# The Austin Genealogical Society

## General Information

**PURPOSE** Austin Genealogical Society was organized in 1960 as a not-for-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas. Its purposes are to collect and preserve genealogical and historical information about the people of Texas, particularly pertaining to the City of Austin and to Travis and surrounding counties; to instruct and assist members in genealogical research; and to publish public and private records of genealogical interest. In addition, the AGS supports the Genealogical Collection, Texas State Library by donations of books and other genealogical material. Gifts and bequests to AGS are tax-deductible to the full extent permitted by law.

**MEMBERSHIP** is open to all upon payment of annual dues. Classes: Individual: \$20; Family (two in the same household): \$30; Patron of AGS: \$100; Lifetime: \$500 (\$300 if over age 65). All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. **After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year**, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

**DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS** are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterlies are supplied only if available). Send dues payments to **AGS Treasurer, P.O. Box 1507, Austin Texas 78767-1507**.

**MEETINGS** of the general membership begin at 7 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month except August and December. Members are encouraged to come as early as 6:30 p.m. to socialize with each other. Meeting Place: **Highland Park Baptist Church, 5206 Balcones Dr.** Take Northland (RR 2222) exit off Loop1 (Mopac). Go west one block to Balcones Dr., then left 1½ blocks. The church and parking lot are on right. Visitors are always welcome. The Board of Directors meets at 6 p.m.

**ANCESTOR LISTING PAGES** for the June issue of Quarterly must reach the Editor at 3310 Hancock Dr., Austin, Texas 78731, or [alanasuzy@earthlink.net](mailto:alanasuzy@earthlink.net) by May 20, preferably by electronic means, either in an e-mail or as an attachment to an e-mail. When an electronic version is not possible, typing, handwriting or printing must be black and legible. Months must be spelled or abbreviated, not in figures. Show dates in accepted genealogical style: day, month. Leave 1-inch margins at both sides and at top and bottom, and hand-number pages on the back of each page. Carefully check horizontal pages (reading in the 11-inch direction) so that one-inch margins are on top, bottom and both sides so no information is lost in stapling. No 8½ x14 sheets, please. You may submit lineage or family group charts, ahnentafels, narratives, memoirs, letters, cemetery inscriptions, Bible records, census data, queries or a combination of material, just so it is not under copyright. Proofread your material for accuracy and clarity so we will not publish faulty or incorrect data. Consult a recent June AGS Quarterly for suggestions.

Remember, individual membership secures two facing pages, and family or higher membership allows you four pages.

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## Happy Hunting Ground

**FOSTER/SHEPHARD** My great-great grandfather was **GEORGE FOSTER**, who married **MARY SHEPHARD** 12 Jan 1825, daughter of **WILLIAM SHEPHARD**, b. in April and June of 1802 respectively, in Williams Co., Ohio. Of their 7 children, the two eldest died in infancy; both, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> were b. in Williams Co., OH. The surviving children were **BOLSER BAUMGARDNER**, b. 1833; **RUTHWIN FLOYD**, b. 1835; John McKinney, b. 1839 (my great-grandfather, who m. **SARAH SAVANNAH SIGAS**); **DIANTHA JANE**, b. 1881, m. **JOHN FISHER**; and **LEANTHA DULCENY**, b. 1844, m. **WILLIAM FARRIS**. John was b. in Gallia Co., OH; Dianta and Leantha were b. in St. Joseph Co., Michigan. George's mother outlived his father, **LUKE FOSTER**, and m. a **MR. BAUMGARDNER** (note the name both places), and they had 4 children: **REBECCA**, **JACOB**, **PETER** and **BOLSER BAUMGARDNER**.

My questions are where and when was George's father, **LUKE FOSTER** b., m. and d? Who were his parents and where from? What was George's mother's name; where and when was she b. and d; who were her parents and where were they from? (Luke Foster is not to be confused with the Luke Foster who lived in OH and nearby states, m. **PHOEBE RUGG** and was a judge.)

George had two siblings; all three were born in Williams Co., OH: **TRAVIS**, b. ca 1804, and **DRURY FOSTER**, b. ca 1806.

### From the Austin newspaper, January 23, 1895

A WALLED GRAVEYARD. When the cemetery ordinance was up Monday night, Alderman Taylor offered an amendment to require the Austin Cemetery Association to enclose three sides of the new addition with a brick wall six or eight feet high. "What's that?" asked Alderman Schneider. "Oh, he wants a wall built around the cemetery," answered Alderman Anderson. "What does he want it for?" "I suppose to keep folks who may be buried there from getting out. That's the only reason I know of." Alderman Anderson and the council promptly proceeded to kill Mr. Taylor's amendment.

## Fiskville Cemetery: Application to Texas State Historical Commission for Historic Cemetery designation

According to the application for Historic Marker for the town of Fiskville by Lisa Kerber, "Fiskville Cemetery is located just east of 15 and Big Walnut Creek, just south of Rundberg, and southwest of the future site of the Gustavo (Gus) Garcia Park. Currently, there are about 1,136 people buried in the cemetery. There are a few gravesites marked for future burials, but the cemetery, except for a few gravesites, is unkept. About 316 surnames are represented in the Fiskville Cemetery, including Caswell, Deen, Duval, Payton, and Robison. The earliest known date of death among the graves in Fiskville Cemetery belongs to Jesse Burditt (1788-1855). The most recent date of death among the graves belongs to Drew A. Bradford (1902-1999). The average length of life among people buried in Fiskville Cemetery was 52 years." (1)

The community was named Fiskville in honor of Josiah and George Greenleaf Fisk. (2) A study of early grave sites in the Fiskville Cemetery by Ann Molineaux revealed a pattern of Anglo-Scottish and German settlement in the early days of Fiskville. (3) According to "Cultural Stamps on the Landscape of Part of North America" by Ann Molineaux, the land for Fiskville Cemetery was originally donated in 1654 (perhaps she meant 1854) to Fiskville School District by the Crocherons, a family in Bastrop. With the consolidation of school districts, it passed from Fiskville to Summitt and finally to Austin Independent School District in 1956. Austin was unable to provide adequate upkeep of the site, and eventually transferred ownership, to the newly formed Fiskville Cemetery Association. (4) Burials continue at the cemetery to this date.

The original deed specified that anyone may be buried there, the results of which are clear from the many grave site styles. From slave to landowners, all found common ground in this quiet spot. There are many other graves marked solely by fieldstones and carry no inscription. It is the combination of structures in this cemetery as well as family names that suggest an early southern Anglo/Scottish-Irish settlement of the area, with later groups including Czechs, Germans, and others. (3)

The earliest grave noted by Monineaux is dated 1860 and belonged to an Adkisson. Saunders. Dates include 1866, 1876 and 1879. However, Jesse F. Burditt was buried there in 1855 and his wife Mildred was buried there in 1878. Other early burials include families McKinsey, McWilliams 1910, and McClean 1877. (3)

A native of South Carolina, Jesse F. Burditt was born in Edgefield District, South Carolina on Jan. 2, 1788. He immigrated to Tennessee. He married Mildred Crain, daughter of Joel Crain and Margaret Mallette about 1810. Her father, Joel, served in the North Carolina Militia during the American Revolution. She was born in 1790 in Georgia. The couple moved to Texas in 1833, joining Vehlein's Colony. (5)

According to the Texas Post Office Papers 1836-1839 Vol. I and II, he lived in the Sabine District, San Augustine County of Texas, and carried the mail each week from Nacogdoches via San Augustine, Gaines Ferry to Fort Jessup, Louisiana. They are listed in the 1835 Sabine District of Texas Census. (6) In 1837 he served on the Board of Trustees of the San Augustine University. (7)

Several years later, Jesse F. Burditt fought in the Texas Revolution, joining Capt. William Kimbro's company and serving with distinction at the Battle of San Jacinto. The names of Jesse F. and his son Newell Burditt do not appear on Capt. Kimbro's San Jacinto muster roll, but both Capt. Kimbro and Gen. Houston made affidavits that they fought in the Battle of San Jacinto in Capt. Kimbro's Company. In Service Record No. 4655 it is stated that Newell W. Burditt enlisted in Capt. Kimbro's company March and was discharged June 1836. (8)

In 1844, Jesse and Mildred moved to Travis County to a place known as Burditt's Prairie, below Montopolis, on the south side of Austin. Here he and his grown sons William Buck, Joel and Minus Cannon maintained cotton plantations according to the 1850 census. The other three sons Giles, Newell and Jesse F. Jr. settled north of the river in the vicinity of Fiskville where they also operated cotton plantations. (9)

Later Jesse and Mildred lived north of the Colorado River near Gilliland Creek where he was a farmer and rancher and a prominent member of the community. In the earliest days of the Lone Star State, Jesse F. Burditt served as Travis County Commissioner. Jesse and Mildred had 12 children, one dying as an infant.

Jesse F. Burditt died April 24, 1855. Mildred died April 04, 1878. Both are buried in Fiskville Cemetery. Their son Giles H. and his wife Mary Jane Vance Burditt and several of their children are buried at Fiskville Cemetery also. Giles was sheriff of Travis County, a Travis County Commissioner from 1858-1860 and two of his grandsons, Chief Will J. Morris was constable and Ben Piper, police officer. His son-in-law, Algernon Richard Morris was Travis County tax collector. The obituary of Giles H. Burditt said he owned one of the finest farms in this section of the state, consisting of about 700 acres of choice farmland.

Other children of Jesse F. and Mildred Burditt include:

William B. "Buck" Burditt (Nov. 21, 1810 Tennessee-August 1, 1894, Leaky, Real County, Texas, wife Caroline Whitaker) who also fought at San Jacinto and came to Travis County when his parents came. He was appointed a trustee of the Christian Church in Travis County on Oct. 30, 1854. Before 1860, they moved to Papalota in Bee County. Several descendants still live on the Burditt place in Real County, Texas. The ranch is located on the Frio River just north of Leakey on Hwy 83 N. The largest ball cypress tree in Texas is located on this ranch. He is buried in Leakey, Texas.

Lavinia Burditt (Nov. 4, 1812 Tennessee-April 3, 1851, Travis County) married Dr. Joseph Rowe, a physician, who was a member of the House of Representatives in the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Congress and was elected speaker of the second. He was an unsuccessful candidate for vice-president of the Republic. In 1845 or 1846, they moved to a plantation on the Santiago Del Valle grant in Travis County. He was a trustee of the State Deaf and Dumb Institute (later the Texas School for the Deaf).

Joel Allen Burditt (1813 Tennessee-Dec. 23, 1871, Hays County, Texas, wives: Elizabeth Gibbons, Julia Fowler, Sarah F. Hail) enlisted in the San Augustine Company in the company of Capt. Bailey Anderson as a first lieutenant in 1835 under Col. Burleson. He joined Capt. Kimbro's company after San Jacinto and followed the Mexicans in their retreat. Received bounty warrant #1820. After 1850 he is in the Travis County Census. In 1860, he and new wife, S.F., live in Webberville and on Gilliland Creek.

Martha Elizabeth Burditt (May 3, 1816 Tennessee-April 12, 1864, Travis County) married Andrew Mitchell Davidson. They are listed in the 1840 census of the Republic of Texas. In 1850 they are in the Travis County Census and in 1860 live in Bluff Springs, Travis County.

She died in 1864 and is buried in the Davidson-Littlepage Cemetery by the Old Bergstrom Air Force Base (new airport now).

Newell Walton Burditt (1820 Tennessee-Dec. 6, 1886, Travis County, wife Missouri Parker) served the Republic of Texas in the capacity of soldier in the Texas Army as a captain in the Battle of San Jacinto. He died in 1856.

Giles Henry Burditt (March 2, 1818 Tennessee-May 2, 1903 Little Walnut Creek, Travis County, wife Mary Jane Vance) married in San Augustine, the Republic of Texas, where their first child, Almeda Caroline, was born. He served as Travis County Commissioner 1858-1860, a grand juror and was an overseer of roads appointed by the county clerk. He served as sheriff of Travis County. Both are buried at Fiskville Cemetery.

Dr. Henry Newton Burditt (Aug. 27, 1821 Alabama-Aug. 17, 1884, Hot Springs, Garard County, Arkansas, wife Sarah F. Hill) in the 1860 census lived in Bluff Springs, Travis County. By 1870, they moved to Caldwell County. (2<sup>nd</sup> wife Addie F. Breedlow) He there discovered the spring on the Clear Fork of Plum Creek and built a resort with a large hotel. Healthful water was bottled up and sent all across the nation, some 1,200 gallons in 1880. Unfortunately, the wells went dry and the resort closed in the 1930s.

Minos Cannon Burditt (June 21, 1823 Alabama-Jan. 8, 1904, Ira, Scurry County, Texas) came to Travis County with his parents in 1846. He married Sarah Jane Rogers. By 1870 they moved to Coryell County. Their land was on what is now Fort Hood military base. He served in the war with Mexico as a second lieutenant under Capt. John Grumbles Texas Rangers. They then moved to Scurry County and are buried in Ira, Texas.

Clara Burditt (about 1825) married William Wood.

Rosamond Burditt, (about 1827-1845) died young, probably in Tennessee.

Jesse Burditt Jr. (Sept. 30, 1829, Alabama-Dec. 28, 1862, Arkansas) married Sarah Ann Hornsby, the first white child born in Travis County to Reuben and Sarah Hornsby of Hornsby's Bend. A member of Terry's Rangers, he became ill and returned home to recuperate, returned to fight at Shiloh. He was taken prisoner and died in captivity. He is buried at Hornsby's Bend.

## **Burdett Prairie Cemetery: Application to Texas State Historical Commission for Historic Cemetery designation**

The Burdett (Burditt) Prairie Cemetery land was provided by Jesse F. Burditt for his slaves to use as a burial place for their families. It appears that a church was organized by the Negro/slave residents in the area of Burdett Prairie in association with the cemetery. A congregation first met in the home of Rose Edwards, a slave on Jesse Burdett Sr.'s plantation, which took the name of St. Edwards Baptist Church, after the Rose Edwards family.

The St. Edwards Baptist Church has moved to a building at 702 Montopolis Drive and the pastor, Rev. J.C. Adams, is the spokesperson for the current burials at the Burditt Prairie Cemetery. Rev. Adams mentioned that the late Mrs. Ada Arnold kept cemetery records during her life and Mulkey Owens, a member of Travis County Historical Commission prepared a map and index included in the book, "Travis County Nineteenth Century Pioneers." Rev. Adams mentioned that about 21 years ago there was a bank account at Austin National Bank.

When the city of Austin in the 1990s studied the feasibility of putting in a sports complex adjacent to the cemetery, S.A. Garza Engineers, Inc., prepared a report dated Aug. 13, 1991, locating the cemetery on the east corner of the intersection of Felix Avenue and Valdez Street and on the northeast corner of the intersection of Felix Avenue and Vasquez Street.

The Garza report notes different spellings for the Burdett name: Burdett, Burditt, Burdette. As a descendant of Jesse F. Burditt, I know he used the "i" spelling although some of the descendants use the "e" spelling. The report cites "F. Brown 1875" as the source for the family's arrival in Travis County in 1833.

The report also cites "Brown 1991, Adams 1991, Griffin 1991" as sources that the cemetery was apparently in use by the 1850s, initially established by Jesse F. Burditt Sr. for the use of his slaves on his plantation for the burial of their dead (Brown 1991) and possibly for the slaves on adjacent or nearby Burditt family plantations. The cemetery was designated in the 20<sup>th</sup> century for use of members of the neighborhood (Adams 1991).

In the 1850 Travis County census slave schedule were listed 25 slaves, ranging in age from one to 66 years, on the plantation of Jesse Burditt Sr.; 13 with William Buck Burditt; and six with Minus Cannon Burditt.

In the 1860 census, M. Burditt (possibly Mildred, a widow) listed 11 slaves and three slave houses and Allen Burditt with 18 slaves and four houses indicating extensive land holdings on both sides of the Colorado River east of Austin.

January 3, 1895

**DIED.** William C. Canady. The funeral will take place from the residence No. 2054 West San Marcos Street this evening at 3. Friends and acquaintances are invited to attend.

January 7, 1895

**GENERAL DE BRAY'S FUNERAL.** Quite a large crowd of friends and acquaintances, the members of the John B. Hood camp, were in attendance upon the funeral of General X.B. DeBray last afternoon at 3 o'clock. The funeral services were conducted from the Catholic church and the remains were interred in the State Cemetery.

**AN OLD HORSE DIED.** Sunday, Mr. Monroe Miller lost his old roan horse named Captain. The old horse was 28 years old and died Sunday of old age. Mr. Miller has had this horse 21 years and valued him very highly through association. Old Captain has been in the pasture for three years past taking things easy after a long and faithful servitude and Mr. Miller is almost inconsolable over his death.

January 15, 1895

**LAI D TO REST.** Judge W.C. Denny, who was buried yesterday was the eldest son of the late Judge Denny, who during his life time was connected with the great stage lines of Texas before the days of railroads. W.C. Denny, during the California gold fever in 1849, crossed the plains to seek his fortune, and for many years on the golden slope he had a varied and exciting experience. He engaged in some very large mining enterprises and amassed a very large fortune, which he unfortunately lost in some "boom town" speculation, and in mines that failed. He once told the writer that he and two others put over

\$100,000 in a mountain town enterprise, erecting a fine hotel and furnishing it sumptuously, the furniture being hauled from San Francisco in wagons to the foot of the mountains whence it was packed on donkeys to the booming town. For a few years, a very few, the town fairly reveled in gold and men, the judge said, went wild and among them. Suddenly the gold gave out. It disappeared, vanished, and nowhere in all the neighborhood could a trace of gold be found. People left the town, which, with the mining camp, numbered about 10,000 inhabitants. Everbody left and eight years after the judge said, he passed through the place and not a human being was to be seen. His hotel was standing, and much of its furniture remained intact. Subsequently the whole town was destroyed by fire started, perhaps, by prowling Indians. He lost in this town over \$100,000, and he lost in other mining enterprises fully as much, and some 10 years ago, he had mining stock that he paid par for representing a very large fortune. The mine suddenly and mysteriously failed to pan out, and the stock, which oftentimes was at a big premium, became worthless. It was in the mining region of California he was made a judge. Since 1875 he has resided in Austin most of the time engaged in bookkeeping. Judge Denny was a generous-hearted man, and among those with whom he was intimate, he was highly esteemed. He was never married. For many years he was quite a prominent member of the Odd Fellows. He died Monday morning at 5:15 a.m. Funeral took place from the residence of Mrs. R.E. Slatington, cor. East Twelfth and Neches street.

January 15, 1895

**DIED.** Monday morning at 5:15 a.m. Judge William C. Denney. Funeral will take place

from the residence of Mrs. R.E. Carrington, corner East 12th and Neches this morning at 10 a.m. Friends and acquaintances are invited to attend.

Jan. 20, 1895

ALFRED O. EVANS Alfred O. Evans will be buried this evening at 3:30 from St. David's church. Friends of the family are invited.

Feb. 3, 1895

MR. FRITZ HARTKOPF. Mr. Fritz Hartkopf, proprietor of the Club House saloon and restaurant, died suddenly of congestion of the heart last evening about 7 o'clock at his home on Ninth street, opposite Millet's opera house.

The day before he was in excellent health and yesterday morning was up. At noon yesterday he was complaining a great deal and from that on continued to grow worse until death quietly came to his relief.

Mr. Hartkopf came to Austin with his father Mr. Friedlieb Hartkopf in 1874 and has resided here ever since. He was popular with all who knew him and at the time of his death, was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Knights of Honor and several German societies. He has a wide circle of friends who will sincerely deplore to hear of his death this morning. His wife survives him. His funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Feb. 8, 1895

MR. CHARLES LUNDBERG. He Died Suddenly at His Residence Last Afternoon. The Statesman this morning is called up to announce another sudden death, that of Mr. Charles Lundberg, which occurred last afternoon about 5 o'clock. During the morning hours of yesterday he was in his usually health and busy at his place of business. In the afternoon he walked down town and was meeting and talking with friends, when about 2 o'clock, he was seen to suddenly gasp, turn pale, and would have

fallen had not friends promptly lent assistance. Dr. Davis was called and administered restorative care and Mr. Lundberg was sent home in a carriage. After resting he was seized with a convulsion and died.

Charles Lundberg was born in Diefle, Sweden, May 1, 1835. He came to American in 1863, landing in New York. Thence he moved to New Orleans, where he learned the trade of baker and where he married Miss Annie Valz, who survives him. In 1872 he moved to Austin and engaged in the bakery business as a journeyman. A year or two afterward he bought out the business of his employer, and from that day he conducted the largest and most successful bakery in Austin. Mr. Lundberg was a tireless worker, careful in his business and was exceedingly popular in business circles.

Of late years he has taken a lively interest in all enterprises tending to build up Austin. He was stockholder and director of the Austin national bank, and a director in the People's Building and Loan association. It was in the private walks of life however, that Mr. Lundberg's sterling qualities and worth were best known and appreciated. He sympathized with the poor and unfortunate and his hand was no slack hand in giving to the worthy poor. No Christmas day passed that he did not send to the prisoners an abundance of bread, cakes, candies, cigars and tobacco. Mr. Lundberg's death removed a man who was esteemed and respected by all who knew him. He has no relatives in this country, but it is said he has a sister living in Sweden. His funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock from the family residence, corner Tenth and Colorado streets.

Feb. 12, 1895

DIED, On Monday, February 11, at 1 p.m., after a lingering illness of six weeks, at the residence of Mr. John Orr, Mrs. Mary Cooper Allen, mother of Mrs. John Orr. Her remains were taken to her old house in Milam county

for interment on the 11:15 International and Great Northern train last night.

**THE LAST SAD RITES.** The funeral of Wert Blecher, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Blecher, was conducted from the family residence last afternoon at 3 o'clock, the Rev. Dr. Solomon officiating. A large cortege of friends followed the remains to their last earthly resting place in the City cemetery.

Feb. 19, 1895

**AT REST.** Mrs. Ellen Douglas Miller Yesterday Breathed Her Last.

Yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock Mrs. Ellen Douglas Miller, wife of Col. J.H.B. Miller, quietly fell asleep in death. What more need to be said – a noble life has been rounded out with the greatest of victories, a glorious victory over death.

Mrs. Miller was a native of Virginia, and married her now heart-broken life companion 36 years ago. She came with him and her children to Austin from Baltimore, Maryland, ten years ago and has since resided here. She was a superb woman. Endowed with a quick and ready mind, she received in early life a splendid education in every branch of polite and pure culture. Not only this, but as years added experience and the cares of motherhood, her nature, sweet and winning youth, took on a gentleness, an inimitable sweetness and dignity that marked her a queenly woman. She was not quick to make acquaintances, was rather reserved in manner, but a friend once made, such as one found in her companion among ten thousand. She was everywhere admired for her striking appearance, the sweet motherly face, crowned with the wealth of snowy white hair and those who knew her best loved her most.

She was sick for three weeks and the physicians in charge and her loved ones fondly hoped that as the power of the disease was broken last Friday, that she would rally and again live, the idol of her home. But her

nature had been sapped too deeply by the fatal malady and just as it was hoped she was slowly blooming into life again, it was though the smile of contentment at relief from pain was as the light before the dawning into renewed health and strength, those watching so solicitously at her side saw that her eyes were fixed on the shore across the river, that it was the light before the dawning, but the dawning of the endless and beautiful day of eternity. Thus she fell asleep in Jesus. Hers was a noble life of solicitude and care alone for others. A devoted wife, a doting mother, a true friend, a womanly woman, she has her reward. All that of her warm mortal will be laid away at rest tomorrow afternoon.

Feb. 20, 1895.

**SWEETLY SLEEPING,** The Peaceful Sleep of Death in the Beautiful City of the Dead. Last afternoon at 4 o'clock her heart-broken loved ones and tender friends laid away in the silent city of the dead the mortal remains of Mrs. Ellen Douglas Miller. It was almost like an April day; a day whose genial sunshine seemed to yearn to kiss back into warmth again the frozen ground, to better fit it for receiving the frail casket of such a precious soul. Careful hands had clad the sides of her lowly bed with evergreen, and Mother Nature has taken to herself one of her noblest daughters, whose tender memory can never die. Dr. Wright, with fine discretion, great earnestness and beauty, conducted the religious services at the house and grave.

A quintet composed of Mrs. John Maxey, Mrs. De Lock Brush, and Miss Lila Belle Waggoner, and Messrs. Stacy and Condit, touchingly rendered two exquisitely sad and beautiful selections, the great favorites of Mrs. Miller.

Those who so tenderly bore her frail form to its last resting place were General Hamby, Major Littlefield, Captain Shelley, Colonel Thornton, Dr. Iglehart and Messrs. McLaurin, Houghton and Boroughs. The very

large attendance of sorrowing friends and the abundance of exquisite flowers despite the almost absolute dearth of them, because of the terribly cold weather of last week, prove in no uncertain way in what high estimation Mrs. Miller was universally held. A saintly woman has gone from among us. The light of day is shut out from her loved ones. Time alone can assuage such grief. She rests in peace – heaven is her home.

Feb. 20, 1895

DIED. At 8 a.m., Mrs. T.W. Nolan. Funeral services from family residence at 11 a.m. today. Friends and acquaintances respectfully invited to attend.

Feb. 22, 1895

BURIED AFTER A MONTH'S KEEPING. After keeping the body of Ed Myers who was killed at Marble Falls on Jan. 20, for one month, in the hopes of finding the son of the deceased, Mr. Monroe Miller, yesterday, buried the body in the city cemetery. The body has been in Mr. Miller's undertaking establishment embalmed for this length of time, and as the son could not be found, it was deemed best to bury the body.

Feb. 23, 1895

UNEXPECTED DEATH. Dr. H.D. Shaw, an old and highly respected citizen, died yesterday morning. He had been ill but by no means considered in a dangerous condition. During the early hours of the morning yesterday he took suddenly worse and died at 6:10. He has a large number of friends who sincerely mourn his death. The funeral will take place from the family residence, corner August and Twenty-fifth street, today at 3:30 p.m. Friends invited to attend

Feb. 27, 1895

SHE DIED. Josephine Burleson, the colored woman burned while working at the residence of Mr. J. R. Curl a few days ago, died

yesterday morning in spite of good care and skilled medical attention. She was a married woman and leaves several children.

March 2, 1895

A SAD DEATH. William Lee Walsh, the 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charley Walsh died last night at 8 o'clock of diphtheria. The funeral will take place this afternoon from Mr. Walsh's Barton Springs home at 3 o'clock. Friends of the family are respectfully invited to attend.

March 4, 1895

BURNED TO DEATH. Hempstead, March 3 (special). A child of Al Reid on the Mannix plantation upset a lamp and was burned to death.

BLEW OUT HIS BRAINS. Fort Worth, March 3 (special) Alfred Hemphill, 51 years of age, committed suicide tonight by shooting himself through the head with a .44 caliber pistol. He had gone crazy with drink and despondence to talk to his wife, from whom he was separated. Seeing him with the revolver and hearing him make threats of suicide which he had often done before, she ran to call assistance, but he fired the fatal shot just as she left the house. His stepdaughter was sitting in the room at the time.

March 8, 1895

A COURTESAN MURDERED, Lampasas, Tex. Mar. 7 (special). This morning the body of Fannie Mays, a woman of ill fame, was found floating in Hanna pool. At the inquest physicians who examined the body found the neck to be broken and a slight wound on top of the head. The bosom of her dress had been filled with rocks to sink the body. No clue to the murder.

March 13, 1895

THE GRIM REAPER, Mr. Dan Hornsby, who died Monday at his residence in Hornsby's

Bend, was 41 years of age and a native of this county. He came of one of the pioneer families of this state, his grandfather, Reuben Hornsby, probably being the first white man to permanently locate in what is now known as Travis County. Dan Hornsby was a kind neighbor and a good citizen and no man in the county had more and truer friends. He inherited from his grandfather and father that hospitality characteristic of the early settlers and like all the Hornsbys, his latch string was always found on the outside.

He died from the effects of an injury received by a fall. He was feeling much better Saturday and rode over to Manor, and on returning home he was cheerful until bedtime. He took sick some time during the night and Sunday morning found him unconscious. He rallied some Monday forenoon, but it was temporary and he passed away about 10:30 Monday night. He was first injured on the head by a fall from a stable some time last year and during the extreme cold of last month he fell from a wagon while he was unloading wood and again injured himself very seriously. He recovered sufficiently to go about and attend to his business, but he had a presentment that he would die soon and made all his arrangements for leaving this world to meet his Maker. Coming from a calm, cool, courageous stock, he met death without flinching, talked over it calmly, gave minute instructions about his business affairs and while up and about the marvelous Christian fortitude he directed what should be done after he crossed over the river. He was prepared to die and after said he not fear, nor did he. Dan Hornsby was a Master Mason, a Woodman of the World and a member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen. His wife and four children survive him. He was buried yesterday afternoon in the old family burial ground by the Masonic fraternity, a very large number of friends attending the funeral.

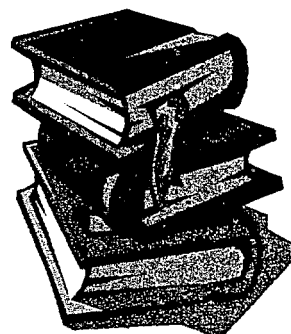
JUDGE JAMES NEILL. Judge James Neill died here yesterday after an illness of many months' duration. He was a very old citizen of Austin having lived here since 1871 (coming from Keokuk, Iowa). For several years he was a justice of the peace in Austin and moving to Tom Green County, he was elected county judge, a position he held with entire satisfaction to the people. Three of his children survive him. Mr. James J. Neill of San Angelo, Mr. Charles P. Neill at present attending John Hopkins university and Mrs. Thomas V. Taylor of this city.

March 14, 1895

March 25, 1895

DEATH OF A VETERAN. M. James Powers, an old citizen of Austin and a Mexican war veteran, died yesterday morning the 81st year of his life. Mr. Powers was a mechanic and when the Hatsfeld building was going up he fell from it, breaking both his legs and since then he has been unable to work. His wife survives him. His funeral will take place this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the family residence, 1208 East Tenth Street. Friends are invited to attend.



## Was your Ancestor Buried in this Cemetery?

In a deed dated 24 Aug. 1876, J.S. Weems sold four tracts of land located in Travis County, Texas, "reserving and excepting one-half acre on which the family graveyard is situated." This land is located along the Colorado River, on the south side of the river, and east of the Montopolis Bridge.

In 1942 there was a court case involving this cemetery because the tombstones had been removed and some of the graves had been emptied because a silo was being built. The suit resulted in the owner of the land being required to set aside a portion of land where the cemetery had been located and erect a fence around the property. He was also required to allow visitors to the cemetery.

The following members of my family are known to have been buried in the cemetery:

## Travis County Pioneers

My great-great-grandfather, William Franklin Robertson was born somewhere in Tennessee on March 18, 1830, and when a mere babe came to Texas from Missouri with his parents (names unknown). They returned to Missouri but when William was about 16 years old came to Texas alone, making the long and perilous journey on horse. He settled first at Manor in Travis County, but in 1851 went to Caldwell County and settled at Lockhart where he lived until 1872 when he moved to the Lytton Springs community. He died there on Jan. 29, 1917.

On Sept. 4, 1861, 31-year-old William married 22-year-old Mary Ann Caperton in Plum Springs area in Travis County at the residence of the bride's mother, Jane T. (Scrivner) Caperton. Pastor W.H. Farmer performed the ceremony. William enlisted May 20, 1862, in Travis County as a private of Company C 33rd Texas Cavalry, C.S.A.

William and Mary Ann raised four children: William "Bill" Woods Robertson who married Martha Pearl Tabor, and these are my great-grandparents; Carrie May "Mabel" Robertson who first married Joseph J. Jackson, then Abel A. Hunt; Icie Gola Robertson who married John Ellis Coopwood; and Lucy Annie Laurie Robertson who married Thomas Hirom Bowen.

Mary Ann (Caperton) Robertson was born in Holmes County, Mississippi, on Dec. 25, 1839. She and her family came to Texas from Mississippi in 1852 and settled in Plum Springs area. She died on June 19, 1918, in Lytton Springs.

Mary Ann's parents, Andrew W. Caperton and Jane T. Scrivner were married in 1837, and in the same year of their marriage, they removed from Nashville to Holmes County, Mississippi, where they lived until 1852 when they came to Travis County, Texas, and in 1862 to Caldwell County.

Andrew was born in 1814 in Tennessee. He died at about age 40 in 1854 in Travis County and was buried on his place. Cause of his death is still unknown. Andrew and Jane were the parents of eight children, but four small infants may be buried there with Andrew, although names and dates are unknown. Four other children were Mary Ann Caperton who married William Franklin Robertson; Lucy S. Caperton who married Marion Montgomery Hudson, a Caldwell County sheriff; Sallie "Sarah" Jane Caperton who married David "Dave" Lafayette Cardwell; and Amanda Rebecca Caperton who married Richard Henry Cardwell. David and Richard were brothers of Anthony Rucker Cardwell and Mary C. "Polly" Perryman who came to Texas from Tennessee with 11 other children in 1855 and settled in Caldwell County.

Andrew's burial place is a small private cemetery, not shown on Travis County maps, near the corner of Thaxton Road and Colton-Bluff Springs Road, about 10 miles south-southeast of downtown Austin. There is no fence to protect it from cattle, and it is on a hill in the pasture. The name of the cemetery could be Caperton Cemetery, later maybe changed to Thaxton Cemetery. The Caperton family first bought the land, the second owner was W.H. Thaxton, and the third was Dr. H.V. Siegmund, a dentist and president of Texas State Bank in the 1950s.

W.H. Thaxton was a highly respected citizen of Bluff Springs in Travis County. He owned a tract of 600 acres ten miles south of Austin. He had 400 acres under cultivation, the whole being under his personal supervision. His article and picture are in the "History of Texas" with a "Biographical History of Milam, Williamson, Bastrop, Travis, Lee and Burleson Counties, 1893."

Only one headstone is still there, but the rest of the others were reportedly hauled away from that place by a hired hand many years ago, possibly under the direction of Dr. H.V. Siegmund. This information is from Amanda's great-grandson, William Estel Perry, who told me, even showed me, about that place where he grew up, before he passed away in the early 1980s. And, Estel's brother was Lt. Wilborn "Joe" Perry, a police officer for 39 years in Austin. He passed away in 1985.

This tall narrow headstone has two names, one on the front and one on the side: "Amanda M. Caperton Born Feb. 23, 1813 Died July 23, 1878" and "Estell B. Caperton Born Oct. 14, 1878 Died Dec. 31, 1880." Amanda was Jane's sister and Estell was a son of Reuben and Belle (Thaxton) Caperton and grandson of Amanda. Also buried there were Amanda's youngest daughter, Mary Ann Caperton, and her husband, Josiah Perry, but no markers are there. Mary Ann Perry was killed on Aug. 27, 1891, in an accident involving a runaway horse near that place.

Amanda married Andrew's older brother, Rev. Milton Thompson Caperton who was a well-known Baptist minister in Travis, Caldwell, Hays and other counties. He was the first pastor, from 1857 to 1872, at the Onion Creek Baptist Church at the corner of Lockhart Hwy 183 and Ben White Blvd., south of Austin. Milton was living with one of his sons, Reuben, when he died on April 7, 1907 at the age of almost 96, and was buried at the Highland Memorial Cemetery in Stamford, Haskell Co., Texas. There is a record that shows he was buried there, but there is no headstone.

After Andrew died, Jane married James H. Denson in Travis County on Jan. 18, 1860, but James died suddenly on Nov. 24, 1861, in LaGrange, Fayette County, Texas. The obituary shows that "he lived near Austin, was a member of the 'Tom Green Rifles' from Travis County, and had gone to Virginia, but owing to bad health was discharged and had reached here (LaGrange) on his way home, when he died at the house of J.M. Philips." Jane was born on April 25, 1815, in Nashville, Davidson Co., Tenn., and died on April 23, 1897, in Lockhart, Caldwell Co. There is no headstone for Jane, but she may be buried at Lockhart City Cemetery in Lockhart, Caldwell County, next to one of her daughters, Sallie (Caperton) Cardwell.

I received a certificate in January 2000 from the Texas Historical Commission, certifying that Caperton Family Cemetery is listed as an Official Historic Texas Cemetery. It was also known as the Caperton-Perry-Thaxton Cemetery. I was told that there were around 16 to 30 unmarked graves existing in this cemetery.

Several Caperton families lived in Travis County in the early days, and in Bryan, Brazos County, Texas, home of Sen. Kent Caperton (D-Bryan). We are related to an ancestor from Virginia.

Jane and Amanda's parents were Reuben Scrivner and Mary Ann Estill, and they were buried at Polly Crockett Cemetery in Franklin Co., Tenn. Polly was the first wife of Davy Crockett who was an Indian fighter, frontiersman, politician and an Alamo hero. Mary Ann's father was Lt. Wallis Estill Sr., and one of his brothers was Captain James Estill who was killed by Indians in the battle that became known as Estill's Defeat in Virginia.

In June 1984, I flew to Virginia, for my first visit to meet a distant relative, the late Bernard M. Caperton, author of "The Caperton Family," in Charlottesville. We visited Union, Monroe County, West Virginia, and saw the 3-story stone blockhouse built by my 6th great-grandfather, Captain Wallace Estill, for protection of settlers against Indians in 1773.

I have been a member of the Austin Genealogical Society since 1978; a Life Member of the Karnes County Historical Society; a charter member of the Genealogical and Historical

Society of Caldwell County; Life Member of The Family of Bruce Society in America through King Robert I; Scots of Austin; Clan Forrester Society and Texas State Genealogical Society. I am also a member of United Daughters of the Confederacy on William Franklin Robertson, William H. Tabor, Josiah Dial O'Daniel (am now a new member of Real Great-Great-Granddaughter's Club of UDC on three of them), Major John Washington Tabor, Nathaniel P. Ellison, Oliver H.P. Tabor, Abner Peeler, Richmond Peeler and William Peeler.

Other heritage memberships include Daughters of the Republic of Texas on Carl Ludwig Jauer and Josiah O'Daniel; War of 1812 on William Caperton, Reuben Scrivner and Lewis Ellison; Daughters of the American Revolution on Lt. Wallis Estill Sr., Captain Wallace Estill, Capt. Archibald Woods, Susannah (Wallace) Woods, William Woods, Lt. Robert Ellison, Capt. Henry Anderson Sr., Henry Anderson Jr., William Shelton Sr., William Shelton Jr., John Tabor, Lt. William Tabor and George Tubb; Colonial Dames on Thomas Estill; and Magna Charta Dames on Thomas Harris, Elizabeth Butler, William Claiborne, James Shelton and Michael Woods.

My three books are "The Isensee Family And Their Descendants 1799-2001," "The Beicker Family And Their Descendants 1760-2001," and "Johann Carl Ludwig Jauer and his Descendants 2002." In all three books, I added pictures, stories, obituaries, maps, outline descendants tree, calendar with birthday and anniversary of the family, complete name index and much, much more. I am now working on the fourth book, "Oliver H. P. Tabor and his Descendants." Since Oliver was a Confederate, I will order a new headstone from UDC for Oliver as his old one is broken to pieces. He died in 1870 and was buried in the Clearfork Cemetery near Brownsboro community in Caldwell Co.

He was a devoted member of the Lutheran Church. Surviving relatives are 10 children: six daughters, Mrs. Clara Haag of Three Rivers, Mrs. Lena Peyton of Austin, Mrs. Mary Isensee of Elm Mott, Mrs. Ida Feurbacher of Creedmoor, Mrs. A. W. Miller of Rosenberg, and Mrs. Bertha Ottmer of Austin; four sons, Ernest, Albert, Otto and Fred Sternberg of Travis County. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. L. Schroeder of Giddings and Mrs. B. Mienke of Carmine as well as 33 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Funeral services were to be held at Cook's chapel Sunday at 3 p.m. with the Rev. F. G. Roeder of St Martin's Lutheran Church officiating. Pallbearers will be selected from among his old friends of the Mendoza community. Burial will be in Carl cemetery near Creedmoor.

## Happy Birthday, Michael Carroll Miller

When birthdays roll around, it is fun to look back over the years and recall good times and special times. As we celebrate this, your 48th birthday, let's look back to Feb. 24, 1953. It was a special day and you were there, or soon to be!

"We" had been through the long nine months, anxiously awaiting your arrival. We marveled about your development as your mother told me every word the doctor said during her monthly pre-natal visits and from looking at the pictures in the maternity books. As the time got closer, there were weekly trips, with a lab visit for blood typing (O-positive, they said), just in case. We had both a boy's and a girl's name selected since we didn't know what the stork would be bringing us. (Sonograms had not been invented back in the dark ages.) The target date for your arrival was February 28.

The doctor had suggested that we consider the newly established Austin Blood Bank's "maternity blood policy." If the husband gave a unit of blood before the baby was born, there would not be a charge for blood, if needed. Great idea! I went in, hopped up on the table and promptly passed out when the technician began to stick me. They advised against my giving in the future since I was "highly reactive." Your grandfather Spearman made the needed donation.

We were living in an upstairs, un-air-conditioned, southwest corner apartment (extremely hot in the summer, according to your mom) on 32nd Street, which is just across the street from the now new and modern St. David's Hospital. However, at that time it was only a caliche hill covered with scrub cedar with a barbwire fence to keep the cedars in. You were going to be born in the "old" St. David's Hospital on 17th Street between Rio Grande and Nueces. In late January, Austin had a small ice storm. Just in case there might be more ice or snow, whenever you decided to be born, we drove different routes trying to find the flattest, safest streets. It is surprising how many hilly streets there are in Austin.

A weekly doctor's visit was scheduled for February 12, Lincoln's birthday, which just happened to be a bank holiday. This is important because I had just gone to work as a teller at Texas State Bank and your maternal grandfather was a senior bank officer in San Antonio. He and Mrs. Spearman drove over so Mrs. S. could go to the appointment with her daughter to see if Dr. Blewett was competent to deliver her first grandchild. He said that you were coming along nicely but it was still a little early. By the way, your grandmother did approve of the doctor.

The Spearman's drove over on the 23rd, which just happened to be another bank holiday (Washington's birthday; it fell on Sunday so was observed on Monday). On the visit that day, Dr. Blewett said that you were ready and suggested inducing labor. Your mom agreed emphatically. She was ready to "get the show on the road" and the doctor preferred to "deliver babies by appointment." They agreed on Tuesday, Feb. 24 since her parents were already here.

We ate out, had a quiet evening and then it was 7 a.m., Tuesday, the 24th. No snow or ice as we drove to the hospital. In fact, it was a balmy, sunny February day. There was the usual admittance paper work but in addition the hospital required a \$100 deposit since we had no health insurance. We had the money, thanks to some parental help and were assigned a

southwest corner room on the third floor, the maternity floor. At least it was air-conditioned and a private room.

At about 9:30, your mom and you were wheeled down the hall to the "prep room." When "y'all" got back, a few of her curls were out of place and she "casually" mentioned that it had not been a fun time. Shortly, labor pains began, though not severe. They continued for several hours with the nurse regularly checking on progress. When the labor pains stopped about 2:30 p.m., the doctor ordered an injection to start labor again. You remember how I reacted to the blood bank needle? Yes, I got a little woozy and had to go out of the room. I sat in the hall till I got over "that" feeling.

Bangaw and Poppie, as you later named them, were there to hold my hand and give your mom moral support. In addition, "Uncle Bob" who had been my best friend in college, had introduced your mom and me and had been best man at our wedding, had skipped classes to be there to give me moral support. It was a lively time in the hospital room and things weren't very difficult for your mom up to the injection.

Things began to move along as the labor pains resumed. The parents didn't time contractions in those days but the nurses certainly did. Things weren't nearly as lighthearted as they had been during the morning. By about 4:30, you were definitely stirring things up so your mom and you were moved down the hall to the delivery room. There was a brief kiss and several silent prayers to start the journey.

The nurse told us it would be awhile if we wanted to get a bite to eat. Bangaw and Poppie said they would just as soon wait there and for Bob and me to go. We drove about six blocks to our fraternity house to catch the evening meal. There were several shouts of "congratulations," "good luck," and "hope it goes good." It was a warm feeling to hear those comments from the brothers. Bob and I got quick service and hurried back to the hospital.

You were born about 6:30. (I don't have your birth certificate for the exact time.) Dr. Blewett came to the room and said that I had a son, ten fingers, ten toes, A-OK, and that mother and son were doing fine. He added that it had been a difficult delivery in that Carolyn was small and the baby was large, 7 lb. 14 oz., 21 inches long. Later in the evening he would want her to have a blood transfusion to compensate for what was lost during delivery. He pointed down the hall to the nursery with its viewing window as he headed back to the delivery room for another baby's arrival.

Earlier, I had said "old" hospital. Yes it was. The viewing window was a glass pane, approximately 30 x 30 set in a conventional door. In the nursery were at least a dozen bassinets with babies, so viewing time was limited, to say the least. We were able to speak through the glass in a normal voice so the nurse heard us ask for the Miller baby. When she brought you to the window, cradled in her arms, wrapped loosely in a receiving blanket. Bangaw gave a perceptible "Oh no," as she saw the bright red forceps marks on your cheeks. The nurse assured us, through the glass, that the marks would fade quickly, "After all, he's only one hour old." It seemed that we got such a brief look at you, yet I can still remember how pink you were and the harshness of the marks. Then we had to move away so that others could see their beautiful babies. Later, we came back and, yes, you too were a beautiful baby, the forceps marks already beginning to fade.

Your mom had a heavy dose of anesthesia so she wasn't fully awake until 8:30 or 9:00 p.m. Her first thought when she saw you was a ball with a face painted on it. You had a full, round face and no hair. Today, we have smiley faces, copied after you, no doubt!

Later that night, the nurse prepared to start the blood transfusion. Part of hospital routine

is a cross-type between the patience's blood and the transfusion unit to insure a proper match. Carolyn was not O-positive as the lab had said but O-negative. They had made a serious and potentially fatal error. Thank goodness for that hospital routine. The hospital stay for the two of you lasted a week so that there could be two additional transfusions and partly because that was the medical procedure at the time. Finally, y'all came home and I got to hold you for the first time.

P.S. If memory serves me correctly, the hospital bill was \$300. The doctor was \$135. What a bargain for such a fine son! Happy Birthday Mike!

## Train Memories

"Railroad Crossing, Railroad Cars, can you spell that without any Rs?" The long forgotten riddle came to mind as I was doing one of my morning walks along Great Northern. There was a northbound freight train stopped on the Sneed siding, waiting obediently for the southbound train to pass through. There were five diesel locomotives pulling this train, a low purring coming from their idling engines. They bore the names of three different lines, Union Pacific was bright yellow, the Southern Pacific (now owned by Union Pacific) was a dirty, faded black and Missouri Pacific or was it Katy a nondescript gray.

Suddenly, a loud blast from a whistle. No, make that a horn! The south-bound train was coming through. The train's diesel engines were almost idling as it sped by, going downhill into Austin. There was a rush of air and the sound of speed coming from the rails. And then it was gone, as quickly as it had come.

The low purr from the northbound locomotives changed to a lower, deeper pitch as the engineer prepared to resume his run. A sound of power surged from the diesel engines as their rpms increased. Then there was the inevitable and indescribable sound as the locomotives jerked on the first car, that car passing the sound back to the next car, and back again and again and again, as I heard that unique sound going down the long line of cars, until it was almost inaudible when it reached the last car.

Slowly, the train began move. I was walking faster than the train but as it gathered speed, it began to pass me. The diesels were straining, making a deep, heavy growl as they struggled on the slight uphill grade. From the heavy cast iron wheels there was a slight rumble as they began to roll on the steel rails. The rumble became louder as the train's speed increased. The sound was punctuated by the clickidy-click of rail joints. The cadence was faster as the train picked up speed; clickidy-click, clickidy-click, clickidy-click. And there was a deeper, heavier sounding rumble when a heavily loaded car rolled by, alternating with near silence as an empty car rolled by. Do metal train wheels get out of balance like automobile wheels? It sounded that way from a rhythmic thump, thump, thump as another car went by. And the clickidy-clicks were still faster and the rumble from the wheels was overwhelming as the powerful sound of the diesel locomotives began to fade in the distance. Northbound, where are you headed?

And suddenly, there was a 60-year flashback in time, to my Agee grandparents in Diboll. They lived in a small sawmill town deep in the piney woods of east Texas, Angelina County to

be specific. The town was built on either side of the Southern Pacific tracks. In fact, the tracks were almost like Main Street, with houses and businesses on both sides facing them. My grandparents' house was, perhaps, only 30 yards from the main line. Coming into town from the south from Houston was a long gradual uphill incline from the Angelina River bottoms. When trains were heavily loaded and steam, not diesel, engines were laboring up the hill, the whole house shook. Over time all the windowpanes had loosened in their frames. Their rattling just added to the intensity of the noise. For the first couple of nights during a visit, everyone complained about the train waking them up, but we got used to it.

I tried to write down every locomotive number to see when it came back through Diboll but I never did get a repeat. During World War II troop trains came through Diboll. They were loaded with soldiers being transferred across the country and sometimes the trains included the troop's trucks, tanks and jeeps on flat cars. Everyone would wave encouragement to the boys as the train lumbered through the heart of Diboll.

Remembering trains, there was a southbound train that went through Diboll at 4 or 5 a.m. It was referred to as the "fo day" train. The name originated in the colored community as a shortening of "before." Once my aunt and I rode the "fo day" train to Houston. And it really was before daylight when we were dressing to go to the depot.

One summer I traveled to Diboll by myself. I might have been as young as five but probably was six. There was a train from Houston to Diboll and beyond, departing at 6:30 a.m. with stops at every small town along the way, arriving Diboll at 12:10 p.m. My father took me to the station, bought my ticket and introduced me to the conductor. I changed my mind about making the trip just as it was time for the train to pull out. I was on the back observation platform crying and screaming to get off the train as it pulled out of the station and Pop faded in the distance. The conductor escorted me back in and gave me a seat. I accepted the situation and settled down to read a comic book and eat my snacks. There were no problems or incidents and my grandparents were at the depot when I arrived.

During the late '30s a railroad line had a surplus of oil cars, which they ran onto a country railroad siding, about 10 or 15 miles southwest of downtown Houston (today it is part of downtown Houston). These were truly "oil cars," long, round, black, oil stained tanks mounted on wheels, used to haul oil all over the United States from the rich Texas oil fields. This siding was at least five or six miles from our house. I was about eight at the time so for Saturday adventures, my friend and I would ride our bicycles out to the siding to play on the oil cars. There were wooden plank walkways on each side of the tank and a metal ladder to the top of the tank where valves and connections were located. We would run almost the length of the quasi train, which had perhaps as many as 100 cars. There were brake wheels that we tried to turn but to no avail. There were air brake tank handles, which squealed air when pulled. There were the metal ladders to climb for an inspection of the valves. We tapped on the tanks to hear if they had oil inside, and how much. And we got dirty, greasy, smears on our hands, legs and clothes – but what an adventure for two young boys. We were train engineers, firemen, brakemen, conductors or train robbers, whatever came to mind.

Suddenly, the time machine transported me back to the 21st century and I'm walking down Great Northern again. The sound of the northbound is gone, however, in my mind, I still hear the hiss of steam from the giant pistons, the clickidy-click of the rails, the shrill blast from a steam locomotive's whistle with a unique rhythm played by its engineer, and ironically, as I write this, I actually hear the mournful sound of a distant train whistle, across the silence of a calm night.

## **“Sheaves of Wheat” by Lorrie Foster Henderson**

Many of us are diligent researchers of family history and genealogy, but somehow never get around to publishing it in a usable form for our families and posterity. So it is refreshing to read Lorrie Foster Henderson's "Sheaves of Wheat," the sort of book every family ought to have. A compilation of genealogical and biographical material on the ancestors and descendants of Union Army drummer Joseph Gillit Wheat, M.D. (1840-1916) and his wife, Mary Eleanor McCoy (1842-1924), "Sheaves of Wheat" is of course a play on words on the family surname of the author's maternal grandmother, Laura Wheat Foster.

Ms. Henderson is a World War II veteran, longtime social worker with the State of Texas, author of another genealogy, "A Beaver Married A Bair" (1996) and two anthologies of family poetry and a respected Austin Genealogical Society board member.

Material is drawn from a wide variety of sources, among them newspaper news items and obituaries, death certificates, oral histories and earlier genealogies. The majority of kinsman profiled are/were those known personally to Ms. Henderson, and, accordingly, their life stories are told in a less antiseptic fashion than in many genealogies, when kinsmen are largely defined by names and dates. Essays are candid, referencing hurried 18th century marriages, 20th century live-withs, problems with alcohol and depression and other events known to most families but ignored in family histories.

The Wheat ancestors and descendants typify many Anglo-American families, beginning with family founders English-born Zachariah Wheat (ca. 1750-1792) and his long-lived wife, Pricilla Reynolds (1757-1857), whose progeny gradually moved westward from Prince George's County, Maryland, in the manner of so many of our forbears. Texas connections are strong, if largely from the last century. Generally, the Wheats were solid citizens, without extremes of wealth or poverty, greatness or obscurity. They were often better educated than many of their contemporaries, with a particular loyalty to Cornell College, the fine private college in Mount Vernon, Iowa. There were also some exceptional stories, such as that of Lois Foster Peters, who became a clown, and Mary Mae Wheat Sandilands, a World War II WAVE who stowed away on her Australian groom's ship disguised as a sailor.

Written without benefit of a computer, "Sheaves of Wheat" is compiled as a family scrapbook rather than a continuous narrative. The many photographs are interesting, but of varied quality in reproduction. The ancestral pages are thorough and legible, but more family trees might have better linked the major branches of the family. Also, a reported kinship with the Earls of Sutherland is not possible as stated, but further research may yield a verifiable relationship. These very minor matters aside, "Sheaves of Wheat" is an interesting and enjoyable tome that should inspire many of us to compile comparable volumes on our own families. Ms. Henderson is to be commended for her fine work.

"Sheaves of Wheat" was privately printed in Austin in 2004. It has 344 pages, illustrations and an index.

## Writing Austin's Lives: A Citywide Community Discovery Project

"Writing Austin's Lives: A Community Portrait" book release party was held in May at the Austin History Center where an overflow crowd listened to readings from five of the 127 stories presented in a jointly published collection from the University of Texas Humanities Institute and the Austin History Center Association. The book is illustrated with photographic images from the Austin History Center photographs collection.

This wonderful book captures a living history not found in any guidebook or newspaper, the stories of lives as seen through the eyes and told in the voices of people living in Austin, Texas. Together, these stories paint a unique portrait of the Texas capital at the start of the 21st century.

The Writing Austin's Lives project began in April of 2003 when the University of Texas Humanities Institute launched a most ambitious public humanities and community-building story-telling initiative. Austin residents of all backgrounds submitted nearly 800 one- to three-page true stories about life in Austin, in English and in Spanish. Some were read and featured in plays around the community and others were heard on local radio. People of every age, every neighborhood, every ethnicity; people in comfort, in transition, in trouble; experienced writers, those who never thought they had a story to tell or someone to listen are represented in the public project.

The archives for the project that contain all 800 stories and the project files were turned over to the Austin History Center the evening prior to the release of the book in a public ceremony where the Director of the Austin Public Library accepted the archives for the community. The archives will be processed quickly so that they will be available to the public at the Reading Room at the Austin History Center. The History Center is open Monday through Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday from noon to 6 pm. It is closed on Thursday and Friday.

# Index to naturalization records to 1906 in Travis County, Texas

Recorded by Kay Dunlap Boyd, Austin

This index began in the November 2002 issue, which ran names Juan Aballos through Alfred Boles. In 2003, the March issue ran names Carl O. Bollman through Phillipp Doppenschitt, June's names ran from Ramon Dorado to Hugo Erzkus, September's from Faustina Escobar to Marcallino Gamez and November's from H.P.M. Gammel to Gustav Hebbe. The March 2004 issue names were from Otto Hebbe to Frederick Hutz and no names ran in the June 2004 Quarterly. Between 4,000 and 5,000 names are on this complete index, which was entered from a microfilm copy of the WPA Index at the Austin Public Library's Austin History Center. The microfilm is available at Austin History Center and through LDS Family History Centers. Complete recorded paper copies are on file at Austin History Center and at Texas State Library Genealogy Collection. The entire file has been entered electronically and is being loaded in parts at the Austin Genealogical Society Web site, [www.AustinTxGenSoc.org](http://www.AustinTxGenSoc.org).

The microfilm record contains this statement:

"Complete Index to Naturalization Records of Travis County, prepared by the State Wide Records Project of the WPA, sponsored by the Department of Justice through the Naturalization and Immigration division of the Federal Government. It took several months to compile this record by a staff of workers under the direction of Mr. E.C. Duke, District Supervisor (without cost to Travis County). This is a complete record of naturalization proceedings in the Probate, County and District Court of Travis County; at the time the County was organized, either of the three courts handled naturalization matters. Since 1906, all such matters have been handled by the U.S. District Courts. The preparation of this record was in line with a general program over the entire Country, and the copy of the record was given the District Clerk's Office for the cooperation it gave the Staff that worked here on the project.

"Requests for information in regard to Naturalization Records have been numerous recently, due to Social Security Laws, Old Age Assistance Benefits and war conditions requiring the establishment of citizenship."
