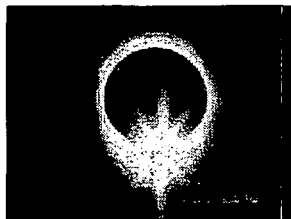

The Austin Genealogical Society was chartered in 1960 to cooperate with and help others interested in genealogical research. The Society's governing body is its Board of Directors of 20 members, half elected by the membership each year for two-year terms in alternating years. The Board selects from its membership the operating officers who serve one-year terms commencing each January. Society membership is open to anyone upon application and payment of stipulated dues.

The Society is a not-for-profit organization, with income mainly derived from yearly membership dues and seminar/workshop fees. The Society publishes a monthly Newsletter and a Quarterly journal. A specific purpose of the Society as mandated in its by-laws is the purchase of books and other genealogical materials for the Texas State Library, Genealogical Collection, located in the Lorenzo de Zavala State Archives Building in Austin. All Society proceeds in excess of operating expenses are devoted to this purpose. As a Texas State institution the Library's in-house funding is directed toward acquisition of Texas material and matter of broad genealogical interest. This state is somewhat unique in that the forebears of many current residents immigrated or moved to Texas from the United States during the time it was a Republic and there is considerable interest in the Austin area in genealogy pertaining to other states. Since the Library's internal acquisition capability is limited as mentioned above, much of what the AGS contributes to the Library pertains to genealogy from other states, thus enhancing the Library's usefulness to the widest possible group of users.

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GERARD P. GOUDREAU (1932-1998)
BARBARA JANE LANGHAM GOUDREAU (1935-1998)

With deepest sorrow we record the death of Gerard P. Goudreau on Sunday, 4 January 1998 and that of his wife, Barbara Jane Goudreau on Wednesday, 7 January 1998. Jerry had been ill for some time prior to his death; the strain of his illness and demise was more than Barbara could bear; she succumbed to a stroke and heart failure three days after he died.

Jerry and Barbara had been members of Austin Genealogical Society since the mid-1970's, and there has been no one who has contributed more or in more ways than had these two remarkable people. Gerry served as president of the Society in 1981, 1982 and 1983 but this only highlights a visible landmark of their work. They were on the Board of Directors for many years, serving in many capacities including publications mailing officer.

For a long time, Barbara was a private researcher, particularly in the Travis County area. She gave Mary C. Moody much assistance in her publication *"1890 Travis County, Texas, Census, Uniquely Reconstructed and Annotated."* Additionally, the Goudreaus contributed substantially to genealogical knowledge in the area by means of their publications. Barbara and Jerry privately published *"Confederate Cemetery Book, City Cemetery #4, San Antonio, Texas"* and *"Travis County Marriages 1883-1903"* (published 1987). Barbara was a main participant in the publication by Austin Genealogical Society of *"Republic of Texas Pension Application Abstracts."* One of Barbara's first and ongoing projects was to collect Confederate Veterans' names, units they served in, and place of burial; this information was not limited to the Travis County area.

Under the Goudreaus' leadership, the Austin Genealogical Society in 1981 began a matching funds project to acquire items for the Texas State Library, Genealogy Collection. This successful endeavor has provided much equipment as well as an enormous number of books to the Collection through the years.

In September 1988 this Quarterly began serializing alphabetic summations of material in the Vertical Files at the Genealogy Collection of the Texas State Library. Gerry and Barbara had compiled this data with assistance from Colleen Munds of the Library staff. This was a very sizeable task in itself; the Quarterly presented portions of these summaries in each issue through the September 1992 issue, totaling well over 100 pages of condensed material.

For many years Barbara and Gerry personally visited Travis County Cemeteries and assembled cemetery plot data on these cemeteries; they had virtually completed this compilation at their deaths. Barbara had expressed a desire to have these records published or exhibited in a permanent format. She unselfishly gave up any monetary gain, asking only to retain the authorship. Hopefully the Austin Genealogical Society can fulfill this desire.

Commensurate with this work, Barbara and Jerry began working on an annotated compilation of the Travis County, Texas, 1850 Federal Census. Their annotations include, where available to them, extended information about each of the families: vital statistic information from Travis

County legal records; burial locations as obtained from their cemetery data; and 1860 census material on those families listed on both collections. Because of the depth of the material available to them, these annotated records are extremely valuable to Travis County genealogy. The Quarterly began presenting this material in September 1995 and will complete the work later this year. We are grateful that they had been able to essentially complete this work some time ago.

Barbara and Jerry are survived by their sons, Gerard Patrick, Jr. (Red), Christopher Bryan, and Robert (Bubba) Goudreau, along with the families of Christopher and Robert.

This issue of the Quarterly is dedicated to the memory of Barbara and Jerry Goudreau. A 3-volume set of books memorializing Barbara and Jerry is being placed in the Genealogy Collection. The set is "*The Diary of Jacob Engelbrecht, 1797-1878*", edited by William R. Quinn and published by Historical Society of Frederick, Maryland, 1976.

Barbara's and Jerry's deaths will leave an enormous vacancy incapable of being filled. The Board of Directors and members of Austin Genealogical Society extend heartfelt sympathy to their sons and their families.

THE CUMBERLAND GAP AND THE AGS ANNUAL SEMINAR

Recently, Board members Beryl and Leanna Bergschneider loaned the Editor a photocopy of an unpublished book entitled "*Historical Sketches*", which was written in 1924 by Judge William Ayres of Pineville KY. The contents deal mainly with the history of Kentucky during its exploratory and settlement period. The Bergschneiders had obtained the copy from Ida Jean and Thomas Harp of Windsor CA, who are former residents of Pineville.. Along with other material, the book highlights the life and genealogy of Dr. Thomas Walker of Virginia, who was the first person of record to have traversed the Cumberland Gap in 1750. In particular, it includes Dr. Walker's journal of that trip, one of the few instances where the journal is reproduced in full.

We feel material in the book is of interest to many readers who can or may trace their ancestry through the Gap. This feeling became accentuated when AGS secured Mary Kegley of Wytheville VA as our 25 April 1998 Seminar speaker; one of her topics is *Migration Patterns Through Southwest Virginia*, which almost surely includes the Gap. On Page 11 we begin a summary history of the Cumberland Gap, including material from Judge Ayres' book and other sources, all as an introduction to the Seminar topic, and hope it encourages you to attend.

Judge Ayres' book was not copyrighted and he has no known descendants. We recognize and acknowledge his work in assembling this material. In a future issue we may present excerpts from

Dr. Walker's interesting Journal as an extended examination of that important aspect of American history. We hope to see all of you at the April Seminar.

THE FAMILY HISTORY SHOW NOW ON KTSA, SAN ANTONIO

Interest continues to grow in the area about the live Family History Show on Texas State Network radio every Sunday evening from 10:00 PM to midnight. Michael Matthews hosts the show, which highlights guest genealogical and archival experts each week. Up to now, a problem for this area has been the lack of a station outlet. Recently, however, Michael was able to sign on Station KTSA 550 AM in San Antonio, which most of us in the Austin area can pick up fairly readily. This is a very effective way to stay abreast genealogically and have on-the-spot questions answered. We urge you to listen (and pass along the suggestion to KLBJ, Austin, that they should air it also.) The program schedule through May is included on Page 7 for your consideration.

A GOOD FEELING

As each issue of this journal is mailed, it goes out with some questions in the editor's mind as to whether it has much genealogical merit. Is the content relevant or useful or meaningful; is it worth our effort and the Society's money (as they say on ABC News, it's your money.) 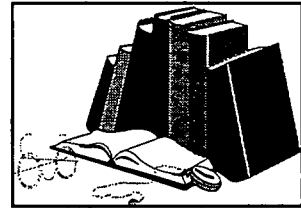
THE GRAY GOLDEN MEMORIAL


Dear Cousin Tom Roy,

BOOK REVIEW

Diary of Jacob Engelbrecht, by Jacob Engelbrecht, edited by William R. Quynn, Professor Emeritus, University of Maryland; in three volumes: *Volume 1, 1818-1832 The Railroad Comes to Frederick*; *Volume 2, 1832-1858 The Building of the Clustered Spires*; *Volume 3 1858-1878 The Civil War*, 8 ¾ x 11 ¼ "; total of 1,969 pp, hardback. The Historical Society of Frederick County, Inc., Frederick, MD, 1976. Typed, double spaced; text and some charts and lists; portrait photograph of author after title page of 1st volume. As noted this work is divided chronologically and covers happenings as seen and experienced by Jacob Engelbrecht, a tailor of Frederick, MD, who lived 1797-1878, and began as a young man writing notes on scraps of paper, but graduated into a formal journalistic style. Biographical sketches are included in the front of Volume 1, and on page 468 of Volume I of the 1882 edition of J. Thomas Scharf's *History of Western Maryland*. Mr. Scharf thought highly of Mr. Engelbrecht and his reporting ability. Engelbrecht supplemented his own observations with news items from the local newspaper as well as national and even some international news, and often quoted poetry of the day, German sayings and wisdom (not always translated to English) and other quotations. His ancestral chart could be compiled over time. Political elections and other organizations are also detailed.

Genealogists and historians of Maryland will find that this set of books adds a flavor of the times as well as many factual details they may have searched for elsewhere without success. He has noted many, if not most, of the births, deaths, marriages and burials of many of the town's citizens, especially in the earlier volumes, along with comments such as "So we rub along," or "whatever is, is right," a quotation he ceased using very much after the death of his bright young daughter to whom he was obviously very devoted.

The present reviewer found much information about her Baer/Bare ancestry in these volumes, so much that a revised version of her book "A Beaver Married a Bair" is underway. The lesson here is that if you have ancestors in Frederick County, don't publish until you have thoroughly reviewed these volumes.

As Mr. Engelbrecht aged, he began, in the second volume toward the last, skipping days but as the Civil War became imminent, his attention picked up again, and he began reporting on battles, especially as they approached, and then involved his city. An interesting point is that he lived right across the street from the Barbara Ritchie of Civil War fame, immortalized by Whittier in his famous poem, and watched closely as the troops of each side paraded through the town on his street. He observed several years later that had the incident actually happened where she leaned out the attic window and defied the Confederates with, "Shoot if you must this old grey head, but spare your country's flag," Jacob Engelbrecht would have certainly seen it. He did not. He had, however, characterized her earlier as a spry and rather feisty elderly lady who would have done that if anyone did!

There are a couple of things that need to be pointed out. In Volume 1, pages 119 and 120 are reversed and therefore are misnumbered, including in the index references. Also, Mr. Quynn (and presumably his volunteer assistants from the society) must have grown a bit tired as they passed the middle of the third volume, and repeated a page, then started hand-numbering the pages. The index in this volume is therefore not always correct, and may be off by a page or two. A search back or forward will turn up the researched information in the experience of the present reviewer. One may also miss finding one's ancestor if only briefly mentioned, due to the fact that these casual references are often not indexed. It is most helpful, however, that each volume is individually indexed, and a number of place names are included.

It should be noted here that this set has been selected as the Barbara and Jerry Goudreau memorial. See elsewhere in this issue for more details in this regard. The set is being ordered for donation through the Austin Genealogical Society to the Texas State Library and Archives, Genealogy Collection. (The private set owned by the reviewer has been used for this review.)

The Cumberland Gap

CONDUIT OF HISTORY

SETTING THE STAGE

Let's, for a moment, go back in time. The year is 1750. George II is king of Great Britain, although in the waning years of his regency. The people of London are more inclined to listen to a performance of the *Music for the Royal Fireworks*, whose composer, George F. Handel, is also closing out his illustrious career, than worry about anything occurring in Britain's American colonies. In the colonies, the mother country has not yet become a menace. Twenty-six years still must pass before the ultimate break...

But for now these thirteen colonies have become mature overseas assets for the British Crown. Populated almost entirely by emigrants from the mother country (plus a growing group of African slaves), the colonies already have over one hundred years of history, beginning with the Jamestown charter of 1607, and most colonists in 1750 are at least first generation descendants of their immigrant forebears. These citizen colonists are vigorous, hardy, and above all imbued with a native intelligence that on the average likely exceeds that of their homeland; almost certainly that of other European nations. The line of colonies fills the Atlantic seaboard of North America from Maine through Georgia; this seacoast strip abounds with burgeoning farms, plantations, towns, cities, and minor industries, all tied together with an adequate network of roads and turnpikes. Relative to world economies of the times, the colonies are prospering.

What is unique about this elongated community of colonies in this year, over and above the vigorous nature of its inhabitants, is its unusual shape. If one with late 20th century wisdom (really hindsight) looks at a map of the continent with the British colonies plotted on its east side one is struck by the fact that for over a century these colonies have grown and prospered *internally* but hardly at all *externally*, while an area ten times that of the colonies lies to the west, a vast wilderness begging for settlement except for the presence of various tribes of natives who could solidly claim sovereignty on the basis of being perhaps of the 150th generation (if any colonist bothers to ask). Certainly, too, there is a political reason. The arguments and scuffles and wars of the various European nations (mainly, of course, Britain, France, Spain, and the Dutch) have adjudicated that as of this 1750th year of our Lord, Britain can lay firm claim to only this thin Atlantic strip, with hazy extensions northward and northwestward. France asserts title to that huge crack in the continent called the Mississippi, and nebulous areas on either side, while the Spanish, if asked, would say anything north of their Mexican colony was their territory without really being able to define it; that takes care of most everything to the Pacific Ocean.. So, if you head west from any Colony, somewhere or the other you might bump into a native or a Frenchman, and goodness knows we British have had problems with France for several hundred years in Europe; let's not push our luck over here just yet. Not just yet. It will happen soon enough; the French and Indian Wars will begin in 1754.

Actually, there's another reason, one that will be somewhat neglected in subsequent history books, but of key importance. Cutting a south-southwest by north-northeast swath through the continent is an ancient mountain range, called in its various parts Appalachian, Allegheny, Adirondack and other names, starting in north Georgia and meandering on above the northern limit of Maine. Eastern foothills of this chain emerge from the coastal plains and hills about a hundred or so miles inland from the Atlantic. While the western boundaries of most of the colonies extend beyond this mountain chain, it has, as of year 1750, formed a practical impediment beyond which movement has been for exploration purposes only, with no settlement involved. So what we have is a long, narrow coastal strip, extensively settled and developed, with the mountain barrier to the west, and nothing much other than mostly unknown space, lots of it, beyond.

THE MOVE WEST

What I have just outlined is an attempt to define the circumstances in which residents of the colonies found themselves in the year 1750. They had spent the past century settling and building up the seaboard-Piedmont area, and most were quite content with conditions then existing in their communities. They were aware of vast undeveloped areas beyond the mountains but they mostly weren't interested, being content with their location. As for anything further west, the mountains, and what is more, the natives, the Indians, were there, having been forced out from the coastal areas by the immigrant flood from the British Isles. The Indians no longer posed any great threat in the settled areas but would and did become quite warlike in what was still their territory: the mountains and beyond.

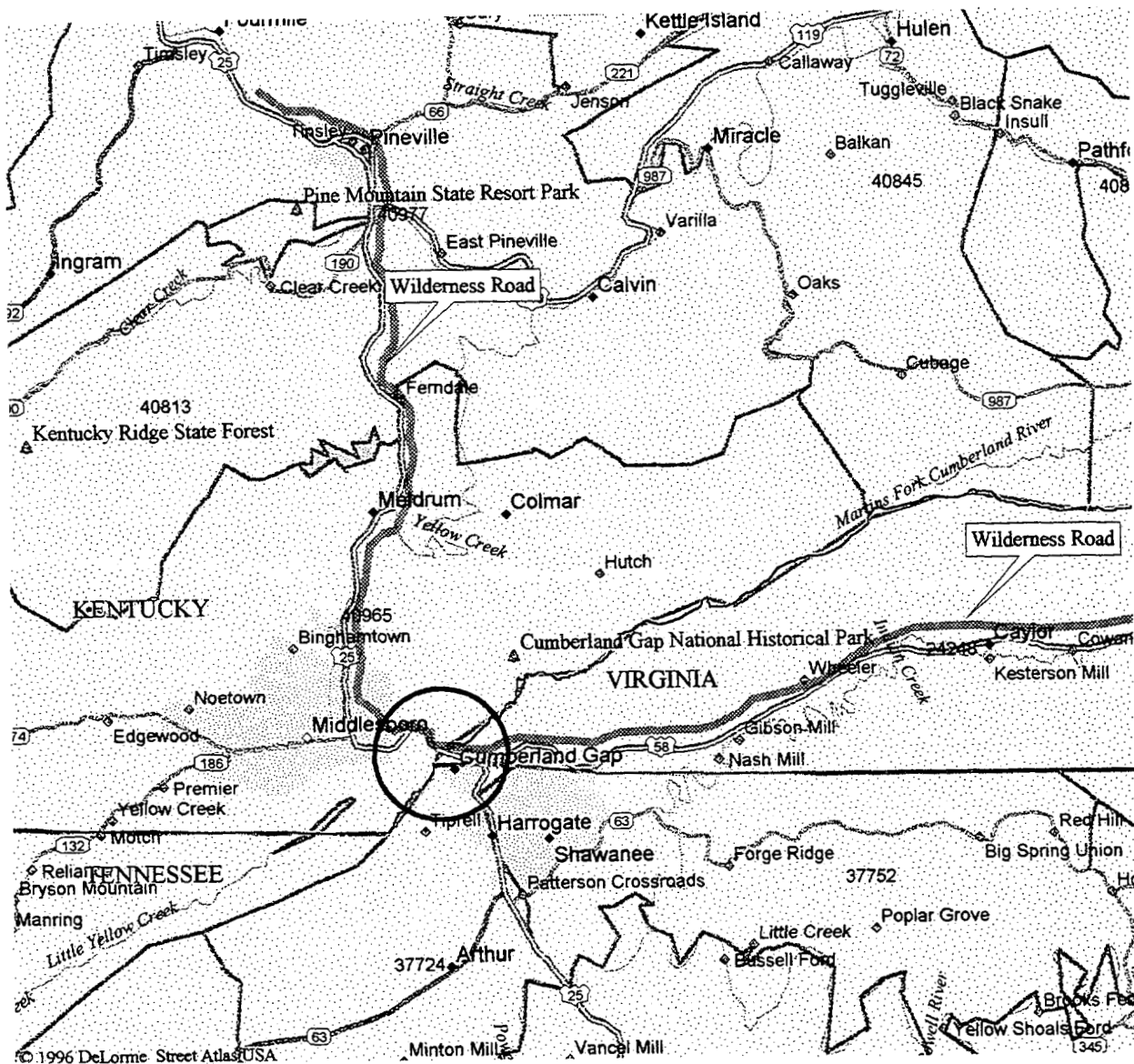
Yet the population density in the settled areas was increasing and already in 1750 there were those who felt that pressure. Some few of these became restless; why not push through the mountain wall and carve out a new life and community in the boundless forests beyond. The pioneer spirit re-emerged. Such was particularly the case in the colony of Virginia. Its coastal area had been settled the longest, and by 1850 just about all of the land east of the Blue Ridge and the Shenandoah valley had been claimed and settled. It was in that year that Dr. Thomas Walker entered our picture.

Thomas Walker, the son of Thomas Walker and Susan Peachy, was born 25 January 1715 in or near Walkerton, King and Queen County, Virginia. He was the youngest of three children. After the death of his father, young Thomas attended William and Mary College, adopting the profession of medicine and surgery. In 1741 he married Mildred Thornton Meriwether, a widow and second cousin to George Washington. As of 1750 George still hadn't amounted to much but his cousin held a sizeable dowry of 15,000 acres in Albemarle County near Charlottesville, and there she and Thomas erected their home, Castle Hill.

Dr. Thomas Walker became friends with Peter Jefferson, Thomas Jefferson's father (shucks, everyone knew everyone in colonial Virginia) and at Peter's death, he became young Thomas' guardian. Possibly through the Jefferson contact Dr. Walker became increasingly interested in exploring and surveying, and ceased medical practice. In 1748, after becoming agent for a development company, he and several others made an expedition across the New River in southwestern Virginia to the waters of the Holston River to seek out possible settlement areas. From Dr. Walker's subsequent documentations it appears that neither he nor anyone else at that time had anything but a vague idea of the country beyond the Holston; this was bumping up against both the mountains and the Indians. Yes, everyone knew there was a whole world beyond the mountains, but, oh, those mountains.

The 1748 trip seems to have whetted Dr. Walker's appetite for more exploration. In 1750, still representing the land company, he and five other men set out on a more extensive survey of areas further west than he had journeyed in 1748. Beyond the Holston they were on their own; any white men previously traversing this country had left no records. Soon he was facing a long, steep ridge of a mountain trending northeast-southwest that we now know as the Cumberland Mountain. Going over the top would be all but impossible, but on April 13, 1750 his group encountered an opening in the ridge which was easily traversed (Indians had long since laid a trail through it). They readily moved through and emerged into the long-sought wilderness which is now southeastern Kentucky. Walker had found the *Cumberland Gap* and a relatively easy path into the Kentucky wilderness.

Exploitation of Walker's find (he made a loop in southeastern Kentucky after passing through the Gap) waited until the French and Indian Wars wound down in 1763. There were a number of excursions into the territory after Walker's trek, mostly lost in the history books, until Daniel Boone navigated the Gap in 1767 and eventually stayed to settle. From these beginnings the settlement of the areas west of the mountains really began. For the next half century, families enthralled with the vision of bounteous land out west left the Atlantic colony-states and moved through the only practical conduit available, the Cumberland Gap, to their new homes in what was to be Kentucky and Tennessee and, ultimately all the way to Texas.



The route from southwestern Virginia, through the Gap, and into Kentucky soon became known as the *Wilderness Road*. By 1800 over 300,000, possibly more than 500,000 people had crossed the Gap. After that, other routes took over and the Gap declined in importance. But Thomas Walker's discovery had done its duty well; it had effectively opened the central continent to settlement and development.

I have assembled this summary of the history of Cumberland Gap for a dual reason. For one, there are many AGS members and other residents of Texas who trace their antecedent lines back through the Gap into Virginia and beyond; it is a key element in their heritage, and well worth recognizing on its own merits. Over and above that, the featured speaker for the AGS annual Seminar on 25 April, 1998, is Mary Kegley, Director of the Family History Institute of Southwest Virginia. Details of the seminar are found on Page 43. Please note that one of her four subjects is *Migration Patterns through Southwest Virginia*. I have no prior knowledge of the information she will present, but much of it will have to involve the Gap as an integral part of those patterns. Any reader of these pages who has or may have genealogical links back into Tennessee or Kentucky should recognize the importance of the Cumberland Gap in their individual heritage and come to the Seminar to hear Mary's excellent presentations. For those of us locating in this area by other means, the history of the Gap is nevertheless an enthralling saga of our country's beginnings, much to be appreciated and understood by one and all. Let's all come.

3. The material should be of the submitter's choosing but preferentially should be genealogical or historical in nature. The submitter is completely responsible for content, accuracy and freedom from copyright infringement. AGS assumes no liability for these matters.
4. Months should be spelled or abbreviated; no numbers should be used. Dates should be in genealogical format: DAY, MONTH, YEAR.. The name and address of the submitter should be on each page of material. The Editor reserves the right to format and/or edit the material so that it will be printer-ready.
5. Material should be sent to the Editor at 4500 Hyridge Drive, Austin TX 78759 **no later than 10 May 1998.**

We have all been saddened by the deaths in January of both Barbara and Jerry, who spent countless hours compiling, arranging and annotating the Travis County, Texas 1850 Federal Census, adding considerable additional material they had obtained from Travis and Williamson Counties' legal records (births, marriages, deaths, wills, etc); Travis County cemetery records, which they also had accumulated; extensions of family census data into the 1860 Travis County Census where possible; and other material such as newspaper articles and obituaries. An appropriate example of this extended information can be found under Family #329, Page 31 in this issue. All told, the collection adds enormously to the bare data shown in the census listings and should serve as a rich and lasting genealogical heritage. The Quarterly has been presenting segments of this compilation in numerical order by Census Family Numbers since September 1995. Go west one block to Balcones Dr, then left 1 ½ blks. The Church and parking lot are on right. **VISITORS ARE ALWAYS WELCOME.** The Board of Directors meets at 6:15 in a separate room.

They must be **BLACK** and **LEGIBLE**, whether typed, hand-written, computer-printed or in superior calligraphy. Months must be **SPELLED** or abbreviated, not in figures. **DATES SHOULD BE SHOWN** in accepted genealogical style, that is, DAY, MONTH, YEAR. Allow space for binding at inner margins of facing pages; i.e., your first page will be a left-hand page. Carefully check horizontal pages (reading in the 11-inch direction). Otherwise, the Editor has to position some pages upside down to prevent loss of data in the stapling-punching process. **NO 8 1/2x14 sheets, please!**

You may submit Lineage or Family Group charts, Ahnentafels, narratives, cemetery inscriptions, Bible records, census data, queries, or a combination of material, just so it is not under copyright. **BE SURE** to proofread your material for accuracy and clarity so we will not publish faulty or incorrect data. Put name and address of submitter **on each page** in legible form (not blind embossed). Consult a recent June Quarterly for suggestions. Remember that reproductions are dimmer than originals so try to provide good quality originals.

REMEMBER: Individual membership secures two facing pages.
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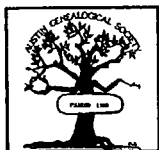
