerized equivalent.

Time was when I'd rather be boiled in oil than end a sentence with a preposition, but I sacrificed that old-fogey prejudice and risked ridicule to give my book a title that will save time for researchers. Perhaps I should have made it "Some Descendants of" but the lines would not have centered as well on the title page if I had. And I feel sure everyone will understand that I do not claim to have identified all the descendants of the immigrant couple.

No doubt we all have winced our way through 19th-Century genealogies that glorified the subjects out of all recognition--sometimes the "great plantation" referred to in the book is described in the tax records as 40 acres and a mule. I determined to write a no-nonsense book, cutting colonels down to corporals if the records so revealed. What our pioneer ancestors endured and achieved deserves due respect per se--no need to put a plume in the hat that was wet with honest sweat. Neither does an elephant have to be beautiful to be appreciated.

The tail of an elephant is insignificant compared to the body, but in some respects the supplement to my Brown book is more important than the main body. It contains verbatim land grants, entire wills, letters to governors and presidents, a very revealing inventory of the household goods of a family on the move which were seized by Indians, &c, &c, &c.

An elephant is preceded by a massive and unique trumpet; my book made its entrance with very little fanfare. On the 21st of February I mailed about 120 flyers, and by the 1st of March (when the books were delivered) I had orders for 10 books.

Last comparison [I don't want you all to dream you're being trampled by a herd of elephants tonight]: An elephant has a gestation period of 21 or 22 months; this book was 22 years in the making.

It all started out as an attempt to reconcile conflicting printed accounts of a tragic event that occurred on the ninth day of May 1788 on the Tennessee River. Indians seized the boat on which one James Brown was taking his family from North Carolina to "the Cumberland" (the area around present-day Nashville TN). They killed most of the adults and took the rest into captivity--a gory story that made its way into most of the early Tennessee histories. In the transition from one writer to another, the tale became so garbled and confusing that I wanted to set the record straight, to find out which details were true.

But I soon found that I just had to know more about the cast of characters, the whole family, not just the historical facts. My curiosity was piqued by the letters from Col. Joseph Brown [I have a copy of his commission, signed by Gov. Willie (pronounced Wylie) Blount] to Gov. Joseph Emerson Brown of Georgia; by three versions of the "autobiography" of the former; by the innumerable writings of descendants of the latter; and many personal letters.

A sixth cousin in Tennessee began giving me such valuable assistance that in gratitude I abandoned my original plan of tracing only my direct line and went all the way back to our mutual ancestor, William (1) Brown, in order to show her line also. I numbered him (1) because he was the first of our line in America. He and his wife had seven children, giving me seven strands to weave into the tapestry. Thanks to many generous souls, I was able to trace most of them down to the present, but the thread became very thin and frayed in spots. If I may shift from weaving to knitting, I'll admit that there are some dropped stitches (and that's the very descriptive title of a genealogy I saw once).

The pattern of numbering I chose to follow is this: No. 1 is William who with wife (née Margaret "Peggy" Fleming) in 1745 emigrated from Londonderry, Ireland to Pennsylvania and had these 7 children: Frances/Fanny (No. 2) who married George Hamilton; David (3) m. Isabella McClintock; Joseph (4) m. Mary Porter; William (5) m. Mary Dorchester; James (6) m. Jane Gillespie; Elizabeth (7) m. John Duffield; and Jean/Jane (8) m. Rees Porter. All had descendants except Elizabeth.

First I wrote all I could find about William and Peggy, including a delightful family tradition and the situation in Ireland that led to their emigration. Next I wrote sketches of each of the seven children, closing each sketch with a list of their children and respective spouses. Then come sketches of the third generation (the Hamilton children), the first of whom is numbered 9 (the patriarch (1), his seven children (2 through 8), his first grandchild (9). Since I could not find exact birthdate for every person, I cannot say if Number 9 was the firstborn grandchild of William and Margaret, but he was the first child of their first child, as far as I could learn. After all the children of No. 2 come all the children of No. 3 (David), and so on.

There may be justifiable criticism of the lack of uniformity in these sketches, but I had to make do with whatever came to hand, be it three pages or three lines. Sketches of some descendants are solidly based on court records, census reports, family Bible records, or the personal knowledge of his own descendants, but some are little more than flimsy tradition and speculation. I hope I have made it clear which assertions are derived from records, which ones I have my doubts about [prefaced by "According to so and so, he ..." or "According to a direct descendant, she..."], and which ones are conclusions arrived at by careful, loving study of the few clues available to me.

You know how you find genealogical data in books--often three or more generations in the same paragraph, and children of several brothers traced down to the present like a tangled skein of yarn. Well, I decided to cover all of one generation of cousins before going on to the next generation, which turned out to be Not the most efficient way to write the book. It would take me quite a while to get oriented back into the Hamiltons, say, after I'd dealt with four sets of Brown siblings and eight Porter brothers in the preceding generation. But I still prefer reading all of one generation's actions in succession--all the contemporary cousins--ra-

ther than following one man down to the present and then jumping back to the 18th Century for his brother's line. In some books I get lost in the successive indentions and have to turn way back to see what generation a name is in.

Maybe if I had followed each of the original seven siblings who settled in America down to the present, one at a time, typed it all up, and then broken it into generations by the handy cut-and-paste method, it would have been easier to write.

At any rate, my course was dictated by one factor: my cousin in Tennessee had offered to make the index if I would send her Xerox copies of finished pages as I went along. That would avoid the long interval that would be required to make the index after I finished the writing, and sounded like a GREAT idea! [Ha! Little did I dream how involved it would become.]

I had already decided I could not afford to have the book set by linotype (or the modern equivalent for hot type) and hardbound, so why not make camera-ready copy and paginate it as I went along? That's the way we've been doing our Quarterly for some years now.

A real "printer's type" book would have cost 9 or 10 thousand dollars, I figured, and I had no earthly idea of how many copies I could sell. I might be left with a mountain of \$100-books and not a penny to purchase a coffin. Of course, it would be very appropriate to erect a cairn of books over my bones. But anyway, I didn't want to price the book beyond the reach of most of the dear people I've corresponded with over the past 20-odd years. I reached the conclusion that it is more important to make the information available than to have a gilt-edged "parlor-table" book. And available NOW. We never can complete our research; if we put off publishing until we find one more land grant, one more gravestone, one more record that "just must be somewhere," we'll go to our own graves leaving a mess of notes that no one else can decipher and therefore our life's work will go up in smoke.

So I found a young lady who would do the final typing for me-- a lovely girl, but her social dates took precedence over the dates she promised me she would finish a batch. I would take her 10 pages, go home and type 10 more, then try to get back the first 10. Then came the proofreading, pasting on corrections, often rewording three lines into the space of two where she had skipped a line.

Next, I would Xerox the corrected pages for Cousin Alice (trying to send her the corresponding Notes also), mail them, and get on with the writing. In a week or so, Alice would send me additions and corrections to the material she had given me in the first place-- when she saw it in type it looked a little fishy so she did further research, sometimes finding another sibling in the process. Any absolutely essential additions and corrections had to be fitted into the space of the lines they replaced--a delicate and time-consuming task. I often had to go back to files joyfully marked "Completed."

But the worst of it was that I had already numbered children past the place where that newly-discovered child should have been, so I had to improvise: if his father was No. 309 and already had four children, this Johnny-come-lately had to be 309v (the small Roman numerals showed sequence of siblings), while his siblings had

nice Arabic numbers such as 765, 766 and so on.

It got a little hectic--more than somewhat, I should say: I was writing on one family group, proofreading on another back from the typist, and trying to work in new data from Alice into a third household. So my red-letter advice is: Don't start the final typing until you have completed your manuscript either by hand or a rough typescript, if you have a collaborator, proofreader or indexer who may suggest changes. Send him or her batches of first- or second-draft pages frequently as you write so you won't have so much to do over if they insert new copy. Then send that indexer copies of the finished, final-draft pages to work with--20¢ per page (Xeroxing twice) "ain't a circumstance" to \$1.50 for retyping a page.

I had bad luck with my typists: one got married and left town, one decided it was too difficult and time-consuming for the agreed-on price, and the third could no longer spare the time because the care of a sick relative fell upon her. (So you see it was not because I was too critical of their work as many may suspect! But I admit old proofreading habits die hard.) I finally decided it would take no longer for me to finish in my hunt-and-peck fashion than to agonize over corrections, and I was right. [Having had a pencil in my hand throughout my business life, I could barely type, but because it meant so much to me I soon became instantly aware (most of the time) when I struck a wrong key and was able to correct errors as I went along.] As a result, unfortunately, four or five typewriters were used over the three years that the book was being prepared for publication; the lack of uniformity in typeface and spacing disturbs my sensibilities as a former proofreader--but not enough to do it all over! I find I'm not such a perfectionist since I have passed my three-score-and-ten milestone. [Incidentally, in case you're interested, I paid out over \$900 to typists for about two-thirds of the book.]

To sum it up, having the indexing done simultaneously certainly worked out well time-wise: while Alice was indexing the last batch I was re-re-revising the Foreword and the advertising letter, typing the Bibliography, and tying up loose ends, such as arranging photographs and checking files to see if I had omitted anything.

I'm very sorry I couldn't have more pictures, but it cost \$50 a page to reduce the ones I wanted to use. One or two people had asked to have some of their ancestors' portraits in the book, but the cost and time factors prohibited it. I felt that I'd have to write 25 or 30 correspondents to see if they wanted theirs in--I couldn't do it for one without many others. That should have been attended to when I first corresponded with people who sent data for the book. I couldn't face delay that near the end.

Speaking of the Foreword reminds me of a delicate question that each author will have to decide for himself: Should you name your typists in your acknowledgments? I didn't because I felt that they had been adequately compensated, whereas all other assistance had been given free. But one of my typists asked to read my "Forward"--which most of you know was like waving a red flag in my face. That misspelling and mispronunciation make me think of Teddy Roosevelt charging up San Juan Hill, sword aloft, yelling "Forward!"

But to return from my crusade--I got the feeling that this typist was disappointed not to see her name mentioned, and I'm sorry--actually, she is the only one of the three that I considered mentioning, for her work was much better than the others'. Once I was the paid ghost-writer of a genealogy--arranged and wrote every word from a cuckoo's nest of scribbled-on scraps of paper--and got no more thanks than those who had submitted a couple of pages of data.

The first volume of Brown, Wm etc. has what they call "perfect" binding --the cover glued on. I was a little apprehensive that it would come apart, as thick as the book is, but my "demonstrator model" is still firm. The second volume has the same cover stock but is spiral-bound so it can lie flat beside the reader and thus give instant access to the next note as you read along, so you don't have to fumble through the book looking for the end of the chapter or of the book.

The first 33 pages of Volume II are unnumbered and make up the Numerical Guide to Descendants, divided into generations. Each Brown descendant and spouse who had children may be found centered over their children with their respective numbers and spouse(s). So when the Text mentions James (31) Brown, you can find him as a child under his parents (by looking for 31 in the left margin; in this case, 31 is in the block of names following the number 28 in the margin), and you can find him as a parent centered over his children and their spouses, in this Guide.

I'm a bit proud of my numbering system and hope anyone who likes it will feel free to copy it. "Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery," they say. As far as I know, I invented it. I have no conscious memory of seeing just this form before. If this be plagiarism, 'twas unwittingly committed! It has some of the features of the New England Historical and Genealogical Register system, but that employs italics for some names and small caps for others (which are not available to those of us who are limited to the typewriter keyboard), and does not assign an Arabic number unless there is enough data to carry that person forward.

My system does not take up the space of the format "David, son of Joseph, son of James, son of William," and does not require the double spacing of lines in order to type superior figures that denote generations, such as "David⁴, Joseph³, James², William¹,"--not to mention the trouble of adjusting the type writer each time to make such superior numerals. True, an arbitrary (even though sequential) number does not show a man's generation, but that can be ascertained from his father's sketch as well as his own, and in this Numerical Guide.

Of course, there are all sorts of numbering schemes to show which child of which generation a person was: IAlai(1), for example. My own number in a book I have is 24111.11121131 (I don't think even Sing-Sing hangs such a long number on its inmates!). That number looks very precise, but the compiler explained that the numbers do not necessarily show the sequence of a given sibling, but that 1 was the one he chose to sketch first because he had the most information about him! I happen to be the oldest of my siblings and the one he knew most about, so it worked out correctly in my case.

On the first numbered page of Volume II the Notes start, giving generation and Arabic numeral of the subject of that sketch. The notes are not numbered continuously throughout the book, but start over with 1 in each person's sketch in the Text. In the Index, these pages are referred to as N1, N2, N3 etc., meaning page 1 of the Notes section, not Note 1. I'd hate to have to count how many notes there are in all. The Notes run through page 119, followed by the "Contents of the Appendices" with page numbers. About 80 pages of appendices are divided under the headings Letters, Family Connections, Land Papers, Indians, and Miscellany--the great catch-all of miscellaneous documents. These pages are indexed N120, N121, etc.

I suspect that I'm telling you far more than you wanted to know about how I arranged my book, but I do so on the premise that some of you will find something helpful as you write your own family histories. Am I boring you too much? I can cut it short.....OK.

The Bibliography takes about six pages. I had made a card of each book I had found helpful, first by title, but discovered that there were several called "Tennessee, History of" or such confusing titles, and some with such long names that it was wasteful to refer to them in the Text. So I settled on the name of the author for reference in the Text and alphabetized that way.

You all know how I feel about wasting space--it sickens me to think of the time wasted when I see an index in which the surname was typed for each person. I put the surname in capitals, then the given names following it in a block of type. Since I included each Brown descendant's assigned number and his wife (with her maiden name), it does look rather formidable, I grant you, until you figure out the scheme. Even conserving all the space I could, it ran to 85 pages, so I had them reduced and placed sideways, two to a page.

Most of us turn first to the index of a book and look for the name of an ancestor. If you get bewildered by the arrangement, well, we have a joke in our family that goes "If all else fails, read the instructions." The first page of my Index is entitled "Essential Explanation." The brackets, parentheses, dots and dashes have a definite purpose. Maiden names are cross-referenced to their husbands' names. Sorry I couldn't index place names.

The Index is rather colorful, I might remark. Besides Brown, we have Black, Gray, Green, Rose and White. Then there's Pinck(ney), Red(mond), Tan(ner), and a touch of Rouge(ley).

After I had obtained a rough estimate of cost from Ginny's Copying Service I selected a lovely rich brown leather-looking cover stock, then wrote my announcement letter, rashly naming the cover material. It turned out to be too stiff for the perfect binding, and similar ones proved unsuitable for gold-stamping--it flaked off. Ginny's representative, Leo Boatright, who was most accommodating throughout our dealings, gave me all the samples they had experimented on, so I cut them up into bookmarks. I inserted one at the proper place for each descendant who ordered a book, and autographed the title page with his or her name and number. So it won't sound as if I'm giving the book, I put "Best wishes to ... from ...".

Getting back to the mail-out: I hand-corrected the description of the cover stock on the flyers, upping the mailing cost af-

ter I discovered how much post-office-approved brown tape and mailing envelopes and wrapping paper cost. I experimented with their envelopes, but they would hold only one volume (the next size left space for them to slide around in), so I had to fasten two together. I couldn't risk one volume's getting lost in the mail, because I'd have to ruin one set to replace a lost volume. And besides, all the postal stations in town seem to run out of the size I wanted at the same time. Then Leo found some boxes that will do, if I stuff things around Volume I and stretch a box open a little for Volume II. I write the address on one box in case the paper should get torn off, strap the two boxes together with filament tape, and wrap them with brown paper. [You know what stores charge for that recycled brown paper now? I decided grocery sacks are just as good, and solicit the large, heavy ones from my friends.] After sealing with lots of tape, I write the address on the package and cover it with transparent tape so it won't get washed off in a rain shower just short of the recipient's door. It takes me about 20 minutes per package--believe me, I'd rather write 'em than wrap 'em. Then comes the post office ordeal. But since learning exactly how much postage is required for one set, I can apply that in the lobby and dump 'em in the bin.

Oh, I forgot to tell you something about the flyers--I made an alphabetical list of my 20-year accumulation of Brown correspondents (plus collateral names). Then I spent several hours on the mezzanine of Austin's Central Library looking them up in present-day telephone directories to update the addresses. Fortunately a ZIP Code directory is kept near the phone books. Of course, I was out of luck for small towns out of state. About 10% of my flyers have been returned.

Recently I received a notice about a book on which the collateral names were not alphabetized. Who has time to read two inches of names all hodge-podged together? It's no trouble to go down an index and list in order each surname that has listings over an inch deep, say. [I must admit I fudged on a few, such as Polk. I must have a touch of the "inordinate pride of family" that was said to afflict my great-great-grandmother, Jane Frances McNeal. I found a journal in Barker Archives in which a visitor from Tennessee described her as haughty and "stuck-up." But I can't really blame her--how many women in log cabins in Bastrop County could claim kin to the man in the White House? He was her mother's first cousin.]

On the outside of my mailing piece I put a sample of the crabbed handwriting of my 3-great-grandfather, to distinguish it from the usual junk mail we receive. Almost any kind of eye-catcher would serve the same purpose--a picture of the old home place would be excellent, or anything widely identified with your particular family. But not, I beg you, a coat of arms that was granted to some unknown person who bore the same surname as your family.

I kept the alphabetical list of names and addresses I had sent flyers to, with columns headed respectively No. of Copies Ordered, Amount Paid, and When Sent. Thus I have a complete record of receipts for the Comptroller's Office as well as Internal Revenue.

In order not to pay sales tax twice on the books, on the advice of Ginny's representative, I obtained a number, a "Texas Sales and Use Tax Permit" from the Office of the Comptroller, and thus Ginny did not have to collect sales tax from me. That obligates me to

pay 5% tax on every copy, including gifts and out-of-state sales. It doesn't seem fair to make out-of-staters pay a tax that benefits only Texans, so I quote them a lower price. As for gifts, I'm giving copies to the state libraries of NC, TN, GA & TX when I receive the Second Edition soon.

The packing and mailing are such a time-consuming chore that I encourage local people to pick up their copies and save \$3.50 each. That's high, I know, but as the conceited girl in the TV ad says, "I'm worth it!"--my time, that is. You should see the packing materials junked around my work table: a lifetime accumulation of cotton out of vitamin bottles, foil from gift potplants, styrofoam and plastic scraps, newspapers, the cardboard roll from the center of gift-wrap paper and so on. (I considered using the shorter roll of which there is an endless supply, but decided it was just a bit inelegant to wedge in beside a book with gold lettering on the cover.)

I had my book copyrighted (at the cost of \$10 plus two copies), not because I wanted to discourage Xeroxing (on the contrary, I'm flattered if anyone deems it worth copying), but because I don't want someone besides my heirs to profiteer on it in the future, if it should be considered worth reprinting. Some of our own members have had that sad experience.

This seems to be the right time to discuss the subject of revising one's book. A correspondent wrote me that she sent some additional data to the author of a recent genealogy and received the reply that he never wanted to hear the name Faulkner again! If you are not that fed up with your subject you can invite input from the readers in your Introduction, Preface, Foreword or whatever. I did not actually invite it, but I did include my address, and so far [knock on wood] I have not received any angry corrections. A few people have sent me updates: births, deaths, marriages and divorces that have occurred since their original material was sent to me. One lady suggested that I wait until November for a 2nd printing so I could include her grandchild's name, but since I was down to five books I was unable to grant her request.

But there is an interesting story of an 1863 attack by Indians in Parker Co, TX (in which Mrs. Franklin Brown and two children were killed) that I did want to add. I found a place close to Franklin Brown's sketch where one account ended on page 336 and the next started on 337 [Wouldn't want to insert addenda in the middle of a sketch] and added pages numbered 336a, 336b and so on. And after two days of intensive sorting out of the new material sent by two ladies in Georgia, I inserted 476a, b & c, adding the notation "See page 476b" in pertinent places in the Text. Turning to the Index in Volume II, I typed below the "Essential Explanation" a warning, "See addenda at end of Index."

Then I decided to have only 50 of the 2nd Edition printed so I can accommodate others who may want their grandchildren added, if there is further demand for the book. But since Volume I is so fat, I'll put any further insertions after the Bibliography in Volume II and add "Addenda to the 3rd Edition" at the end of the Index.

This offer cannot stand indefinitely. Those who want to add material badly enough to get it to me this summer are the most likely

to be accommodated. It depends, of course, on whether there continues to be a demand for this "Brown book with the crazy, mixed-up name."

It may be unorthodox and it may be messy, but I'll find a way to add material that might improve the book.

Speaking of messy--I'm a little distressed by the way the pages protrude beyond the cover in the spiral-bound volume. We're trying to remedy that in the 2nd Edition. I failed to examine each copy when they were delivered, and later discovered one with the cover put on backwards and another torn. But one was extra (not of much value in a two-volume set!) and the other I may sell at a discount or use as a rental copy. If only I could find a cousin who is accustomed to read Hebrew-style, back to front!

What I want to emphasize is that I have been pleased with the prompt service and courteous attention I have received from Ginny's Copying Service. They furnished a proof set so I could check to see that all pages were in order, and they delivered the first edition in less time than they had promised. For the smaller order they were not as speedy, nor did they always call back when promised, but who does, nowadays? And they were untiring in their efforts to advise me of all the options of paper, types of binding, and so on.

No doubt I've told you more than enough about the ordeals of an amateur book publisher, but I can't tell you enough of the joy and pride of finally getting one's book produced.

QUESTIONS ASKED:

Q: Where in Texas did your Browns settle?

A: Before 1900 they were in the counties of Harris (near the San Jacinto Battleground), Bastrop, Hays, San Saba, Caldwell, Gonzales, Edwards, Tarrant, Collin, Palo Pinto, Parker, Delta, Brazoria and Matagorda. These included the married names Harwood, Fentress, Rogan, Lane, Collinsworth, Pickard, et al. Brown County, Texas, was named for Henry Stevenson Brown, son of Caleb--Not descendants of our William (1) Brown, as far as I know.

Q: What was the cost of your book?

A: I hesitate to mention cost because it may fluctuate widely, depending on current costs of materials, quality of cover, type of binding, number of photographs, and number printed. Pressed for a "ballpark figure," I'd say about \$2400 for actual production cost, plus \$900 for typing, plus 5% sales tax. That comes to \$3450 for 100, and I priced them at \$31.50 plus packing and mailing. The second and subsequent printings should cost less per unit, spreading the typing cost out. The cost of mailing flyers (40¢ each) must be counted, too.

Q: How much time did it take?


A: Nearly three years composing and typing time; over 20 years accumulating material; two weeks photo-reproduction time.

Q: How did you know how to put your material together?

A: In 25 years of proofreading at a good publishing firm, I ob-

served the way books should be arranged. Then, as a ghostwriter, I nursed a very expensive book through the intricacies of layout, conferring with an expert on that subject. You can learn all you need from books available in a public library or college library--such matters as the order of items in the "front matter" and how to number those pages; differences between the Table of Contents and the Index, between Preface, Foreword, Introduction, Acknowledgments, and Dedication, and on and on. Books I recommend are Words into Type by Skillin, Gay et al. (New York: Appleton-Century-Crofts, Inc. c 1948) and the University of Chicago Style Manual, but I'm sure there are many fine new ones as well.

One last word of advice: Be neither stingy nor extravagant with margins. If you type specifically for right-hand (odd-numbered) and left-hand pages, leaving extra margin at the binding edge, you may leave less margin at the outer edge. But if, like me, you don't want the bother of resetting margin stops for each page, make it no less than three-fourths of an inch on each side. (Some of my typists failed to do this, and I really regret it.) That's for the so-called perfect binding; if you intend to have your book hardbound, with stitched pages, you'd better get professional advice before you start typing.

Book Reviews

MEMORIAL AND GENEALOGICAL RECORD OF TEXAS (EAST): CONTAINING BIOGRAPHICAL HISTORIES AND GENEALOGICAL RECORDS OF MANY LEADING MEN AND PROMINENT FAMILIES. Illustrated. Chicago: Goodspeed Brothers, 1895. Reprint by Southern Historical Press, P.O. Box 738, Easley, South Carolina 29640. \$40.00

This reprint by Southern Historical Press of an early Texas book is poorly done. Typographical errors abound within the volume. Lorenzo de Zavala's name is spelled Lorenzo de Gavala in the text and in the separately bound index. Another example of an error in the book is the title of the article on Dr. A.D. Strond. A correction of the name is handwritten in the book by placing a "u" above the "n". The name is spelled Strond throughout the article; however, in the index it is spelled Stroud. Another error noticed is the referral to a man fighting in the War of 1815. Presumably they meant the War of 1812. Many such careless lapses occur in the book. Reprints of old books are most welcome, but care should be taken in reproducing the information accurately so that handwritten corrections need not be made.

It is stated that new material included in the volume was by the Rev'd Silas Emmett Lucas, Jr.; however, there is no way of knowing what he added, except the separate index. It is this reviewer's opinion that the index should have been bound with the book.

As in many of the books published originally by Goodspeed, the language used is flowery and the biographical information is not documented. If you are fortunate enough to find your ancestor in this book, it will give you clues that may lead you to other data.

THE STROUDS; A COLONIAL FAMILY OF ENGLISH DESCENT by A.B. Stroud. Danielsville, Georgia: Heritage Papers, ca 1982

The Stroud family history is traced from the founder of the family in colonial America, Barnett, through his children and their descendants. Emphasis is placed on the descendants of John Stroud and his son, Mark. Members of this line of the family (which began in Amwell Township, Hunterdon County, New Jersey) migrated to Pennsylvania, thence to North Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida & Texas.

Part One of this volume explores the origin of the family name and its early history in England and in this country. The second part of the book is about Mark Stroud and his descendants. Part Three is about the brothers and sisters of John Stroud and their descendants. Many of these lines of the family stayed in the North or moved westward.

The index to the book was made by Mary Bondurant Warren. Some of the collateral names in the index are Cone, Fall, Graddick, Green, Haygood, Hitch, Long, Middlebrooks, Strode and Williams. It would

BROWN, WILLIAM AND MARGARET (PEGGY FLEMING), DESCENDANTS OF by Helen (Hoskins) Rugeley, 2202 West 10th St., Austin TX 78703, 1983. 2 volumes: x + 512 pages of text in first volume & 286 pages in Volume II, the supplement.

The author has critiqued her own work in the foreword. We agree with her when she says that the title is awkward. We understand her concern to make the subject of her book easy to catalogue. But we think the title might be written "Descendants of William and Margaret (Fleming) Brown," making the subject quite clear. The pet name "Peggy" would appear in the text.

The research is impressive and thorough. The author has used a unique method of handling footnotes in that they are placed in the supplemental volume. This supplement is spiral-bound so it can lie open to provide instant access to the notes or to the Numerical Guide to Descendants as you read along. The appendix, the bibliography, and the full-name index complete this second volume. Smaller type is used in the index which may cause a problem for some readers, but this is partly overcome by capitalizing the surnames. The Numerical Guide to Descendants which the author devised to keep track of the more than 2,022 individuals is original and workable, as other numbering systems perhaps would not have been. In an effort to test the numbering system, the name "Harwood Stacy" was chosen. There was no problem in locating Harwood, both "forward and backward", that is, as a person in his own right and as a son of his parents. Unique!

The text follows William and Margaret (Fleming) Brown from Ireland to their permanent home in Guilford County, North Carolina, and their descendants on to Gonzales, Texas, via Tennessee. The time period covered is from approximately 1700, through their coming to the Colonies about 1745, to the present.

The binding of these two volumes is chestnut brown, Volume I being "perfect bound" and Volume II being spiral-bound. The size of each is 8½ x 11 inches. The process used is photo-reproduction of typed pages. There are a few illustrations. The cost of both volumes is \$30 plus \$3.50 for postage and packaging. Texas residents must add \$1.50 for the 5% sales tax.

Postscript by author [Not many get a chance at rebuttal!] I am amused that their distaste for the title seems to have blinded my friends to what I consider far worse faults of my book! The pages of Volume II protrude beyond the cover in an unsightly manner; there is inconsistency of typeface (different typewriters) and spacing, leaving some blank half-pages and others with material inserted on them that should have been in another part of the book. Some of the individuals (discovered after their fathers' sketches had been completed) lack an Arabic numeral, and so on. Some of these deficiencies are explained in the article starting on page 33 herein.

I thank Mrs. Gracy and Mrs. Gentry for their complimentary review, and our other guest reviewer, Miss Baker, for her effort in writing three reviews for this issue.

THE LANPHERE FAMILY Research Aid, 1981, Revised Edition, compiled by Shirley (McElroy) Bucknum. Printed by The Genealogical Forum of Portland, Oregon, 1981. 8½ x 11; 70 pp.; photocopied; \$8. Order from compiler at 8217 N. Foss Ave., Portland OR 97203

This revision of Lanphere Family Research Aid published in 1979 has an interesting format. Starting with FAMILY-1-George, born 1631, it gives his vital statistics followed by his numerically numbered children. When more than the "bare bones" was known about one of those siblings, the entry reads "4. Seth, Family-3-"; and his vitals and children are set forth in the appropriate place, quite easily found.

Access to the original book is essential, as bibliographical citations refer to it. A few abbreviations are explained in the Introduction to this volume. There is a Surname Index and one devoted to the given names of Lanpheres.

Places where research has been fruitful include Hopkinton MA, New London CT, Norwich CT, Stonington CT, Westerly RI? or NJ? (one in each state, according to Postal Guide. The states are not named in the main section of this volume.) Under "Miscellaneous Locations" we find Becket, Amherst, Boston, Lynn and Hubbardston MA; Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Quebec, Vermont, and New York.

The typing is not as clear as might be, but practically error-free. The compiler warns that data were submitted by different cousins and probably should be double-checked. Mrs. Bucknum elected not to give the different spellings of Lanphere which were found, but some readers may wish she had allowed them to pass judgment on the variants themselves.

She certainly was generous in foregoing a copyright in order that readers may freely copy from the book, and diligent in putting together a great amount of research material. This book is a MUST for all who have access to the original volume.

MARRIAGE RECORDS OF SHELBY COUNTY, OHIO, Volume 1, 1819-1870, compiled by Barbara Adams and Gene Mozley. Baltimore: Gateway Press Inc., c 1981. 6 x 9"; 205 pp.; hardback; price not given. Address Gene Mozley, 327 Bon Air Drive, Sidney OH 45365

This handsome little volume is "a compilation of marriages recorded in Marriage Record Books 1 & 2 (combined), 3, 4 and 5 Located in the Probate Court Office, Shelby County Court House, Sidney Ohio." These official records start in 1824, five years after the county was established.

However, on 10 Aug 1883 The Shelby County Democrat published information on licenses issued 1819-24, and that has been incorporated into this book. Unfortunately the newspaper article did not include the dates on which the marriages were performed, or officiants.

All available dates and remarks (parents' consents, prior marriages, etc.) are given verbatim, as are spellings of names. Copies of licenses may be obtained from Clerk of the Probate Court.

Compilers Adams and Mozley have included a photograph of the

1881 Courthouse [sic], a page of Abbreviations [VDM is misprinted Verdi instead of Verbi Dei Minister], over 25 pages of Index of Brides [full names], and a dozen pages identifying the officiants by Name, JP, Elder, Pastor, Minister of the Gospel or Priest, and Name of Church.

The main section is printed on the long side of the page in columns headed Groom, Bride [both surnames in all caps], Date Married, Married by, and Book - Page. Notations are in parentheses below the respective listings. Few alphabetizing errors were spotted.

The typing is excellent, and the interpretation of hand-written names appears to be also. Variant spellings are included.

A note states that publication of Volume II, 1871-1899, is expected in 1983, and address changes should be sent to the authors if you wish to be notified. This book should be a great boon to all Shelby County (Ohio) searchers.

MEMORIAL RECORDS OF SHELBY COUNTY, OHIO, 1819-1975, compiled by Barbara Adams and Gene Mozley; c 1977. Baltimore: Gateway Press, Inc. Full-name index; 8½ x 11; viii + double-page map + 668 pp.

This monumental volume of burial records was compiled by some members of Lewis Boyer Chapter of D.A.R. and organized by the compilers named above. In addition to gravestone data, information was gleaned from cemetery custodians' records, church, mortuary and personal records. German and French inscriptions are translated.

The Table of Contents lists alphabetically the names of cemeteries, the townships they are in, and page numbers in Memorial Records. The county map is marked off in Sections, the townships numbered and named, and the numbered highways are indicated, as well as such landmarks as lakes, rivers and creeks, towns and villages, railroads, airports, schools, children's home, Greenville Treaty.

The largest cemetery, Graceland, is listed first, with its location and brief history. Names are not in alphabetical sequence-- I could not figure what scheme of listing was used. In tabular form the data given is: Name of Deceased, Place of Birth, Date of Birth, Late Residence, Date of Death, Age, Lot & Section, and miscellaneous remarks.

Several different formats are used for subsequent cemeteries, some being alphabetized (surname first), which must have been a welcome change for the hard-worked indexers.

About ten pages of comments on various cemeteries recorded in the 1920s by Paul A. Sherman make interesting reading.

The Index is admirable--space-saving and convenient to use. Where variant spellings are lumped together, presumably the most frequent is placed first; e.g., ELY-EALY-EALEY.

Memorial Records of Shelby County, Ohio is a handsome, well-produced volume and contains a wealth of material to reward the searcher who has an interest in that locality.

John must have been married previously, for his son Joshua is said to have had a son in 1773, and the birth of John's dau Esther/Hester is recorded in "a Reese Bible" [Could that mean Rees Porter's Bible?] as 16 Mch 1759. Both Joshua and Esther were "Humphreys family names," so there is a possibility that John Thomas's first wife was a sister of Sarah Humphreys.

Footnote: GOIN C. RICHARDSON born in North Carolina, moved to Greene County, Alabama as a boy. Here he twice married. Goin owned a large cotton plantation located just north of Clinton (Greene Co.), Alabama. By the year 1851 the family had moved to Navarro County, Texas, and then later to Ellis County, and still later around 1859, they were residents of Upshur County (this part of Upshur Co. was later to become Gregg Co.), Texas. Their home was located near the little village of "Earpsville" which is now Longview, Texas.

John, George, William, Dempsey and Goin Richardson all fought in the Civil War with the Texas Cavalry, Confederate States Army. They all survived the war with only William being slightly wounded in the arm.

GOIN C. RICHARDSON, his wife, NANCY (HARRISON) RICHARDSON, and one son, FRANK, are buried in a small private cemetery plot located in Teague Park, Longview, Texas.

The data I have on these families as one can see, is far from being completed. I would very much like to share and/or exchange this and other data that I have accumulated over the years. I will answer any correspondence pertaining to these families.

Recently our daughter, Vicki, had a genealogy project due in her 10th grade biology class taught by Mrs. Helen Martin at Anderson High School. She decided to write about her grandparents, both paternal and maternal. The following articles are those she wrote about Donald and Ada (Benham) Francis, who live in Austin.

ADA BENHAM

Ada Benham, my grandmother on my dad's side, was born to Frank Allen Benham and Emma Lenora McIntire (Benham) on May 29, 1905, in Lytton Springs, Texas. Unlike children today, Ada was born in a house in the country that she lived in for several years. The house was an old house because it was originally old when her Grandfather McIntire first owned it. The house had a pretty good size dining room, a great big bedroom with a fireplace, and another bedroom. Later a bedroom was built on the back for the boys. On the front porch a wash pan was kept to wash your hands. Since Ada was such a tiny baby, weighing only 3½ pounds, she remembers someone mentioning that she slept in a box. Ada said that during cotton season Lytton Springs used to be a prosperous little town.

Since Ada's mother wasn't well, the doctor said they should live in town for awhile. The family moved to South Austin and lived in a two-story house. They brought with them a colored woman and her son, who lived on the second floor of the house and did the housework.

Ada began school at Fulmore in the first grade. After a year, though, the family moved back to the farm.

For awhile, Ada took piano lessons, but because her teacher got mad once, she didn't take very long. Her teacher told her to play "Jesus Loves My Soul" but Ada couldn't do it very well, since she hadn't taken that long. The teacher said she wasn't trying to play and Ada went home and cried and cried. That was the end of her piano lessons.

She attended 2nd through 6th grades at Adalia which was a two-room school on about two acres. Ada was active in school playing such sports as basketball and tennis, and participating in spelling matches. She rode one mile to school everyday on a horse named Nellie. The horse was tied up all day, and at noon the boys would feed them. At night Ada had to study by a lamp.

One time when Ada's mother got sick, she went to San Antonio to see a doctor. Ada remembers her mother bringing home "the biggest box of medicine you ever saw." Then her dad built on a sleeping room out in the side yard, since she had TB and was to stay away from the children. The room had screen wire all around it, and canvas curtains that kept it warm. Her dad and mom stayed out in the "summer house," as it was called, for six months. The children weren't even allowed to go in the room; they had to talk through the screen. Ada's Aunt Mae and grandfather came to live with them. Finally she got over that and seemed to be fine. But then during the war she took the flu and had heart trouble, and died when Ada was 13 years old.

For grades 7th through 9th, Ada rode three to five miles to another school in Lytton Springs on a horse named Skeeball. During the day Skeeball stayed in a stall that had to be rented.

Then in June Ada's father sold his farm of about 128 acres and bought a farm in Kyle. Until school started, the family lived in Govalle. Ada boarded with some friends in Kyle in a house close to the school, until the family could move to Kyle. But Ada's father decided to sell the farm in Kyle because he got a good offer. Ada then quit school in December and they moved back to Govalle. Ada's father wanted her to go midterm to Austin High, but she was afraid they'd put her back, so she didn't go. Ada wanted to be a nurse, but she was too young.

In the summer Ada's father remarried and he moved to Oklahoma City. Since Ada didn't want to move to Oklahoma, her Aunt Sallie said she could live with her on East 7th and she stayed there for three months. She then went to the YWCA when she was 16 and stayed there for three years.

Ada got her first job at the downtown Woolworths. Her next job was at a home steam laundry and she kept record books there. Then she worked at a theater and managed the player piano during each movie, since there was no music in the films. Every morning she and another girl would go to J. R. Reed to pick out the music for the piano.

Ada's last job was her favorite. She sold tickets at the Hancock Opera House, and after she finished very evening she could see the shows free. For awhile back then, they didn't have movies, just road shows. Ada even saw the original Houdini perform. Even 60 years ago the tickets for shows were expensive, selling from \$2.50 to \$5.00.

One night there was a party in the country, and one of Ada's friends set her up with a blind date. Ada's date was Donald Francis, and they dated for about 2½ years before they finally got married.

JOE DONALD FRANCIS

Joe Donald Francis, my grandfather on my father's side, was born to James Henry Francis and Eula Josephine Dupree (Francis) on September 1, 1904, in Lynnville, Tennessee. Before his family actually moved to Texas, they came here one Christmas to see relatives when Donald (as he was always called) was about 4 years old. Donald remembers shooting off Roman candles that Christmas, which was something new to him. Donald was really excited about holding a Roman candle, and his Uncle Ben got aggravated with him and gave him one. Donald backed up toward the house and it started shooting off, so someone had to turn it around in a different direction.

Donald's father was appointed Constable and then was elected Deputy Sheriff. Donald's father would usually be gone at nights, and he can remember hearing his father come home at night since, after he put the horses in the barn, he always cleared his throat.

While living on the farm leased in Tennessee, a black family lived in a little house and the father did all the farm work. Donald can only remember his father plowing a couple of times. They also had an orchard of apple trees with 3 different kinds of apples.

One day Donald's oldest brother, Robert, was throwing rocks 30 to 40 feet up at apples to knock them down, and Donald, about 5 years old, was running under to catch the apples as they fell. Robert kept telling Donald not to go under there, but he kept doing it and suddenly a rock hit him, which gave him an inch scar and knocked him out. Robert thought he had killed him.

Donald's father had a shop, not a real blacksmith shop, but Donald remembers his father making a wagon bed.

On the farm they raised popcorn, and Donald remembers one day when he was young his father and the black man were picking popcorn and throwing the popcorn into the wagon while Donald was holding the reins. All of a sudden the mules got excited and they started running away down the field with Donald sitting in the wagon. The black man ran and stopped the wagon.

When Donald was about 5 years old, the family moved to Texas by train. They came to Texas because the doctor said they needed to get out of the Tennessee climate since his mother was ill. Donald said she must have had a congested heart or TB since she often fainted. Donald said that when his mother fainted they would put dry mustard with water on her pulse area.

When Donald's family lived on a ranch in Runnels County, on the other side of Brownwood, there would be dust storms blowing for days at a time. Donald remembers his mother having to put a sheet over the table after food had been fixed because sand blew in the house through the windows.

When Donald's family moved to Manor, they moved in wagons with all the household goods, since there were few cars.

Donald went to school in a 3- or 4-room wooden school with grades 1 through 11. The children carried their lunch in a sack made of newspaper, and everyday after lunch they would burn the sacks in a 50-gallon drum. One day in the spring some paper blew out and flew under the school that was full of leaves. In 30 minutes, the school burned flat to the ground.

Until they built the new school, which would be brick, of course, school was held in a couple of different places. Luckily though, only a month was remaining in the school year.

When the family moved to Webberville Road, Donald's sister married a painter. About a year later he got Donald a job as a painter for \$1.50 a day, and he worked with him about a year. The first new house Donald ever painted was off Travis Boulevard. Donald used to sand and putty and sometimes had to sit days at a time breaking 100 pounds worth of lead.

During the depression Donald did many different jobs. He drove a 10¢ taxi for a couple of years, put in waterlines for \$3.00 a day, and also got a job digging ditches. The air hammer he used was about as big as he was, and it "shook him to pieces." So that there would be more jobs available, the city let people do it by hand and cut out all machine-operated ditch digging machines.

These convenient little marks have many usages. Most importantly they enclose words that you are copying from some printed or written source. Be sure to mark clearly the exact beginning and ending of the quotation (to give credit to the source and authority for your statement as well). In hurried note-taking we are inclined to condense and summarize what we are reading; the difference between direct and indirect quotations must be clearly shown or we may be accused of plagiarism.

When reading censuses we find the same marks used to mean "same as above," or ditto. An enumerator of the old school, probably feeling that the marks should be reserved for quotations, often wrote "do" or "Do", an abbreviation of the word ditto, from a Latin word meaning "that which was just said."

A few enumerators employed the marks in an unorthodox way to perform the function of what printers call "dot leaders"--that is, a series of periods that lead the eye from one column to the next.

The first time I encountered that practice, I was perplexed to read that the wife and all the children apparently had the same occupation and the same amount of property as the husband, but the name of his state of birth was not dittoed but was written out for each, even though it was the same down to the next-to-last child. One would think he would use ditto marks to save writing the state over again.

Then it dawned on me that sometimes " " means not "the same as above", but "Keep going":
