A conference for the nation's genealogists is coming to Austin Sept. 8 -11 at the Austin Convention Center with all of the above. If you've never been to a national conference, you will be in for a treat – each of the four days. A variety of 135 lecture sessions, geared to all levels, presented by 70 different speakers, will leave you scratching your head over which ones to hear "live."

You will recognize the names of many of the nationally known speakers as authors of books and articles that are part of your research tools. Many have either never spoken in this area or were here long ago. There are a number of Texas presenters and lecturers who are experts in their field. And AGS is well represented by our own member lecturers, AGS president Charles Locklin, board member Peter Maxson and SIG member Bob Casey, as well as Round Rock genealogy librarian Elizabeth Johnston.

AGS is sponsoring one of the 13 luncheons offered over the four days. On Friday, Sept. 10, AGS presents Janice Woods Windle, author of "True Women," "True Women Cookbook," "Hill Country" and "Will's War" – all based on her own family stories and set in the Texas Hill Country. Her lecture might inspire you to begin writing as you listen to "Every Story Can Become a Book – Recognizing Opportunities for Telling Family Stories."

As speaker for the opening session on Thursday, Sept. 9, Austin's own Father of Texas Broadcasting, Cactus Pryor, will present "Tales of Texas," with excerpts from his one-man show about Texas author J. Frank Dobie. He will also relate stories of entertaining President Lyndon B. Johnson at the Texas White House. Cactus has been in radio broadcasting for 59 years and can still be heard weekdays on KLBJ-AM radio.

All lectures and speakers are detailed in the 16-page Program and Registration Brochure that may be in your hands by the time you receive this Quarterly. Look over the wide range of topics and numerous speakers as well as the sponsored luncheons, each with a different speaker. The registration fee for all four days of lectures is \$159. Luncheons are reasonably priced at \$19, \$20 and \$23, and the banquet is \$27.

Charlie Lowe, volunteer committee chair, and Jan Ashford, assistant, are signing up volunteers to help with the many tasks involved with a conference of 1,000+ attendees. Volunteer details and sign-up information can be found at the FGS web page, www.fgs.org.

Also at the FGS web site, is the growing list of exhibitors. At the conference, you will find vendors and exhibits with almost every conceivable genealogy idea and product as well as booksignings and many product demonstrations. While at the web site, sign up to receive the free e-mail newsletter, which will provide you with conference updates and news.

So, mark your calendars, put in for days off work and plan to attend the best national conference ever held in Texas, and the first one held in Austin.

Census Microfilm Acquisition Project

Austin Genealogical Society is happy to announce that U.S. Census microfilm rolls of individual counties for the 1920 and 1930 census are now being ordered and placed at the Texas State Library Genealogy Collection. The AGS Census Microfilm Acquisition Project began in August 2002. With donations totaling \$3,450.20 so far, AGS has purchased microfilm of six complete states of 1920 and 1930 census and 16 microfilm rolls of specifically requested counties.

TSL had census microfilm for several states and some miscellaneous counties before AGS began its project. A complete list of all 1920 and 1930 U.S. Census microfilm in the Genealogy Collection is listed below.

Donations of any amount towards the purchase of census microfilm are appreciated. With a donation of \$34, the cost of one roll of microfilm, you may designate the bookplate text for "Donated by" and "In Memory of" that is applied to the microfilm box. With a \$34 donation, a specific county can be requested. Some counties are on more than one roll of film; if you know the enumeration district, the specific roll with that district can be identified.

Since AGS is a 301c 3 Tax Exempt Corporation registered in Texas, donations may be tax deductible. Donor forms are available at the AGS web site and the Texas State Library or send your name, address, phone and e-mail with your check, payable to Austin Genealogical Society, P.O. Pfluger Cemetery

On April 7, 1880, in a deed recorded in Vol. 50, page 545, Travis County Courthouse, Mrs. Henry Pfluger Sr. set aside nearly one acre of land for burying ground in Travis County on Wilbarger Creek. This is located on the 960 John Liese tract, which was a bounty grant given to John Liese, brother-in-law of Henry Pfluger Sr.

According to records of land grants given to veterans of the Texas Revolution, this property was received as a bounty warrant by John Liese from the Secretary of War on Dec. 19, 1837, for service from Jan. 1 to Dec. 18, 1836: warrant 1106 for 960 acres, patent 9, vol. 3, abstract 496, General Land Office file, Travis, bounty 18. There are 18 graves; one is unknown.

Boggy Creek Masonic Cemetery Austin, Travis County, Texas

The Boggy Creek Masonic Cemetery located in South Austin captures a part of the history of early pioneer families who immigrated to this area from European countries, bringing their trades, traditions and talents, while others moved from other states to settle this land in hopes of building new dreams.

Named after the creek that meanders on its south border, this early burial site was once only known as Boggy Creek Cemetery prior to the Onion Creek Masonic Lodge No. 220, A.F. & A.M. renaming it in 1917. The Boggy Creek Masonic Cemetery, also known as Masonic Cemetery, is located on Circle S Road, two blocks south of William Cannon Drive and Interstate Highway 35. The old San Antonio Road once ran southwest of its entrance, merging into South Congress. Landmarks along Circle S Road are the Pleasant Hill Public Library, Pleasant Hill Baptist Church and Commemorative Brands, Inc.

The entrance to the cemetery opens with iron gates and two stucco pillars, revealing the name, "Masonic Cemetery" at the top. The six acres, surrounded with a chain-link fence of four feet, has many towering live oak trees and cedars. These old majestic oaks have shaded the graves from the blistering Texas sun for over one hundred thirty years. Today the area is surrounded with new development of apartments and homes, but once only farmland and open fields ran up to the banks of Boggy Creek.

As one enters the Cemetery's grounds through the gates at Circle S Road, you travel back to a time of only narrow paths. The paths were designed for easy access to the gravesites for burial ceremonies, since wagons were the only means of transportation. The beginning of this cemetery was intertwined with the work of the Masons in Onion creek Lodge No. 220 and the community. Their work began early in the 1850s when a decision was first made to have a school built for the community. It served the community well by having church services on Sunday, grade school during the week and then lodge meetings in the evening. No records are available concerning its beginning other than the brief minutes of the Lodge, documenting it was to be constructed for community use early in the 1850s. But in 1859, the Lodge burned to the ground. It was later reconstructed for a school and as it stands today, serving the Onion Creek Masonic Lodge No. 220 and the Creedmoor Chapter No. 607, Order of the Eastern Star. The building was dedicated in 1964 with a Texas Historical Marker.

During winter months of early Texas, men of the community would often form wagon trains and travel to Bastrop County to work in the pine forest. Hostile Indians were still roaming in this area, which was known as a path of the Comanche. John Davis was only 23 years old when he traveled with one of the wagon trains to Bastrop County in February 1859. One night after the camp had settled down for sleep, a skunk awakened John. As he was frightened by the disturbance, he struck the animal and was sprayed with the fumes. Being alarmed, John began running through the camp. This commotion woke other campers and many of the men began to holler, "Indians!" Dick King was one of the men in the wagon train who mistakenly thought John Davis was an Indian and fatally shot him with his Winchester. John Davis died on February

13, 1859. John's family purchased two acres of land for his son to be buried near the creek. The family deeded the two acres to Onion Creek Masonic Lodge on January 10, 1876.

The oldest of all graves in the cemetery is in Section 1, which contains many unusual tombstones. There are three graves, which are enclosed with old wrought iron fencing. The first is marked Lizzie E. Ramey, born 10-11-1843, died 2-26-1890. Some graves are marked with small handmade, sandstone tombstones, while others are large and tall granite monuments, marking the families buried within the plot. There are several distinct monuments marking the graves of members of the Woodmen of the World. These stones are usually gray granite and stand five to six feet tall, with carvings of logs.

Many of veterans of the Civil War, Spanish American War, World War I and II, Vietnam and Korean conflict are buried at Masonic Cemetery. Two gravesites bear the emblem of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The first grave is Miss Eula D. Nichols, born 11-21-1866, died 6-3-1950, age 83. The second grave is Miss Elizabeth Bonner born 3-11-1879, died 8-10-1962, age 83.

Today, the cemetery has over 1,200 gravesites, with family names such as Dittmar, Slaughter, Spillmann, Thaxton and Wilson. This region of South Austin has many streets named after these families. The Texas Historical Commission granted a Texas Historical Cemetery designation in April 2001.

The Masons of Onion Creek Masonic Lodge No. 220 continue their work in researching and recording all graves. A trust fund has been established which will be used in the future for perpetual care.

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Who was D.A. Fields? Mystery man of Austin and Abingdon, Virginia

My husband's great-grandfather, Dr. John Davidson Fields, lived and practiced medicine in Manor, Travis County, Texas, from 1869 to about 1905. He died in 1925, and his wife, Mary Frances Raney Fields, died in 1947. Both are buried in the Manor Cemetery. The family plot contains the graves of various relatives whose stories we can verify, except for two. In 1988, no one in the remaining Fields and Raney families had any knowledge of who those two persons were.

One of the mystery markers, a tall, thin, old-fashioned slab with a rounded top, states simply: D.A. Fields, died June 11, 1885.

Who was D. A. Fields?

Why is he buried here with so little data on his tombstone?

The only other item we had, which might have been related, was a photograph in an album inherited by my husband's mother from her grandparents, J. D. and Mary Frances Fields. "David A. Fields" was penciled on the front of the photo and the back of the mounting card carried the legend "W.F. Oliphant - Austin Texas" with no date. The names, handwritten under most of the pictures in this small, embossed volume, meant little or nothing to us. The David pictured was a youngish man with moustache and chin whiskers, wearing a jaunty hat, but there was nothing to connect him to the grave in Manor.

My mother-in-law, Thelma Fields Johnson, a native of Sutton County, Texas, had known her grandfather, Dr. J. D. Fields, all her life. Other members of the Fields family in Sonora had vivid memories of Dr. Fields. In spite of this, only a few facts about his origin remained in the family lore.

J.D. Fields was born in Abingdon, Washington County, Virginia, in 1845. He served in the Kentucky Cavalry in the Civil War with Capt. Tom Quirk's Scouts under General John Hunt Morgan. After the war he came to Travis County. On Oct. 24, 1866, he married Mary Frances Raney, daughter of John Raney and Hibernia Vernon Raney. Mary Frances, with her parents and younger brother, William Bargrove Raney, had journeyed from Rutherford County, Tenn., to Travis County in 1859.

In 1989, my oldest daughter, Beverly Johnson Smith, and I decided to make the 1100-mile trip from Dallas to Abingdon, Virginia, to see what we could ferret out about her Fields ancestors.

What we found were charming relatives we did not know existed. In addition, to our astonishment, everywhere was abundant material directly linking our Fields family to the very earliest settlers of Southwest Virginia. Over the years, the lines of Davidson, Witten, Cecil and Patton had been researched, chronicled and documented by numerous historians. My husband was unaware that his roots lay so deeply entwined in that long-ago frontier.

One of the welcoming kin-folk, Beverly's second cousin, twice removed, Virginia Kreger Witherspoon, miraculously produced the Bible of William and Eleanor Davidson Fields, parents

of J.D. Fields, listing their marriage record and the births of all their children. Stunned, we speechlessly viewed the list of J.D.'s siblings, unknown to us until that moment. Virginia's grandmother, whom she knew well, was Alice, J.D.'s sister. Now we could place the young Alice Baldwin, who gazed so seriously out of that photo album back in Texas. On the page facing her, the bearded man with *Yours Truly, W. T. Baldwin*, in fading ink, across his chest, was her husband, Capt. William Thomas Baldwin. We never had a clue as to who they were.

We took pictures of the 8-room, two-story, brick home where J. D. grew up. It still stands in its lovely meadow, just west of Abingdon, surrounded by original outbuildings, with sparkling Spring Creek bubbling by. The townspeople referred to it as the "Baldwin Place," because Captain Baldwin and his wife, Alice, had lived there after the Civil War. No one knew that it was the old Fields homestead, Alice's childhood home, and we certainly did not convince anyone.

We discovered that William Fields was a brick mason and contractor who owned his own brick-making operation and had built many structures in Abingdon. In the 1860 industrial census, William reported that with 10 men employed to produce hand-made bricks, he had used 600,000 bricks to build five houses that year.

It was gratifying to uncover the following bit of family history. When in 1848 the county commissioners voted to erect a new courthouse, the contract was let to William Fields and a colleague, Herbert M. Ledbetter. They finished the building to everyone's satisfaction in the spring of 1850.

But we did not find D.A. Fields

Another trip to Abingdon in 1991 allowed us to fit more pieces into the puzzle. I need to state here that Beverly's and my efforts, while earnest, were hardly professional, and we probably missed a lot. We were able, however, to identify J.D.'s grandparents, William and Elizabeth Lynch Fields. I shall refer to this William as William (I). He, too, was a brick mason and contractor. In January 1829, he unexpectedly died at age 48, leaving Elizabeth with seven living children and one yet unborn. We confirmed the names and ages of all the children from census schedules and deed records.

William, J.D.'s father, was 18 years old when William (I) died. It appears that he knew the brick-laying trade well and he and his mother managed to support the family. We did not find out if William (I) already owned the brick-making yard before his death, or if William acquired it later. Either way, Elizabeth's home was always full of young, live-in, apprentice bricklayers.

It is interesting to note that all of the sons of William (I) and Elizabeth were well grounded in the brick mason's trade. Some went on to other occupations, but, had it ever been necessary, all could have fallen back on this skill, so useful in the exploding growth of the westward expansion of the United States.

We learned that the child born after the death of William (I) was named David A. Fields. Since no other D.A. Fields fitting the time frame had surfaced, we were confident this was the D.A. Fields we sought. Our task then was to prove that the final resting place of this Abingdonborn David Fields was the cemetery in Manor, Travis County, Texas.

David's Story

Immersed from birth as he was in the brick mason's world of the Fields family, David probably absorbed the concept of bricklaying before he could walk. With five older brothers to emulate,

he would have been well taught. In 1850, at age 21, working as a bricklayer, he was still living at home in Abingdon with his mother, brother Jacob, sister Sarah, and the ever-present apprentices. In 1859, he signed a deed establishing his residence as Washington County, Virginia.

David was not enumerated in the 1860 Washington County, Virginia, census but his military records show he enlisted in the 1st Regiment Virginia Cavalry as a private in 1861. His unit, Co. D (2nd), was made up of the already established militia known as the Washington County Mounted Rifles. The 1st VA Cavalry participated in more than 200 battles and skirmishes and was one of the most famous Confederate cavalry regiments.

Also in Co. D (2nd) were David's nephew, Charles B. Fields, older brother of J.D. Fields, and Thomas C. Davidson, the younger brother of Charles and J.D.'s mother, Eleanor Davidson Fields. Thomas died near Richmond in July 1862. Charles, although wounded at Todd's Tavern at Spottsylvania Courthouse in 1864, made it through the war and surrendered at Appomattox. David's brother, Jacob Fields, was in Co. D (2nd), but was absent on sick leave in Abingdon from March 1862 until his death there from consumption (tuberculosis) in July 1863. Another relative in Co. D (2nd) was Jeremiah (Jerry) Rush, husband of Mary Rebecca Davidson, younger sister of Eleanor Davidson Fields and Thomas C. Davidson.

Wounded at Dover's Mill near Aldie, Loudoun County, Virginia, on June 17, 1863, David missed the slaughter at Gettysburg 14 days later. Returning to Co. D (2nd) in the early spring of 1864, he was promoted to sergeant. The 1st Virginia Cavalry was with General Jubal Early's Shenandoah Campaign in the fall of 1864. From Sept. 19 to 22, Early's forces suffered the bloody defeats of Third Winchester and the Battle of Fisher's Hill at the hands of General Philip Sheridan. David was captured at nearby Port Republic, Virginia, on Sept. 27, 1864, and sent to Point Lookout, Maryland. This marshy, disease-infested horror located on Chesapeake Bay and the mouth of the Potomac River, was the largest Union prison camp. During its 22-month existence, 14,000 prisoners died. David survived there for 8 months until he was released on June 12, 1865, after signing the oath of allegiance to the United States. At that time his residence was recorded as Washington County, Virginia, and his personal description as 5 ft. 6½ in. with fair complexion, dark brown hair and blue eyes. One has to wonder what the state of his health was as he finally headed home.

David returned to Abingdon and his presence there from 1866 to 1868 is known due to the following circumstances:

On Dec. 15, 1864, Confederate and Union forces skirmished in the city of Abingdon in what is called "Stoneman's Raid." The unfortunate aftermath of this encounter left the heart of the business district, including the courthouse built by William Fields in 1848, totally destroyed by a disastrous, deliberately set fire.

In spite of the perilous state of its finances at the close of the war, the county, in June 1866, voted to erect a splendid new courthouse. For this ambitious undertaking, contracts were let to seven contractors for the various types of work needed. David Fields and his older brother, James Fields, were commissioned for the brickwork and "plastering." This handsome structure was completed in November 1868, and still proudly serves Washington County in 2003.

The 1870 and 1880 censuses revealed no trace of David in Virginia or Texas or in other states with 1870 and 1880 census indices.

New Clues about David

We were fortunate that, by this time, other Fields researchers were carefully monitoring our quest for David A. Fields. Please remember, this was before Internet access or even facsimile

transmission. Hand-written letters (for those of us who could not type) and microfilm were the names of the game. One kind soul helpfully provided a printout from microfilm of the Abingdon "Virginian." Reproduced here is the part that renewed our flagging energy in this project.

Letter from Texas

From The Virgninia, Abingdon, Friday, April 12,1872

We made the following extract from a private letter from a friend in Texas because we believe it will be of interest to many of our subscribers who have relatives and friends in Austin and vicinity: "Our old friend David Fields is as busy as a bee laying brick and making from ten to twenty dollars per day."

Having placed the Abingdon David Fields in Austin, Texas, in 1872, we finally did what we should have done early on: appealed to the Texas State Library and Archives. Our request was for any reference to a David Fields who died June 11, 1885. Their prompt reply, consisting of a newspaper column copied from microfilm, answered our original questions: Who is D.A. Fields? Why is he buried at Manor Cemetery in the family plot of Dr. J. D. Fields?

Struck Down Death of a Bricklayer from Sunstroke

From the Daily Democratic Statesman, Austin, Texas, June 12,1885

Yesterday afternoon, about 4 o'clock David Fields, a workman employed in laying brick on the Driskill hotel, was observed to fall to the ground while engaged in his work. A number of his fellows went to his assistance and on reaching him at once came to the conclusion that he had received a sunstroke. Officer Wm. Howe took him from Morley's drug store to the city hospital, where he died about 8 o'clock at night. Everything was done to relieve him, but in vain.

Deceased was a hard working and well-liked man, a brick mason by trade and an uncle of Dr. Fields of Manor, who was with him at the last. He was well known in Austin and highly respected for his many fine qualities. He was about fifty years of age and a bachelor.

One last loose end to tie up: The Austin History Center, a division of the Austin Public Library, recently forwarded to us information from their files of Austin photographers. In a list compiled by David Haynes, Institute of Texan Cultures, William Oliphant was a photographer in Austin from 1866 to 1879. Thus the David A. Fields of the grave in Manor Cemetery was in the right place at the right time to have been photographed by William Oliphant and for the copy to be made for the album of his nephew, Dr. J.D. Fields.

A Front Page Wedding: The Mount Vernon (lowa) Record, April 2, 1919

Married **Bair - Foster**

The W.H. Bair and W.H. Foster families, two well known and highly respected families were closely united by the marriage of Miss Mae Rosetta Bair and Floyd Percy Foster, Wednesday, March 26, at 5 o'clock in the town residence of the bride's parents, 615 North Seventh Street. Dr. W.C. Keeler officiated using the ring service. The whole affair was a very pretty home wedding.

The ceremony was performed beneath an artistic arch which spanned the doorway between the dining and the living rooms, the lattice work being entwined with sprays of arborvita with beautiful, large deep pink rosebuds distributed effectively here and there, an appropriate white wedding bell being suspended from the center.

Preceding the ceremony, Miss Laura Waters of Marengo, accompanied by Fred Foster at the piano and Miss Eleanor Current in a violin obligato, sang "I Love You Truly," and "Fairest in His Garden, God Gave Me You." Miss Waters then played the Wedding March as the wedding party descended the stairs which had been decorated with pink and white ribbons with a ribbon gateway presided over by the groom's sister, Miss Ruth, who opened the gateway through which Miss Waneta Keve and Fred Foster, brother of the groom, first passed, stepping aside to let the bride and groom followed by Dr. Keeler pass to the appointed place for the ceremony.

The bride wore a wedding gown of white georgette and carried a bouquet of American Beauty roses; the bride's maid wore a dainty white voile and she also carried American Beauty roses.

After congratulations, the company of thirty four were served, from one large and six small tables on which the color scheme of green and white and pink was continued, to a delicious five course dinner by the Misses Lucia Fordyce and Edna Windenberg as caterers, assisted by the Misses Elva Fordyce, Ruth Bair and Julia Field as waitresses.

The display of numerous well-chosen gifts indicated the high favor in which the young couple are held by their friends and relatives. After dinner the company lingered putting in the time with the newly married young couple until they started for the 10:20 car for Cedar Rapids, returning the next evening.

Mrs. Foster left her junior year in college to take up this program for the rest of her life. She has majored in Domestic Science while in Cornell and with her training in school, in her home, in church activities where she has assumed definite responsibilities, and her excellent health and fine spirit, she is fitted to become an ideal helpmate for her young husband.

Mr. Foster was a graduate of High School two years ago and has been serving in the navy since early in 1917, in which service he ranked well. He passed through some of the most notable activities of our navy during the present war. He has been known as an industrious, trustworthy, ambitious young man of clean habits.

The young couple have already taken up their work on the W.H. Bair farm south of town, which Mr. Foster has rented. Their at home card gives April 10 as the date after which they will receive their friends.

Out of town guests were Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Barrett, Mr. and Mrs. J.V. Lindsey of Cedar Falls, Mr. and Mrs. E. Heuer of Cedar Rapids, Mrs. E.H. Hudnutt of Grinnell, Mr. and Mrs. Toland of Ruthven, Mrs. N.L. Waters and daughter of Marengo, and Miss Ruth Bair of Oskaloosa.

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Elijah Marchbanks: A Southern Stalwart

Prologue

I've been intrigued and fascinated with Elijah and his family since first reading about him in the Marchbanks Family History as dictated by Josiah Marchbanks, my great-great grandfather, to Harold D. Marchbanks, my great-great uncle, prior to the 1861 start of the Civil War.

Boling Feltz Marchbanks, my maternal great-grandfather, copied the above history during the 1920s stating, "I shall undertake to copy it as it is and, perhaps, without any comments or suggestions."

Here, then, is my story about Elijah Marchbanks, my maternal great-great uncle.

From Tennessee to Alabama to Mississippi

Elijah Marchbanks came out of North Central Tennessee, just a few miles south of the Kentucky state line, into the fertile farmlands of northern Alabama and northern Mississippi.

Elijah was born October 31, 1797 in Tennessee, probably in Overton County: the first son of Jennie Jane Young and William Marchbanks Jr. William's birthplace was South Carolina, probably the Pendleton District (Laurens County). Elijah had four brothers and three sisters. Larger families were commonplace in these earlier times, at least partially, as one way of having enough folks to help on the family homestead or farm.

By the time he was 27 years old, Elijah had relocated to Alabama where he married Mary Adeline Bankhead of Marion County in about 1824. Mary Adeline was born in Union District, South Carolina, in about 1802: one of eight children born to Jane Greer and George Bankhead who arrived in Marion County in 1820. (1)

The Bankheads, incidentally, became a prominent Alabama family. George was the grandfather of U. S. Senator John Hollis Bankhead. William B. Bankhead, Speaker of the House of Representatives and Talullah Bankhead, a well-known Hollywood movie actress in the 1940s and 1950s, were also descendants of this family. (2)

Some confusion exists about the names of the children of Mary Adeline and Elijah. One source lists them as Mary Ann, Sarah Angeline, Elvira (Sina?), James, Burton, Bailey, Jane Lethia (Lithia?). (3) A different source, however, identifies these children as William, James, Frances, Martha, Margaret. (4)

It should be noted in this narrative at this time that Lamar County, Alabama, was newly minted in February 1867 from parts of the counties of Marion, Fayette and Pickens (it was originally called Jones County before being renamed as Lamar County in 1877). (5)

Elijah, like his Bankhead relatives, was active in Alabama politics. He was a member of the state House of Representatives in 1840-1841 before serving in the Alabama Senate 1843-1846. (6)

At some time between 1842 and 1849, Elijah, Mary Adeline and their family moved just west across the Alabama state line to Monroe County, Mississippi, as the 1850 Census for Monroe County enumerates them as Elijah, 53 and a farmer; Mary A., 48; William, 19; James, 18; Frances, 15; Martha, 13: and Margaret, 11. All the children are listed as born in Alabama. (7)

This Marchbanks clan, now Mississippians, established their new home on The Wolf Road at a site then identified as "The Walnut Tree." (8)

The Marchbanks Family History relates that Mary Adeline and Elijah endured a horrible tragedy when most of their children died during a malaria outbreak in Monroe County. The family history further states that Elijah and Mary Adeline, as a result of this catastrophe, abandoned their home at "The Walnut Tree" site and moved about 1.5 miles up The Wolf Road where they built a second home. (9)

The only child known to have survived this family disaster was their daughter, Mary Ann. (9) William, however, must have also survived this 1853 malaria outbreak as he prepared a last will and testament dated July 20, 1861. William's will, in addition to giving all his land (280 acres approx.) and all other possessions to Elijah and Mary Adeline, named Elijah as executor. (10)

Further evidence that more than one of Mary Adeline and Elijah's children may have outlived this malaria onslaught is the statement in the Marchbanks Family History that Elijah gave each of his children "large numbers of Negroes when they married."

Elijah, in addition to his political service, was a very successful farmer. While still residing in Alabama, he farmed about 80 acres – and likely almost a section – of land. (11) After migrating to Monroe County, Mississippi, Elijah farmed about 360 acres of land. (12). His agricultural accomplishments resulted in the Marchbanks Family History describing him as "wealthy."

Elijah continued to live in his second home on The Wolf Road in Monroe County until his death. While a search has yet to discover his will, legal documents filed re: Mary Adeline's estate state that Elijah died on or about December 16, 1867. (13) Mary Adeline, presumably, also resided in their second home until her death in about September 1877. (14)

The appraisers report of Mary Adeline's estate listed a wide assortment of household furnishings, none of which was individually valued at more than \$20 each. The most valuable entry was \$160 for the cotton crop "now growing." The second most valuable item – and the one most amusing to me, but one that also underscores the value of livestock in a farming operation – "One Mule @ \$25." This lone mule was worth more than any of Mary Adeline's household goods.

Elijah and Mary Adeline, along with their children who died in the malaria epidemic, are buried in the Marchbanks Cemetery located one mile south of Cockerham Bridge on Wolf Road, East Buttahatchee. They are listed as Elijah Marchbanks; M. S. Marchbanks; G. M. Marchbanks; J. R. Marchbanks; W. B. Marchbanks; F. E. Marchbanks; Margaret Marchbanks (followed by the word Sullivan). There are no dates for any of these Marchbanks family members. (15)

Photographs have been taken of the Marchbanks Cemetery. Several graves have stones only (no engravings). Two grave markers, those for the Marchbanks family members, are identified. One reads: "In Memorem. G. M. Marchbanks, J. P. Marchbanks, W. B. Marchbanks, F. E. Marchbanks, M. S. Marchbanks, Margaret S. Marchbanks." The other stone reads: "Parents. Elijah Marchbanks, Mary A. Marchbanks." (16)

The marker for the Marchbanks children is further described as "a tall marble shaft with the initials of the Marchbanks children who died about 1853 in the malaria epidemic." (17)

Elijah Marchbanks can be adequately summed up by the following quote: "In Monroe County, Mississippi, records there are references to his civic duties during the years he lived there. It is regrettable that more is not known of this fine man and his family". (18)

Hopefully, this account of Mary Adeline and Elijah Marchbanks and their family will result in there now being more awareness of these folks I am honored to have as my treasured family members.

Epilogue

While in Amory and Aberdeen, both located in Monroe County, Mississippi, during May 2003, I drove to the site of the Marchbanks Cemetery on The Wolf Road. Unfortunately, I was unable to actually see and photograph the two Marchbanks monuments because of the brambles and other undergrowth that stopped me from scaling the hill to reach the cemetery. I am, therefore, thankful to James Wise for transcribing these markers and to Lori Thornton for including them on the Monroe County, Mississippi, USGenweb site.

St. John Evangelical Lutheran Church of Manor: Serving the Lord for 125 Years

On January 6, 1878, nineteen residents of the Richland community, a small German community east of Pflugerville and north of Manor, convenanted to form the St. Johannes Evangelishche Lutheran Kirche bei Manor. For 125 years, this little congregation has brought Christian ministry and worship to the rural countryside community.

The congregation met to worship with circuit-riding ministers in the home of Mrs. Franz Schmide. Recognizing the importance of education, the first building the congregation erected was a school house where their children could be taught. This school house was used also as a sanctuary for Sunday worship.

The community was initially founded by and composed of immigrants from Prussia, (Germany), and from what was known at that time as the Evangelical Union of Prussia, a uniting of the Lutheran Church and the Reformed Church in Prussia by the King Fredrich William III. However, the congregation was served largely by Lutheran ministers for nearly a decade and a half, before becoming a part of the Evangelical Synod of North America in 1892. Its first official pastor was Rev. G. Haehnelt.

In 1884, the congregation built a single steepled sanctuary, constructed from the lumber of an old ranch house in the area. This structure would serve as the place of worship for some 40 years. The congregation established a cemetery in 1886, one that has served the congregation and community for 117 years. Six years later the first Sunday school program was organized under the leadership of Rev. J. Horstmann.

By the early 1900s, several fellowships had been formed within the congregation: the Jungend Verein (youth fellowship), the Frauenverein (women's guild) and the Men's Choir. Each of these fellowships continue as current ministries at St. John: the Saints of St. John (youth group), the St. John Women's Guild, and the Choir.

In the early '20s, a storm and tornado ripped through the community. The church building was taken off its foundations by the storm, which left it in dire need of repair. The congregation determined that a larger structure would be better suited for its growing numbers, so the old church was taken down piece by piece. The new structure incorporated some of the materials from the first structure. Completed and dedicated in 1925, the present sanctuary still houses the congregation's worship each Sunday morning.

In 1928, under the leadership of their newly arrived pastor, Rev. Julius H Kasiske, an orchestra was formed. This group of musicians would perform regular concerts in the community as well as surrounding communities for two decades. Musicians traveled to the Synod-sponsored nursing home in New Braunfels for concerts and were known to play for weddings as well.

For the first 65 years, worship, Sunday school classes and confirmations at St. John were conducted in German. With the entry of the United States into World War II, the congregation underwent difficult, yet needed, changes, fazing out the German language services and instruction. By 1955, the congregation had converted to English. Today, all services and lessons are given in English, though at the Christmastime candlelight service, one can hear the echo of ancestors in the voices of members singing "Stille Nacht" as a backdrop to the congregation's footpump

organ-accompanied "Silent Night."

In 1934, the Evangelical Synod of North American merged with the reformed Synod of North American to create the denomination known as the Evangelical and Reformed Church of America. St. John was invited to be a part of that merger but chose not to and for over two decades was known as in independent church. In 1955, upon the retirement of Rev. Kasiske, the congregation entered the Evangelical and Reformed denomination, but for only a short time. In 1957, the Evangelical and Reformed Church merged with the Congregational Christian Church to create the current denomination, the United Church of Christ in the fall of 1960.

The Congregation celebrated its 100th anniversary in 1978, a memorable occasion. The year 1978 also marked the first word of an airport to be constructed in the community near St. John. Austin voters chose not to move Mueller airport into the Richland community, preserving the rural countryside and the homes of the membership. This would be short-lived, for barely ten years later, in 1987, moving the Austin airport to a site visible from the cemetery back fence was considered. The community rallied against it, St. John serving as a central support for the efforts to dissuade such a move. Not long after the referendum was passed by Austin voters, the Untied States military determined to close Bergstrom Air Force Base. This drew the attention of the airport planners who subsequently moved their focus to the south and created Austin Bergstrom International Airport. Once again, the rural community of Richland had escaped an unwanted Airport, but for only a short time.

Barely settled from airport issues, an old nemesis returned to the Church grounds in August of 2000. A severe storm ripped off the roof of the newly remodeled parish hall and tossed up against the side of the sanctuary facility. The damage was considerable and most of the renovations that had been done the previous year had to be redone. With the help of denominational insurance and many donations from friends, including St. Elizabeth's Catholic Church in Pflugerville, the roof was replaced and the remodeling patched and repaired. But in a strange twist of deja vu, another storm hit the grounds in May 2001, tearing a quarter of the roof off the parish hall, half the roof off the old church sanctuary facility and sections off the parsonage roof. This was barely a month after damages from the earlier storm had been repaired. Once again, St. John staggered under the blow of Mother Nature but the congregation set to work to replace, repair and refurbish.

In 1999, lured by the promise of economic gain, the Pflugerville City Council entertained the construction of an airport in the Richland Community, on a location that would have put the end of the runway barely a quarter of a mile away from the church. Again the Richland Community rose to block the building of a 7,000 foot runway and airport, the little country church the gathering ground for those who worked diligently to challenge the effort. The work was successful and the airport plan was abandoned in early 2000, allowing all in the community to heave a sign of relief.

In this 125th anniversary year, the steeples of St. John still stand tall and proud against the country backdrop of grazing cattle, maize, corn fields and rolling hills. The roofs now securely on, the congregation shares and celebrates its history of faith together. The trails and challenges met head-on give the simple structures and worship a sense of integrity rooted deeply in the courage of those immigrant settlers who began that work of Christ a century and a quarter ago and in the lives and hearts of those who compose the congregation today.

On June 15, 2003, St. John celebrated that history and those roots with a worship service with guests from the South Central Conference and the Brazos Association leading the worship.

Lund (Pleasant Hill), far east Travis County, post office open between 1895 and 1906, moved to Elgin, Jos. E. Rivers first postmaster in 1895

Manchaca, southwest Travis County, in 1851 post office named Manchac House opened, William Pelham first postmaster, discontinued in 1852, post office named Manchac operated between June 1874 and May 1875, mail sent to Onion Creek from 1875 to 1881, reopened in 1881

Manda (Willow, Grassdale, Wheeler's Store, and Gregg), north of Hwy 290 and east of FM 973, Otto Bengston established post office in 1893, closed in 1902

Summerville, Allen McElroy postmaster in 1875, closed in 1877

Swinson, post office from 1896 until 1897 when the mail was sent to Manor

Teck, western part of the county, post office opened in 1900, Leonard T. Eck first postmaster, closed in 1919, reopened in 1925 and closed in 1929

Volente (Dodd City), on Lake Travis at FM 2969, post office opened in 1886, Andrew J. Stanford postmaster, mail sent to Cedar Park in 1909

Watters (Waters Park, Summers' Grove, Waters), at FM 1325 and the Southern Pacific railroad tracks, Jas. T. Potter first postmaster in 1883, closed in 1905 and mail sent to McNeil

Webberville (Webber's Prairie, Smithwicke), on FM 969 near Bastrop County, post office opened in 1846, Noah Smithwick first postmaster, closed in 1903, mail went to Manor

Index to naturalization records to 1906 in Travis County, Texas

Recorded by Kay Dunlap Boyd, Austin

This index began in the November 2002 issue, which ran names Juan Aballos through Alfred Boles. The March 2003 issue ran names Carl O. Bollman through Phillipp Doppenschitt, June's names ran from Ramon Dorado to Hugo Erzkus, September's from Faustina Escobar to Marcallino Gamez and November's from H.P.M. Gammel to Gustav Hebbe. Between 4,000 and 5,000 names are on this complete index, which was entered from a microfilm copy of the WPA Index at the Austin Public Library's Austin History Center. The microfilm is available at Austin History Center and through LDS Family History Centers. Complete recorded paper copies are on file at Austin History Center and at Texas State Library Genealogy Collection. The entire file has been entered electronically and is being loaded in parts at the Austin Genealogical Society Web site, www.AustinTxGenSoc.org.

The microfilm record contains this statement:

"Complete Index to Naturalization Records of Travis County, prepared by the State Wide Records Project of the WPA, sponsored by the Department of Justice through the Naturalization and Immigration division of the Federal Government. It took several months to compile this record by a staff of workers under the direction of Mr. E.C. Duke, District Supervisor (without cost to Travis County). This is a complete record of naturalization proceedings in the Probate, County and District Court of Travis County; at the time the County was organized, either of the three courts handled naturalization matters. Since 1906, all such matters have been handled by the U.S. District Courts. The preparation of this record was in line with a general program over the entire Country, and the copy of the record was given the District Clerk's Office for the cooperation it gave the Staff that worked here on the project.

"Requests for information in regard to Naturalization Records have been numerous recently, due to Social Security Laws, Old Age Assistance Benefits and war conditions requiring the establishment of citizenship."

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The Austin Genealogical Society General Information

PURPOSE Austin Genealogical Society was organized in 1960 as a not-for-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas. Its purposes are to collect and preserve genealogical and historical information about the people of Texas, particularly pertaining to the City of Austin and to Travis and surrounding counties; to instruct and assist members in genealogical research; and to publish public and private records of genealogical interest. In addition, the AGS supports the Genealogical Collection, Texas State Library by donations of books and other genealogical material. Gifts and bequests to AGS are tax-deductible to the full extent permitted by law.

MEMBERSHIP is open to all upon payment of annual dues. Classes: Individual: \$20; Family (two in the same household): \$30; Patron of AGS: \$100; Lifetime: \$500 (\$300 if over age 65). All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterlies are supplied only if available).
