## If we don't tell our stories, who will?

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#### EULOGY FOR A COUSIN

First, let me tell you that the songs on your hand-out were some favorites that Katherine and her sister Naomi sang as church duets in the little country Methodist Church a few fields behind the farm, and if the weather was so bad even the horse and buggy couldn't make it, they walked through the fields through deep snow. For Easter, and to sing the duets, Aunt Anna made Katherine and Naomi matching organdy dresses in different colors, with sateen slips and ribbon bow-tied belts, on her peddle sewing machine. (The hymns were "In the Garden" and "On a Hill Far Away".)

My first cousin, Katherine: First in so many ways; possibly the first with whom that family relationship became clear when we were very young (she was six months older than I, born in 1924). First in generosity and sharing; hard-working but also fun-loving, and strong-willed although modest.

We lived about fifty miles apart, but while we had no car, our mutual grandparents did, a 1916 or '17 hand-cranked Jewett, and they took us often to Uncle Roy and Aunt Anna Bair's farm south of Ladora, Iowa, where we girls were expected to "do the dishes" and help prepare for thrashers' big noon meal. I would spend a week or so there, where we played with the kittens and swung on ropes in the barn. I would watch while she helped her younger brothers learn to milk the cows (all children started with "easy" ones at age four years).

She would spend a week or so with me every year also, and we would wear each others' clothes if we ran out of clean ones; that sometimes happened when the longer visit hadn't been planned. Sometimes school would not yet be out for the summer, or fall semester had begun, so we visited each others' classes - hers in country school, mine in small-town Mount Vernon, Iowa. At our house, we slept in the rough-hewn bed with tall head-board that our great-grandfather Bair had made long before we were born. At her house, we three girls (her sister Naomi died of too-late diagnosed breast cancer many years ago), shared a bed.

When our family left for home, Aunt Anna would insist on giving us a couple of chickens or a duck, a two-quart jar of her wonderful canned beef, and a couple of cans of her Whitney crab apple pickles, on top of her hugs.

Katherine inherited many of her generous and loving mother's qualities. I can't express how much I miss her already.

And you don't have to be a Travis County resident or a member of Austin Genealogical Society to get one of the embossed pioneer certificates with your ancestors' names on it—although membership in the society is another fine bargain at \$20 a year. Pluswhich, the certificates make a nice gift.

Prince of Peace Cemetery is in the Elroy community in southern Travis County. From the intersection of U.S. 71 and U.S. 183, go south on U.S. 183 for 4.0 miles; turn left at FM 812 and go 5.1 miles. On the right side of FM 812 is Prince of Peace Cemetery, also known as Elroy Lutheran Cemetery.

Prince of Peace Cemetery is in two sections. A small sign visible from the highway marks the first section. To reach the second section, follow the barbed wire fence down the left side of section one, to near the rear of the property, then look left over the fence. The second section is among brambles and brush.




# City, Business and Trade Directories: A great way to track your ancestors!

A city directory includes the principal residents of a city (often nearby suburbs too) and their home address, occupation and place of work.

There are also county directories which list business or agriculture guide, listing farms or other businesses along with an alpha listing of surnames of residents within the area.






Port Huron is in the state of Michigan

How did directories originate?

- First city directory published in 1785 in Philadelphia; following year a directory was published for New York City
- Complied by door-to-door canvasses; those absent who failed to complete and return questionnaire were omitted
- Many directories were published yearly or once every two years

Why check any directories?

- A good way to track movement of people within a city as they move from place to place
- Helpful to locate families who were missed by census enumerators
- Excellent source to determine place of residence between censuses or family changes
- Cross-check within a city directory the location of the employer and where the employee lived (see example on next page)

## Coroner's Inquests and Reports: Good Sources!

I found out about coroner's reports quite by accident.

One rainy, wintry Saturday, I was genealogically needy. I was kind of drifting from idea to idea when I decided to see if I could find the death date of my 2<sup>nd</sup> great-grandfather's sister's husband, Oscar Selden. He had proven to be a very interesting character. He had married Robert's sister, Sarah, back in New York State in 1836.

They have moved on to Michigan sometime after that. The way we know that is because we found Oscar listed as a prison inmate in the 1850 census. We were able to get very brief court records that stated he was serving a term for sexual assault. For some reason it surprised me that in 1848, males would be held responsible for their actions against women. In the same census, we found his wife, Sarah, working at a boarding house. Their two children were separated from their mother and from each other and were living in the households of other Selden's in the surrounding areas. I assume this was because of the economic hardship caused by Oscar's actions

Next, we find records of Oscar in Omaha. He was the first blacksmith in Omaha, had extensive land holdings and was, by all accounts we could find, an upstanding citizen.

Again, they moved. This time it was to Manville, Wyoming. In fact, Oscar and another man actually founded the town of Manville. They were land developers. He was an ambitious man.

Through the probate filed in Omaha and the previous last record we had of him, we had narrowed down the date of death to about a three month period. So.... on that rainy Saturday, I went surfing to the Wyoming State Archives. There was an e-mail address to which one was to send research requests. I sent off a request asking for any newspaper account of his death that might be located. Imagining January in Wyoming, I doubt that it is the hottest ticket in town. In no time I had an answer and a question e-mailed to me. The question was whether I also wanted a copy of the coroner's inquest. Wow!

I received it in a few days and it was fascinating. Transcriptions of the testimony of neighbors, his wife and his partner were included. No charges were filed in this murder that occurred when Oscar was shot through the window after dark one night. However, we all are certain that the partner did it.

Great stuff, so I suggest you see if you can be as lucky. You never know.

#### When are coroner's inquests done?

Coroner's inquests are not done for all deaths, of course, but in many questionable deaths. Coroners are likely to be involved in the following types of death:

- Suicide, accident, or sudden death of a person in apparently good health
- Person unattended by a practicing, licensed physician at death
- Death involving suspicious or unusual circumstances
- Poisoning or adverse reaction to drugs and/or alcohol
- o Disease constituting a treat to public health
- Disease, injury or toxic agent resulting from employment
- Death during medical diagnostic or therapeutic procedures
- In any prison or penal institution

- While involuntarily confined in jail, prison, hospital or other institution or in police custody
- Whenever a body is to be cremated, dissected or buried at sea
- Any unclaimed body
- Any dead body brought into a new medico-legal jurisdiction without proper medical certification
- D.O.A. (dead on arrival) at hospital.

#### What kinds of info might you find?

- Jury reports
- Necrology reports
- · Pathology reports
- Police reports
- Testimony offered at the inquest
- Toxicology reports

Coroners' reports are a public record. They may be held at different jurisdictional levels. Though I found mine at a state archive, they may be held at city or county levels. Check with the Family History Library. They have filmed some coroner's records. You can call county courthouses to ask if they have them. Though some states don't have an online index, it would be worth it to call the state archives and check their online catalog.

Sometimes a death certificate will indicate there was a coroner's inquest, so have another look at the death certificates you already own.

Illinois and Missouri are particularly good for having the inquest of an index online. Illinois State Archives has Cook County 1872-1911, Dewitt County 1924-1977, Wayne County Index, Vermillion County, Ill., and more.

Religion was probably a big part of your ancestors' lives:





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







I discovered the two pictures above at separate times in my search through a family photo collection.




I am not sure if this picture has much significance to my ancestor's life, but it was in the photo collection. Perhaps it was a picture taken as they traveled to Texas?



This is another picture that I know little about.

I do know that my grandfather Cox owned a store in San Antonio, Texas, at one time, and I suspect that this could be a photo depicting that store. Notice the name "Cox" on the top of the store.

I do not, however, recognize any of the people in the picture.



This is a prime example of what I am talking about when I say "Notes."

I suspect this is a story published after the death of Solomon Wagner, one of the relatives on my mother's side of the family, but the name and date of the paper is not shown.

The story contains a lot of valuable genealogical information, but the handwritten note underneath gives me information that I may have never learned. Solomon Wagner was married twice!

Information that could assist you in the search for your ancestors can come from many sources.

It is easy to overlook oral histories, church records and notes when you're concentrating on searching vital records or spending time delving into the holdings of a genealogical library. But the information you find close to home can help guide your search or lead you to new sources of information or offer you new insights into your ancestors' lives. You may even discover information that is not available anywhere else.

Don't overlook the information in you families' oral histories, church records or notes.

## Colonial Virginia Court Order and Minute Books

County government in Virginia started in 1634 with the creation of eight counties. During the colonial period, the county courts combined the responsibilities of the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. They were secondary only to the General Assembly in Richmond.

The County Court was composed of members of the "Commission of Peace" who were appointed by the Colonial Governor with the advice of the Council. They received no compensation for their services, the office being considered one of honor, not of profit. However, the Peace Commission usually recommended one of their own to the Governor to serve as sheriff, a lucrative post in colonial times.

All on the Commission were magistrates, that is, they were "Justices of the Peace." Their chief legal advisor was the County Clerk, who throughout the colonial period was the court's administrative arm. Court sessions occurred monthly, usually about the same time each month and ran for three to six days.

The County Court Order and Minute Books are some of the best records that exist for researching in Virginia. They are exceptionally valuable, giving information that often is unobtainable anywhere else. Court Order Books are a detailed record of the daily court proceedings. Minute Books are a shortened version of these events, although in at least one county, order and minute books were used without differentiation for the book that recorded in final form the record of the sessions of the county court.

Order books and minute books can be particularly helpful for researching elusive "landless" colonial ancestors who are not likely to appear in deed or probate records, and where there are often large gaps in tax lists prior to the Revolution.

The amount of information in each varies by county and time period, and researchers may see little difference in the presentation of data in either. One important difference is that the order books are more likely to contain marginal notations regarding the court matter and participants and are also more likely to be indexed.

The court was responsible for an annual county levy, an account of county expenses and approval of the tax rate to provide for payment of its bills. This included such items as bounties for wolves killed, cleaning the court house, service in the county militia during time of war (French and Indian War and other wars), tobacco inspectors and many other activities for which a claim might be presented to the court.

The poor could petition the court to be exempt from the county levy as illustrated by the following in the Northumberland County, Virginia, Order Book, 1678-1698. "Upon the petition of John Taylor, being a very poor and impotent person, it is ordered yt he be released from paying any Levy during his impotency."

#### **Civil Suits**

The majority of the courts business dealt with civil suits. If a civil suit went to trial, in addition to the names of the litigants and their attorneys, the order books will include the names of the jurors and any witnesses that were called. Witnesses were paid for their attendance at a "minimum wage rate," usually 25 pounds of tobacco per day, tobacco being the major currency in Virginia

during colonial times.

Many of the civil suits dealt with debt collection. There was no banking system as we know today, so many people of wealth loaned money, or stood security, for people of lesser means. Often, it appears, it was necessary to sue for repayment.

#### Orphans and Illegitimate Children

Orphan children often appear in order books and their parents or other relatives are often named as well. A child who was fatherless was considered an orphan, even if his or her mother was still living. Order books contain entries of guardians of orphans who had an "estate." Once orphans reached the age of 14, they were allowed to come into court and choose their own guardian. Order book entries often list mothers who bore illegitimate children and in some cases name the father.

Orphans and illegitimate children were frequently bound out as apprentices to learn a trade. These entries often list one of the child's parents. For example, the following is found in the Northumberland County Order Book, 1678-1698: At a court held for Northumberland County the 19<sup>th</sup> of June 1683, "John Duke, orphant of Sylas Duke, with the consent of his mother, doth bind himself for to serve Thomas Berry until he be one and twenty years of age (being seaven yeares last June). The said Berry providing for him as is fitt for an Apprentice and att the end of the terme to pay the said John one cow and calfe, a mare filly and a sow with pigg or piggs by her side."

However a child did not have to be an orphan or illegitimate to be bound out. From the seventeenth century until well into the nineteenth century, families of limited means often bound out their children to learn a trade and also to relieve the family of the burden of supporting the child.

#### **Immigration and Indentured Servants**

During the seventeenth century and into the early eighteenth century, Virginia's land office awarded land warrants called headright certificates to those who brought individuals into the colony. Typically, an individual was awarded a headright for fifty acres of land for each person whose passage he paid. Thus, a man who paid passage for himself, his wife and five children was awarded a land grant for 350 acres. Order books record the granting of these headright certificates and often contain the names of the persons transported.

The headrights system encouraged wealthy individuals to pay to transport indentured servants to Virginia. In theory, the servants would work 5 to 7 years mostly as farm laborers. However, if a person had a craft or trade, such as a blacksmith, they were used by their master as such.

Indentured servants did not acquire title to land through their work during their term of service. At the end of their term of indenture, they were given some basic clothing and equipment and expected to move to the unsettled frontier. They could purchase unimproved land there, "improve" it by cutting down the trees and preparing fields suitable for growing crops such as corn and tobacco. As the forested frontier was converted into farms, indentured servants were transformed into landowners who could provide their children a better opportunity at gaining wealth.

Indentured servants sometimes brought suits against their masters for cruel treatment or for detainment past their completed term. A master could also petition the court to extend the length of an indenture if a servant committed certain offences such as running away from home

or bearing an illegitimate child.

In the area of northern Virginia called the "Northern Neck" the treasury right system was more common than the head right system. A person could claim 50 acres of land for the payment of five shillings to the "Proprietor" of the Northern Neck. This lead to more land speculation than in the rest of Virginia. The Northern Neck was that land lying between the Potomac and the Rappahannock rivers to their headwaters.

#### **Moral Offenses**

The county court monitored the moral actions of citizens whose offenses are recorded in the order books. Twice a year the sheriff summoned a panel of grand jurors to make "presentments" for misdemeanors and other minor infractions of the law.

Miscreants were indicted for such illegalities as absenting themselves from church, selling liquor without a license, public drunkenness, gambling at cards, assault and battery, adultery, co-habitating without marriage, etc. Women who had an illegitimate child were brought into court and punished. If the father of the illegitimate child was known, he would also be punished.

The wealthy who did not report their billiard tables or carriages were also indicted at times, but seldom convicted. Individuals who used profanity, especially in court, were sometimes fined for their offense. The court also monitored houses of prostitution which are labeled as "disorderly houses" in the court records

#### Tax and Tithable Lists

A tax on tithables was a capitation or poll tax for the purpose of defraying colony, county or parish (church) expenses. Until 1762 this poll tax was collected by the counties for their own use, but in that year the General Assembly looking for ways to finance the French and Indian War added an amount for the colony's benefit.

In 1783 "taxable" replaced "tithable" in the law. Tithable lists may be found in many, but not all, county order books.

Tithable lists were also used for "Processioning." Processioning was a method of determining property lines between two adjacent properties. Although a church function, because the church was a quasi-government entity, the courts usually appointed the men who did the processioning.

#### **Road Orders**

Overseers or surveyors of roads, appointed by the court, were responsible for maintaining the county roads, and these entries are noted in order books. Some order books list the tithables who were appointed to work a given road. That information may also be found in the county loose papers that were often recorded in the November court term.

Researchers can use this information to study ancestral neighborhoods. It is often more useful than tax lists, because each road crew typically represented a smaller neighborhood unit than the tax district. Road orders may also help researchers locate landmarks that do not appear on modern day maps due to name changes of roads or water ways.

### Military Records

Appointments of militia officers can often be found in order books as well as fines of militia members who did not appear for muster. Occasionally, the full roster of a county militia can be

found in an order book. The annual account of county expenses may also include payments to militia members.

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#### **Probate and Land Records**

Researchers will usually find more details about probate and land records in the county will and deed books. However, in some burned counties the order book may be the only court record of these transactions that has survived. Entries note the grantor, grantee and whether the deed was acknowledged by the grantor or proved by the witnesses, who are named. Dower releases by the wife are also indicated.

Order books record the presentation of a will for probate. Individuals posting security for administrator's (intestate estate) or executor's (testate estate) bonds are also listed, as are those appointed to appraise the estate of the deceased. These individuals were likely close friends or relatives of the deceased who did not have an interest in the estate. In intestate cases, the widow was frequently named as administrix. Her next marriage can sometimes be tracked when she and her new husband petitioned the court to appoint them administrators of the estate.

## Texas General Land Office: Federal Land Records

AGS program presentation by Jerry Drake on Feb. 27; transcribed by Alana Moehring Mallard

The General Land Office in Austin is home to original grants on public lands dating to 1720. It is home to over 70,000 maps and surveying-related documents. It is home to massive special collections, including:

- German land records
- Alamo letters
- Civil War records

#### Spanish and Mexican Records

Anybody who came before 1836 has a land grant from one of the impresarios. The collection includes 119 original Spanish land grants.

#### Republic and State Records

Texas made its money by selling land, giving out more than 100 types of land grants from 1836 to 1919. Texas traded land when they wanted to buy something.

- 1. Headrights heads of families got certain amounts of land for coming to Texas to live, both me and women
- 2. Grants for military service:
  - a. Bounties went to anybody who served
  - b. Donations were for specific battles during the Texas Revolution
- 3. Preemptions homesteads in 1860-1880, for unallocated public lands, domain for homesteads
- 4. Scrip those who performed a service for the state got paid in land, such as railroads and capitol
- 5. School land all the leftover, unallocated public domain land was sold off cheap
- 6. Civil War land grants

#### What does a land grant look like?

- 1. File jacket, called a schedule by the federal government
- 2. Certificate
- 3. Field notes, survey
- 4. Survey, with cadastral maps, not platted on the ground, platted from the inside out

- 5. Final title
- 6. Patent

A land grant is a process, not a piece of paper. Each piece of paper represents a step in the process of getting the land grant.

#### Special Collection

General Land Office has a massive special collection, including:

- 1. Texas Court of Claims collection has original Alamo letters, including a letter from David C. Cummings at the Alamo; and records of land that came under investigation
- 2. German Immigration Agreements
- 3. Texas Revolution Voucher Files
- 4. Confederate Voucher Files (1883)
- 5. Adjutant General's Files Adjutant General's Office was burned in 1855 by thieves who were forging service records
  - GLO will do genealogy searches for \$10 per name. GLO's historic county maps are \$20 each. The website, savetexashistory.org, is a virtual museum, with online finding aids
  - Save Texas History is the GLO's historic preservation program no state funds are used for conservation

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## Happy May Days from Long Ago

We saved them all year long, from one May Day to the next: little boxes to cover with tissue or crepe paper. We stacked them behind the brooms in the landing of the cellar stairs at the door into the kitchen. We saved kitchen match boxes, round ice cream pint boxes and almost anything else that opened at the top and could have a handle attached. Some were cut down from taller ones.

As May approached, we started getting them out and putting them on old newspapers spread on the kitchen or dining room table, covered to protect them from the flour-and-water paste used to hold the decorations in place on the boxes. For the tissue paper, we folded it, then used scissors to make fringe, cutting it in about an inch, about every ½-inch apart, then pasting it in layers up the sides of the boxes. A strip of flexible cardboard could make a handle, also decorated (they didn't have to be very sturdy; they were seldom used for carrying).

You may be wondering what we did with all those decorated "baskets." They were for our friends! The day before May Day, we would go out in the country to gather wild flowers at Uncle Russell Bair's farm on what was then called Cemetery Road (Hillcrest Country Club was far in the future). The flowers grew in the "timber," a small untouched acreage a couple of cultivated fields north of the house, where we picked spring beauties: purple phlox, violets and wild daisies. If we were very lucky, we might get Grand-dad Henry Bair to drive us down to the Cedar River, to the woods around the start of hills on River Road, where we might find "Dutchman's Britches" and other more rare wild flowers for the May baskets. Regular "May Flower" blooms were seldom used; often not yet in season; also, only a single blossom faced downward under the big primary leaf, where a Mayapple fruit formed later.

Earlier at home, we had made chocolate fudge, brownies and maybe popcorn and small cookies. We filled each basket with the wilting flowers, sweets and a slip of paper bearing names of the giver and the recipient. We left home on foot, just after dark, taking only one or two baskets at a time to deliver. First, you put the basket on the doorstep, watching that no one saw you, rang the doorbell, then ran to hide behind a tree to watch your friend, or her family member, come out, look around, spot the basket, pick it up, read the slip of paper and call out your name. Perhaps they would come and find you to thank you! Then you would go home, pick up another basket or two, check to see if any had been brought for you and set out to make another delivery or two, usually going farther each time out.

One year, my basket from Rosemary Neff was exceptionally pretty, with red rose crepe paper petals pasted on to make a rose shape on a round box and a green stem-like handle attached. My mother learned from her mother, Alta Neff, how to make the "rose baskets," which we did ever after.

Another year, as May Day approached, the Fordyce sisters called my mother for me (and perhaps one of my two brothers) to come to their house on the northeast side of Mount Vernon (Iowa); they had something for me. (Boys seldom "did" May baskets.) They gave me large scraps of (then rather costly) crepe paper, in colors very suitable for May basket trimming. That was my primary decoration supply from then on.

Of course this was long before "May Day! May Day!" became a distress signal, and the day was filled with anticipation and happiness. We may not have danced around a Maypole, but we had our own variety of fun.

All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterly issues are supplied only if available). MEETINGS of the general membership begin at 6:45 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month except August and December. Members are encouraged to come at 6:30 p.m. when the Help Desk opens. Meeting Place: Highland Park Baptist Church, 5206 Balcones Dr. Take Northland (RR 2222) exit off Loop 1 (Mopac). Go west one block to Balcones Dr., then left 1½ blocks. The church and parking lot are on right. Visitors are always welcome. The Board of Directors meets at 6 p.m.
