**SCHULZE/KREBS** Searching for information on my great-great grandfather, **AUGUST C. SCHULZE**, who came from Elle, Hanover, Germany, to Cat Springs, Texas, 1854. He was a farmer who had one daughter, **EMELIE SCHULZE**, who m. **HENRY AMTHOR** in Austin Co., Texas, 22 June 1859. The latter lived in Cat Springs and Bellville, Texas area. August also had one son, **ADOLPH SCHULZE**, b. 18 Feb 1829 in Germany. He m. **MARIE KREBS** 22 Dec 1859 in Bellville, Texas. After marriage they lived on their farm in Shelby, Texas. They were my great-grandparents. Information on August C. Schulze came from a book, "The Cat Springs Story." Marriage records in Austin County show a different spelling, **AMELIA SCHULZE**.

## An Iowa Christmas

I don't think I would recognize the house without the umbrella tree under which my brother Art and I played on the front lawn while our mother visited her friend, Lucia Fordyce, for a couple of hours every week or so in about October and November that year. We never questioned why or what they were doing all that time, while we were not allowed inside. What year was it? How old were we then? Without thinking, I can say that it was Mount Vernon, a small college town southeast of Cedar Rapids in east-central Iowa. But what year, and what were they doing all those hours?

It must have been about 1932. The preceding Christmas, I had received my first (and only) "big" doll, named Flossy Flirt, with hair, wake/sleep eyes, hard composition head and legs, soft cotton-covered body and rubber arms (which later partly melted and one elbow broke in the heat). So I must have been eight, and Art approaching his fifth birthday on Christmas.

As fall and then winter and cold weather came, the lumberyard delivered the "hard" coal through the cellar window with a chute, and the furnace was stoked to heat the house in the early morning after being banked all night. We began to hover around the registers in the dining room and living room after supper and after homework was done.

Preparations were started for Christmas: Colored paper chains were made, using edges of bright flyers thrown into the yard during the rest of the year (no commercial construction paper!). Cranberries were purchased, some to string for the tree, others to make the traditional relish. Popcorn popped in the long-handled shaker which was held over the flame of the gas stove, some we ate, but this popcorn was for the tree, and like the cranberries, was strung on the thread pulled through the kernels with a large needle. The string of lights was brought down from the attic and each bulb tested, for if one were burned out, none would light up! Replacements might need to be bought from the locally owned dime store. Presents were mostly home-made; Mother showed me how to make a sewing box for Aunt Bertha out of a cigar box someone gave us, using cotton cloth to cover the box inside and out, and the lid padded with cotton; a few needles and pins stuck in to hint what it was for!

Older brother Bill made the trek out to the old family farm, a mile out of town to the southeast, past the cemetery where my grandparents and Uncle Russell Bair and Aunt Bertha would later be put to rest. Past the sewage plant, where we held our noses when we walked out to the farm in the summer; around the corner, and on by Aunt Bertha's mother, and diabetic brother Frank's place, and a little farther, up the lane to the farmhouse where my grandparents had bought in 1912, moving from Iowa County.

When they moved into town to semi-retire in early 1919, and the three older sons and my father returned from WWI, the house was occupied by various ones, including my parents on their marriage in March that year. Later, Uncle Russell and Aunt Bertha bought it, so this was where Bill headed that day, about a week before Christmas.

Probably the first owners had planted the row of long-needle pines up on a ridge across a small valley from the house. This was a common practice, as evergreens made good windbreaks all year. Bill was following an old family custom of cutting two branches from one of the pines, then he carried or drug them back the mile to our house where they were lashed back-to-back, put into a bucket with water to keep them fresh and stones to hold them upright, and this was our Christmas tree. Think about it: The branches were the triangle shape, and two of them gave the

fullness! So then we set about decorating with our homemade goodies, the one string of lights, and little paper drawings of stars, etc. Of course, we also had a few of the old-fashioned baubles and a star for the very top.

Christmas Eve was a big town event, with a program at the high school auditorium that everyone attended. Skits and readings were done by the kids attending the surrounding country schools; there were solos and choirs and sing-alongs. Then, the moment all waited for: "Jingle Bells" with Santa Claus (the local short, chubby dentist, Dr. Bigger) coming down the aisle, with his jolly "Ho, Ho, Ho!" and bag of candy slung across his back! All the children lined up to go on stage and get the sweet ribbons, raspberry and other treats, with a pat on the head. Home everyone went to await the morning, and hopefully presents, not a lump of coal.

At last it was time to get up and see what was left under the tree. Art had birthday presents as well (later saying that he, instead of feeling slighted, felt honored to be born on that special day, even if his birthday cake was a fruitcake!).

I found my same doll as last year and started to cry! There she lay in an open box. Mother persuaded me to pick her up, and there were all the new clothes she and her friend Lucia had handmade all those hours while Art and I played under the umbrella tree.

Later we all went to Uncle Russels's for Art's birthday/Christmas dinner, where Aunt Bertha had prepared a duck, dressing, vegetables, homegrown canned peaches, and we bowed our heads in thanks.

## Krebs Family Reunion

President Windell Rudolff opened the business meeting. He welcomed everyone to this reunion and it was agreed to have another reunion in September 2004 at this same American Legion Hall in Shelby. ## Austin Genealogical Society Audit Report for the Year 2002

September 03, 2003

Having examined the 2002 Wells Fargo Bank Account and AGS Financial Reports, I submit the following report:

The Wells Fargo Bank Account is correct and consistent, month by month, and the beginning balance of \$6,474.55 and the ending balance of \$10,778.91 is fully reconcilable. The only exception is three checks written for more than \$1,000 that were not cosigned by the President, or Acting President, per Article V, Section 7, of the Bylaws. All three of these checks were for legitimate Society business.

The AGS Financial Reports although accurate and well documented do not track month to month with the bank statements. This is due to the timing of the bank statement, always closed on the last day of the month, and the Financial Reports, which are closed earlier in order to report at the monthly meetings held on the last Tuesday of the month.

The Financial Reports beginning balance of \$6,265.27, and ending balance of \$11,234.97, will not track with the bank balance due to the aforementioned timing difference. For instance, there is a \$456.06 difference between the ending balance at Wells Fargo and the AGS Financial Reports. This difference can be partially explained by a \$150 transaction on 12/03/02. Check #1401 was written to the Postmaster for a Bulk Mail Deposit. This check reduced the bank account by \$150, but because it is listed on the AGS books as a Bulk Mail asset it actually caused a \$300 difference between the year-end balances of the bank account and the AGS book. This difference will zero out when the postal account is reduced by usage over time. The balance of the difference is explained by the timing of when the books are closed.

The results of my audit is that the Society books and the bank accounts are accurate and that prudent care has been taken with regard to the Society assets using the current accounting practices.

Attached are several suggestions for the board to consider. I feel these items represent a small exposure, but an exposure nonetheless.

### Suggestions:

1. Review the \$1000 co-signature requirement in the Bylaws. Is this a valid requirement, and would it be burdensome if quick action was necessary?
2. Revisit the threshold for checks written without Board approval. For instance, of 74 checks written 14 were for more than \$250. Should these checks have had Board approval?
3. As soon as practical change the accounting practice and close the Society books on the last day of the month, thereby aligning with bank procedures. This will make monthly and yearly balancing and auditing easier. Also, notify the board and membership that the information presented at the monthly meetings are as of the end of business the previous month.
4. Examine the practice of carrying assets and liabilities, reducing the possibility of having books out of balance.
5. Find a volunteer accountant that would help revamp the Society accounting practices.
6. Consider the possibility of securing someone outside the Society to provide the audit report at the end of the year.

I will be willing to discuss any of these suggestions with the board.

## Letters to Texas from Tennessee Cousins

My great-grandmother, Margaret Reese Watkins Cardwell, came to Texas from East Tennessee, around Grainger, Jefferson and Hamblen counties. Some of these letters were written to her daughter, Margaret "Lou" Cardwell Brewer, and some were written to Lou's husband, Dr. John Brewer.

Margaret Watkins Cardwell had a number of brothers and sisters. Margaret, her sister Thompsey (referred to in one letter as Aunt Tom), her brother Lawson and their mother came to Texas. Most of the other siblings stayed in Tennessee (one brother moved to Arkansas). The writers of the letters seem to have been daughters of Margaret Watkins Cardwell's brother John Watkins. One thing does confuse me, though. That is that the letters are signed Alice, Sarah, Mary and Lou. Among others, John had daughters named Lou, Mary and Sarah Alice. I don't know if the letters from Alice and Sarah were from the same person and just signed differently. I can't find another Alice or another Sarah whom I think might have written.

My favorite of all the letters is the one written to John dated July 31, 1884, and the excerpt from the letter, most of which was lost.

Locust Slant Tenn  
Nov 17st 1878

Mrs. M. L. Brewer

Darling Cousin

I presume you are begining to think I am not going to answer your letter atol. but let me inform you are very much mistaken. I thought I would wait until I had some news to write you. I tell you we are having more weddings in our vicinity this Fall than I ever heard of before Cousin Sallie Watkins was married the 13 of this month to Mr. John E. Galbraith of Mill Spring. We had a gay time at the wedding and infair. Wirt Miss Carrie Galbraith Mr. Henry Titsworth and myself were the waiters, I don't think Sallie was scared one bit, but cousin John had the shakes pretty badly. I don't think cousin John is atol handsome, but one of the best fellows I ever saw. I feel real sorry for Aunt Louisa, her last daughter is married now and she will be so lonesome. I expect she will have a new daughterinlaw before long but you know that wont be like her own child it is Brit that is talking about marrying now. to Miss Kate Jarnagin, she is one of their near neighbors, have been courting a long time. they are coming up next Saturday and stay all night and day with us, we are also looking for cousin John and Sallie on Sunday wish you could be with us all I know we we would have a nice time.

Well I like to forgot to tell you the best news (or at least the strangest) and that is that cousin Mary and Martha Talbott are married. they were married 7th of this month. both married the same evening. I tell you that was quite a surprise to most every person. they had lived single so long we all thought they would never marry. but they fooled us certain, they were 40 yrs old and getting toleraby gray cousin Martha married Mr. Jessie Sunderland and cousin Mary Mr. George Bowen I think cousin Martha married a splendid fellow, don't know much about Mr. Bowen. I think we are going to have two or three more weddings soon, but I cant tell you who they are untill I know for certain. I declare I am getting a little uneasy about me ever getting off,



but I have one consoleing thought and that is I may have some hopes untill I am forty yrs old and then get off like cousin Mary and Martha.

Well I must stop my nonsense for I feel so drowsy and bad I expect I have got quite a mixture of what I have written. How is little sweet Henry getting along? I would like so much to see him this evening. We have little Emmas and Lawsons pictures framed. I think they are so pretty, and I never saw sweeter looking children when did you hear from Uncle Lawson? Much love to all and lots of kisses for little H hope to get his picture soon. Write soon to

As we havn't heard from any of you for sometime, I will attempt to answer your very interesting missive something I should have done ere this but I am so lazy about writing (as well as every thing else) I most always neglect it too long. Well now I have commenced I dont know that I can think of any thing that will be interesting to you. I have been staying at home very close all spring, havn't been to any picnics or any thing of the kind for sometime. Cousin Herd Comfort and Mollie were up last Friday. Mollie stayed with us until Monday and Mary and I went home with her, saw Cousin Billie he was on his way to Knoxville on some business wasn't with him but a short time, we heard this week Billie Louis had the fever hain't heard from him for several days but hope he is recuperating. I am very sorry you couldn't come to see us while you were in Alabama we all talked about you while you were there thought probably you would surprise us by a visit, but alas; the brightest hopes are often blighted. I was real sorry you didn't have enough of little Henrys pictures taken to send me one for I don't know of any thing that would please me more than to receive his picture. tell Cousin John I am getting rather uneasy about getting his picture dont think he is going to send it atol. tell Cousin Alice I have heard several compliments passed on hers. think if she would come out she would soon captivate some of our Tennessee gents for good looking ladies are few and far between in this part of the country.

Hope to hear from you soon.

Dear Cousin.

'Tis with much pleasure that I attempt to communicate through the silent yet expressive medium of the pen, how much more pleasant it would be could the conversation be verbal I was real sorry to hear of cousin Lou having a felon on her thumb. hope it is well ere this for they are so very painful (or at least I have heard they were) I never experienced it myself. Well cousin how are you spending this sombrous Christmas day? if you are like me you dont hardly realize that it is Christmas, for it is so rainy and bad every person have to stay housed up I havn't got any Christmas presents as yet but will still have some hopes until the week is out, as I hardly ever miss getting something.

Cousin Addie Watkins was married the 16th of this month to Mr. Berk Justice of Talbotts. think he is an honest energetic fellow and will make Addie a good husband hope so any way; Mary Tommie and Lou went to the wedding said they had a splendid supper and plenty music, Wirt and Miss Addie Bettis were the attendants, they only had one couple. believe that is all the kin that have married since I wrote last. dont know of any more that will step off soon. there has been a Watkins lady married every fall for three in succession, but dont guess there will be any next fall unless they call on our little band for there isn't but one more and she is rather young Reckon old Santa Clause loaded little Henry with Christmas presents, would like so much to see his sweet face this morning, cousin John I have been begging cousin Lou for a long time to have his picture taken and send me now I will try you a clip and see how I come out. I don't know of any thing that would afford me more pleasure unless it would be to see his natural face.

Papa went to the Station yesterday evening and Brother sent us all some nice oranges, tell little Henry to run over to see me and I will give him some and some pretty red apples. apples are very scarce in our vicinity this winter. they are so imperfect they don't keep well. We are having some cold weather at last we have had more pretty warm weather this fall and winter than I ever remember seeing before but expect we will have enough cold now to pay up for it.

Well I must close as I can't think of any thing that will interest you, excuse all mistakes and write soon, you and cousin both for I am always glad to hear from any of you. With my best love to all and many kisses for the little one, I am as ever.

Dr. J. C. Brewer:

Cousin John.

As I promised in my last letter I would write you guess I had best do it or you might form a poor opinion of me, and I don't want you to do that I want you to see that I am a girl of my word.

Well cousin this is a big day with the Republicans isn't it? now wouldn't you like to be waltzing around through Chicago about this time you would get to see all the "big men" I would like to see them but would hate for any person to set me down in the city by myself. I reckon by

this time next week we will know who got the nomination, but of course Arthur or Blaine one will do you get excited over politics! you just ought to see papa during a presidential campaign but don't believe he is as bad as he used to be. I don't take much interest in politics. I some times get interested in it Tommie and I have all the reading to do for papa as he cant see enough to read. I do hope we will get a democratic President this time I believe they have their convention the 8 or 10 of this month I think if Tilden wont accept the nomination the Democrats will go crazy don't you think? Democrats are very foolish any way I've a notion to turn Republican. no cousin John I am jesting. really it doesn't seem like I could love a man that was a strong republican. so if I am ever fortunate enough to get a husband I want him to be a Democrat for we would never "hitch" if he wasn't. enough about this. Papa's wheat looks real well farmers will be harvesting in a week or two. we have plowed our corn over twice but it looks awful little. it is about as high as my finger is long now wouldn't you like to live in Tenn you could have such early roasting ears. I will tell you one thing we can have Apples. the trees have a good many on them but we will have no other kind of fruit this year. Cousin John please excuse this writing I am so nervous I can hardly hold any pen. can't imagine what ailes me as a general thing I am not very nervous but all of us children are inclined that way. Tomie and I are less nervous than any. Write me soon and tell all about our relatives. Lou.

Locust Slant  
July 31st 1884

Dear cousin John:

Your letter of the 3 inst received several days since was as usual glad indeed to receive it & hear from any relatives in the far West. you wrote me there was another Master Brewer in your family. (? - hole in paper) wrote you had named him Johnie Tatum. we received a letter for Sister Lou from you a day or two since. you said the baby was not atoll pretty it seems strange to me to hear you acknowledge it. There are but few people who think there children ugly. I have seen some children I thought real ugly still there Parents thought them pretty. I suppose it is there love for them that hids there faults. I am a good deal that way myself when I admire any one no matter how ugly they are they don't look ugly to me, just so they have the right kind of a heart, principal, & manners, they are most sure to be admired & respected by all. What kind of a place is Texas any how? you said you were hauling your water for family use now. in the Spring every thing was about to wash away & now it is so dry you are hauling water, are you hauling it from your tank you was telling me about when I was there? & how is it holding out; I don't hardly know what would become of we Tennesse'ians if the Seasons were as irregular as your. everything would parch into snuff on these red clay hills in a few weeks. We have not been having rain enough for vegetation the last few weeks have been having some refreshing showers the past week. Tommie & I are having quite a lonely & tolerable busy time of it now. Barshie & Lou are 25 miles north of here in Grainger County tending the Springs, they have been gone most a week will stay two or three weeks longer. There has always been so many of we girls together, it seems real strange, & lonely for just two to be here. We hardly knew how to begin the work after they left as we always each of us had our part. but we have learned the art now & are getting along splendid. If the men here were like you Texas men would do the milking. I wouldnt mind the other work that is one thing I never did do but very little of & dont like to do it now. Think I will have to send word to that little fellow on the Guadalupe river that I will take

him just to get him to do that part of the work for me. think he would do it for two reasons one because he wouldn't like to see me do it & another because the Texas boy are raised to it. I have a real good joke on Pappa a short time before cousin Bill went after me I wrote home & asked him which he would rather I would do stay in Texas or come home & let my fellow come out here next fall so he could see him & before I got an answer to the letter here come cousin Bill I told them they hurried him off for fear I would take a notion to stay. If it had not been for cousin Lou & Pappa I might have now been a Texas girl. but she said right at the start what she would do if I was to have even an idea of takeing on a Texas boy, I knew what Pappa would think on the subject Therefore to keep the good will of both of them, thought it best to draw off. Tell cousin Lou ere long I will be a particular quarrelsome old Maid, & then I want her to be sure to come out here, & see the fruits of her's and Pappas works. guess when she spent a few weeks she would wish there never was an old Maid.

We had a right smart of a curiosity here this summer had a chicken hatched with four legs, its feet were perfect but two of its legs were drawn seemed to be stiff at the knee joints it couldnt walk to do much good 'twas pert & eat harty. we gave it to one of our Tenents to try to raise. I believe you had no wheat to thresh this year & you will not have the trouble of the machine, we have not threshed ours yet will I guess next week, I wish it was over with I always dread them. We have some real fine apples am fearful they will all fall before they get ripe they falling some now, the cold weather in the Spring injured them. Aske Uncle Albert what has become of the Coon Creekirs we used to laugh so much about? Give my best love to him & aunt Margarette tell them I would love so much to see them, & never no never will I forget them. Best love to all. Write to your Cousin.

Dear Cousin Lou:

I know you are giving me particular fits about now. but cousin please pardon me this time I have been from home a month & have gotten behind with my correspondence some what. I have been visiting Drnsie, Sallie, & Reese. they all live kinder in a row, so when you visit one, you have to all. I had a real nice time went to a Sunday School Convention, & the close of a School while at Drnsies Sallie was sick all the time I was at her house she has such bad health I feel so sorry for her. they live in Grainger Co now, about one mile from Drnsies. they have a fine farm, & are finishing up a nice house it has ten (10) rooms & will be a beautiful house if they ever finish it. now if it was just paid for, & all belonged to Sallie & John, it would be so nice, but two more of the Galbraith's are eaqul pardners in it. Mary & I went to a picnic at May Spring the 18th of this month it was right near Dr Tates they played croquet & talked for pass time. I took mine in talking, I never took any interest in croquet. they danced at the Dr's that night we stayed all night. I had a big time. made a complete "mash" wish you could see the

fellow. but don't know that you could stand a look, & the name too. it might paralyze you. Smith is the name not John though.

We all attended the close of the School at Talbotts last week, it was real entertaining Mossy Creek Commencement is next week. don't guess I'll go I have an engagement but think I will break it as I don't want to go now. they always have such large crowds there. I havn't been for several years. I reckon you are having vegetables now. our garden looks very well considering the dry weather & we have a fine Irish potato patch but we are needing rain very badly it has been a remarkably dry spring do hope we will have rain soon. Cousin Ike Cardwells daughter & her three children have come out to cousin Mags to stay this summer for her health, she is a young widow, I suppose they have come havn't heard from up there since they were expecting them. Cousin Bill Tate, Comfort, & cousin Jane Odel, all went to Alabama last week to see cousin Tenn & she came back with them so they are all at cousin Comforts now having a good time cousin Jane lived in Va but is down on a visit she is in very bad health. you wont know anything about all of these but maybe it will interest Aunt M -- Will have to close, Write soon. please don't do like I did, Love to all.

every day until it snowed and got so cold. the ground is covered all over with snow it looks so pretty it is the deepest one we have had. Cousin Lou for goodness sake try and keep Mary from tanning any worse than she is. don't think I would like Texas very much if it makes you so awful dark. I am so glad cousin John has had his picture taken and give Mary one. I'm so anxious to see him I dreamed last night I saw him. thought he looked like Charlie Broyles. ask Mary if he does. I thought you were all out here. I could see you so plain dressing your children I wish it had not been a dream. I must stop hope you will excuse pencil writing. the ink was frozen this morning and I couldn't half write with it now cousin write soon and a long, long letter. Much love to all. Hope Aunt Tom is well by now. Hastily, Lou.



## Anton Blomeke Remembers

Submitted by Nancy Huber Wilson, Dripping Springs, Texas

*Anton Blomeke was my great grandfather, my mother's maternal grandfather. He settled in Austin and married Emeline Bohls. They had five children: Annie, Tony, John, Lena and my grandmother, Lillie.*

### **A Remembrance: The foundering of the German Emigrant Vessel Gerhard Hermann on Galveston Bar, January 1, 1847**

Translated from the Texas Post, Dec. 29, 1875

Events stand like milestones on the road from the cradle to the grave, and the recurring new year is to the writer of this a memento of the most terrible situation of his life, the remembrance of which could not be effaced by the past 29 years.

The vessel Gerhard Hermann left Bremen on the 24th October, 1846, with 120 immigrants for Galveston. On the last evening of said year we saw Galveston through the misty atmosphere of an approaching norther. A pilot, trying to meet us, had to return on account of increasing darkness. During the new year's night, the norther increased to a hurricane and our vessel foundered opposite Virginia Point. In vain thundered our cannon, the sign of distress, at dawn of the first day of 1847. This new year brought to us the prospect of certain death in the waves, in view of the land of our hope.

The vessel lay on its side. The furious breakers swept away human beings into a watery grave at every dash. Those who could climbed into the rigging, binding themselves to it. The first mate and four sailors left in the only boat and after a hard struggle reached the land. But neither from them nor from Galveston came help.

In this awful situation we remained three long days and nights. The vessel was going to pieces and of 120 human beings 54 were drowned.

Americans living at Virginia Point – thanks to those magnanimous men – at last came to our relief with a small boat. Sixty-six of the crew and passengers were landed. The women and children found open-handed, generous hospitality, in their houses, and 25 men in a barn.

The storm had subsided, and going to the beach we first found the body of our captain, and subsequently nearly all of the 54 who had perished. They, also, had reached Texas, the land of their choice – but dead; the lifeless eyes staring to heaven, they lay in the sand.

A sorry procession, we entered Galveston. Destiny has then shaped the course of every one.

If this should meet the eyes of one of the few surviving fellow-sufferers, it may serve him as a friendly greeting from A. Blomeke, Austin, December 29, 1875

The following persons still living at Galveston were saved from the wreck of the Gerhard Hermann and they reciprocate the greetings of their fellow sufferer, A. Blomeke at Austin: Fritz Coers, W. Brohn, Mrs. Muller, Mrs. Krohn.

## Some Memorable Austin People

By Lorrie Henderson, Austin, Texas

Nondescript shirt and pants, a blue-gray cardigan sweater, and under one arm, his bundle of Austin daily papers, often the other hand held up, holding one. That's how I remember Gordon Knight on the Drag every weekday morning, and usually Saturday as well.

A perusal of the "dead files" of the Austin American Statesman for a researcher, I'm quite sure, would yield at least one, and very probably more, articles about him. I recall that he was featured in the newspaper as a person chosen to represent the newspaper in England for either the coronation, or the wedding, of Queen Elizabeth II. Gordon was not given to boasting or lying, by reputation, and I'm sure it's no exaggeration that he did go to England. Everyone was proud of him for having done that.

I don't know anything for sure about Gordon's family; I can only repeat what was said at the time. He was well brought up by a somewhat well-to-do family in Austin, and was full of good common sense, but not able to follow and become a leader in the family business. Neither Gordon nor his family saw any disgrace in his doing what he could do best, sell newspapers, and he did it well.

It may have been in his obituary or in another article, perhaps in the Statesman, or perhaps the UT newspaper, but if I'm not mistaken, mention was made of his loaning a few deserving students money so that they could continue their studies at UT Austin. I do not ever remember anyone being unkind to him, robbing him or injuring him on purpose at any time.

Gordon sold his papers not just on the street, but he carried them into Brackenridge Hospital, and perhaps old Seton and old St. David's, north and west of the Drag, respectively. Having been at Brackenridge a few times in the late 40s and early 50s, and maybe once or twice in the middle 60s, I remember him personally being there, politely knocking on the door, asking if I wanted to buy a paper. (Those were lean times, and I never did so.)

I'm glad of having been reminded of Gordon; he's a pleasant memory of my times in the 40s and again in the 60s, when I was attending UT Austin.

I also have memories of "The Princess" or "Bicycle Annie." When I was first attending UT Austin (on the GI Bill, between having the two children), she was a fixture (if one could call someone almost always on the move on her bike) on the Drag and all around town, north and south. She often sat in the Union Building lounge to rest a little. One day in the 60s, when I was again attending, I saw her there. She asked me why I was smiling at her, and I replied that I remembered her from that earlier time. She whipped out her pad and pencil and did a brief interview about my family and experience at UT, "to be published in her newspaper, to be printed on her press in her basement." I never remember seeing a copy, unless she showed me one then. My friend Mary Sampson and her husband Sid had the Overhead Door Company on South Congress. She said that periodically the Princess would stop in to "sell advertising in her newspaper." She could get rather abrasive to anyone at the businesses if they refused, so they always gave her a few dollars. Mary told me she never saw a copy of her paper, but was always promised one for a week or so hence. They belonged to the same church and often saw her there.

Zelma O'Riley was called the Princess as a sort of mockery as she claimed to have some Indian blood, and, since most people making that claim seem to also add that their ancestor was a chief, people just added that embellishment.

As with Gordon Knight, a perusal of the old newspapers of the time would yield mention of "Annie." She was also on the TV or radio news a time or two, when she was injured in a collision with her bike and refused to tell police her address. She was reputed to live in a house on the north Drag at the time.

There may have been other colorful people around the town at the time, but probably none more widely known than these two people.

## In Search of Dead Relatives: The Oakwood Cemetery Burial Ledgers

Oakwood Cemetery, established in 1839, is Austin's oldest city of the dead. Here ornate monuments jut into the sky displaying ancient symbols whose meanings have long ago been lost on the living. Here the mother, the father, the child, the Colored, the Mexican, the Jew, the pauper, and even the stranger have a resting place. And if you've been searching for that elusive dead relative whom you believe inhabits this city, but haven't had any luck, your search has just gotten easier.

The Austin History Center now has in its collection five ledgers documenting thousands of burials in the city's oldest cemetery, Oakwood. These massive books span two centuries and beckon researchers with tidbits of information about Austin's early citizens – when they lived, how they died and other cogent remarks.

Each ledger contains one-line entries about the long-ago-departed – information that may not be found anywhere else. You might ask, "What's the big deal?" since the AHC has always made available the microfiche of burials for all the city-owned cemeteries. However, these ledgers contain rich and expansive information not found on the microfiche. For example, ledger page headings include such information as the "Month and Date," "Date Recorded," "Name," "Age," "Sex," "Color," "Nativity," "Disease," "Attending Physician," "Where Buried," "By Whom Buried-Friends/City/County" and "Remarks." Whereas the information included on the microfiche is limited to "Cemetery Code," "Sequence No.," "Name," "Cemetery," "Section," "Lot" and "Space."

While these ledger headings seem straightforward, several entries contain extra information. Under the heading of "Disease," for example, you may find that diseases weren't the only way to enter into the city of the dead. Besides death by such common maladies as "scrofula" or "dropsy," early Austinites met untimely deaths as a result of a "fall from horse," "fall from wagon," "killed himself," "poisoned himself," "gunshot wound," "pistol shot by his own hand" or "drown by bathing." If the coroner's name appeared under the "Attending Physician" heading, you can assume that the deceased died under questionable circumstances or was murdered. Such information may suggest to the researcher other documents in the archive that may yield even more details about the person's death; documents such as newspaper articles, coroner's reports or police records, etc.

Under the heading "Remarks," the sexton recorded other types of useful information. For example, he indicated how long the deceased lived in the city, county or state. He indicated the community where the deceased lived, if not Austin. It is in these entries from the 1870s where you begin to see the emergence of the first freedman's communities, early settlements such as Clarksville, Mason Town, Wheatville and the short-lived Horst Pasture.

The Eanes Burial Ledger is really the first of six city cemetery ledgers now in the care of the Austin History Center. However, it is not numbered in sequence with the other five since it existed in the collection prior to the donation of the other five. City sexton Alexander Eanes logged the entries in this, the smallest of these ledger books, documenting burials as early as 1859 and as late as 1866. The Eanes Ledger and the next three ledgers document burials at Oakwood Cemetery only. Unlike the ledgers that follow, there are no headings to guide the eyes



through the old and difficult-to-interpret handwriting, which at times is nothing more than jottings that include date of burial, name of deceased, cause of death, age and nativity. Fortunately for the researcher, the handwriting in this book has been deciphered and an index created to make finding that certain someone easier. It is clear that this early format predates the uniformed-lined-columned ledgers with numbered pages used in later years.

Ledgers 1 through 3 continue chronologically from the point where the Eanes Ledger leaves off. Entries begin with July 1866 and end with December 1924, inclusive. The impeccable penmanship in these books contain headings for the Date-Month/Day, Name, Age, Sex, Color, Nativity, Disease, Physician, Where Buried, By Whom Buried-Friends/City/County and Remarks. These ledgers are not indexed.

Ledger 4, which includes an index as well as a record of deaths, lists burials for Oakwood Annex beginning in 1914 and ending in 1936. Ledger 5 contains entries for all the city cemeteries including Oakwood Cemetery. By June of 1951, this book no longer indicates "nativity or disease" and in September of 1973, the entries discontinue indications for "Attending Physician."

Like so many cities of the living, Oakwood Cemetery was also segregated at one point in time – the Jew, the Mexican, the pauper, the stranger and the Colored all had their own section in the cemetery. Often, locals remark that there are no Blacks buried at Oakwood Cemetery. On the contrary, according to the ledgers, there are literally thousands of African-Americans buried in Oakwood; however, their grave markers no doubt wasted away decades ago.

As a complement to the burial ledgers, the Austin History Center also makes available to researchers the Oakwood Cemetery maps. These wonderful documents represent the four sections of the Cemetery and the Annex, indicating who is buried where. These maps open the Oakwood Cemetery grounds to the public even when the gates are closed. Anyone can still conduct their research in the relative comfort of the Austin History Center using the pathfinders to the resources concerning the Oakwood Cemetery created by the Austin History Center staff. This handout guides the researcher to other sources such as books, architectural drawings and newspaper clippings about Oakwood in addition to the Burial Ledgers.

As much as the public is welcome to view all of the materials at the Austin History Center, some of the materials including the ledgers, are very fragile from use and handling over many years. To ensure that they continue to be of use to future generations of researchers, the Austin History Center has enlisted help from members of the Austin Genealogical Society. Kay Boyd, Nancy Wilson and others from the Society have committed to the laborious task of entering the information into a database. Eventually, researchers will be able to access the database from remote locations, such as your home or office.

In the case of many of the inhabitants of Oakwood Cemetery, the entries in these ledgers and the headstones that mark their graves are all that exist to document that they ever lived – a lifetime, however short or long, relegated to a measured rectangle and a one-line entry in a sexton's journal. "The grave-yard," one 19th century Austinite wrote, "is a record, an epitome of history," and preserving the Oakwood Cemetery Ledgers is one way the Austin History Center can honor that history.

## Sexton Ledger: 1859 to 1866

### Austin Cemetery Record of Mr. A. Eanes

The above title is written on the front and back of an apparently homemade book at the Austin History Center. The pages are of a heavy gray paper, which have survived years of existence in excellent condition.

The entries begin Oct. 3, 1859, and continue until May 6, 1866. There is one period when the entries were made by undertakers Hopkins and Millican instead of by Mr. Eanes, the sexton. Not all of the deaths that Mr. Eanes recorded are in the Mortality Schedule for 1860. The City Cemetery was later called Oakwood and the State Cemetery is at a different location. Mr. Eanes' spelling of names is not always consistent or correct, but is rather interesting. Also, his use of terms of possession are sometimes puzzling, but can usually be interpreted. The spelling in this record is not always as we spell today. Mr. Eanes quite often spelled phonetically.

# Index to naturalization records to 1906 in Travis County, Texas

Recorded by Kay Dunlap Boyd, Austin, AGS member

This index began in the November 2002 issue, which ran names Juan Aballos through Alfred Boles. The March 2003 issue ran names Carl O. Bollman through Phillipp Doppenschitt, June's names ran from Ramon Dorado to Hugo Erzkus and September's names ran from Faustina Escobar to Marcallino Gamez. Between 4,000 and 5,000 names are on this complete index, which was entered from a microfilm copy of the WPA Index at the Austin Public Library's Austin History Center. The microfilm is available at Austin History Center and through LDS Family History Centers. Complete recorded paper copies are on file at Austin History Center and at Texas State Library Genealogy Collection. The entire file has been entered electronically and will soon be at [www.austintxgensoc.org](http://www.austintxgensoc.org).

The microfilm record contains this statement:

"Complete Index to Naturalization Records of Travis County, prepared by the State Wide Records Project of the WPA, sponsored by the Department of Justice through the Naturalization and Immigration division of the Federal Government. It took several months to compile this record by a staff of workers under the direction of Mr. E.C. Duke, District Supervisor (without cost to Travis County). This is a complete record of naturalization proceedings in the Probate, County and District Court of Travis County; at the time the County was organized, either of the three courts handled naturalization matters. Since 1906, all such matters have been handled by the U.S. District Courts. The preparation of this record was in line with a general program over the entire Country, and the copy of the record was given the District Clerk's Office for the cooperation it gave the Staff that worked here on the project.

"Requests for information in regard to Naturalization Records have been numerous recently, due to Social Security Laws, Old Age Assistance Benefits and war conditions requiring the establishment of citizenship."

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# The Austin Genealogical Society

## General Information

**PURPOSE** Austin Genealogical Society was organized in 1960 as a not-for-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas. Its purposes are to collect and preserve genealogical and historical information about the people of Texas, particularly pertaining to the City of Austin and to Travis and surrounding counties; to instruct and assist members in genealogical research; and to publish public and private records of genealogical interest. In addition, the AGS supports the Genealogical Collection, Texas State Library by donations of books and other genealogical material. Gifts and bequests to AGS are tax-deductible to the full extent permitted by law.

**MEMBERSHIP** is open to all upon payment of annual dues. Classes: Individual: \$20; Family (two in the same household): \$30; Patron of AGS: \$100; Lifetime: \$500 (\$300 if over age 65). All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. **After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year**, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

**DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS** are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterlies are supplied only if available). **MEETINGS** of the general membership begin at 7:30 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month except August and December. Members are encouraged to come as early as 6:30 to socialize with each other. Meeting Place: **Highland Park Baptist Church, 5206 Balcones Dr.** Take Northland (RR 2222) exit off Loop1 (Mopac). Go west one block to Balcones Dr., then left 1½ blocks. The church and parking lot are on right. Visitors are always welcome. The Board of Directors meets at 6:15 in a separate room.

**BOOK REVIEW POLICY** Books on subjects of interest to genealogists will be reviewed, but cannot be reviewed in AGS Quarterly on the basis of advertising alone. Review copies received by the Quarterly Editor at 3310 Hancock Dr., Austin, Texas 78731, by the first of February, May, August or October will be reviewed in the next Quarterly, space permitting. Review books are donated to the Texas State Library's Genealogy Collection.

**CHECK RETURN POLICY** Members and other payees must pay AGS the cost of any returned check (currently \$5) over and above the charge their bank may impose.

**AGS QUARTERLY** is issued about the middle of March, June, September and November. Contributions are welcome, subject to editing for style and length. Contributor is completely responsible for accuracy and any copyright infringement. AGS assumes no responsibility for content of submitted material. See inside front cover for address.

**ANCESTOR LISTING PAGES** for the June issue of Quarterly must reach the Editor at 3310 Hancock Dr., Austin, Texas 78731, or [alanasuzy@earthlink.net](mailto:alanasuzy@earthlink.net) by **May 10**. They must be **BLACK** and **LEGIBLE**, whether typed, hand-written, computer-printed or in superior calligraphy. Months must be **SPELLED** or abbreviated, not in figures. **DATES SHOULD BE SHOWN** in accepted genealogical style, that is, **DAY, MONTH, COMPLETE YEAR**. Leave 1-inch margins at both sides and at top and bottom, and hand-number pages on the back of each page. Carefully check horizontal pages (reading in the 11-inch direction). Otherwise, the Editor has to position some pages upside down to prevent loss of data in the stapling-punching process. **NO 8½ x14 sheets**, please. You may submit lineage or family group charts, ahnentafels, narratives, cemetery inscriptions, Bible records, census data, queries, or a combination of material, just so it is not under copyright. **BE SURE** to proofread your material for accuracy and clarity so we will not publish faulty or incorrect data. Consult a recent June AGS Quarterly for suggestions. Remember that reproductions are dimmer than originals so try to provide good quality originals.

Remember, individual membership secures two facing pages, and family or higher membership allows you four pages.
