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Austin's Heritage Neighborhood: Lamar to Guadalupe, West 29th to West 38th

In researching the history of 3018 West Avenue, a question was posed of 1897 as the effective date of construction of the house. This has led to a fairly exhaustive check of records and maps, which has contributed to an understanding of the history of part of the Heritage Neighborhood.

The 1897 date was not proved, but not completely ruled out for a structure of some type.

The Heritage Neighborhood Association bylaws give these boundaries: east side of Lamar Boulevard, west side of Guadalupe, north side of West 29th Street, south side of West 38th Street, within the City of Austin, Texas. On an 1850 map of Austin, Travis County, Texas, this land is described as out lots 72, 73, 74, 75, 76 and 77 of Division D. An out lot consisted of 40 acres.

Juliet Tims Brown Jayne (1809 SC-1886 Texas), widow of Judge Brewster Helme Jayne (1798 NY-1842 Texas) owned out lots 72, 74 and 75 (C/259 Patent 1 September 1846); F. Fruit owned out lot 73; A.N. Hopkins owned out lot 76; and Moore and Blessing owned out lot 77.

On 25 January 1848, Juliet Jayne sold her out lots to A.H. Hopkins (C/280 WD). The land changed hands over the years. Roughly thirty years later, part of out lot No. 72, Division D was subdivided for Walton and Parrish by L.H. Luckett, surveyor. The subdivision was filed 12 February 1877 in Book Z, page 620. There were 34 lots. To the east was W. Smythe, out lot 75; south were Brown's divisions and Crosby land. D. Thomas had a parcel of about three lots and D. Wilson had about eight lots to the west.

Dr. J.J. Tobin's Subdivision of the northwest quarter of out lot 72, Division D was filed 14 September 1895 in Vol. 1, page 113. There were four blocks with blocks one and two separated by a 50-foot road, as were blocks three and four. Blocks one, two and three had 18 lots each. Block four had 13 lots.

The city register for 1900 lists Peter Hehl as paying taxes on lots 1, 2 and 3 (E 16 of) of Walton & Parrish Subdivision. The 1900-1901 City Directory lists Peter Hehl's residence as 928 W. 31st St. Later city directories showed these residences for Peter Hehl: 1891-92 listed "Mt. Bonnell Rd. bt. Georgetown Road and Shoal Creek;" 1893-94 showed "Mt. Bonnell Rd near Shoal Creek;" and 1895-96 showed "Mt. Bonnell Rd., 1 block e of Shoal Creek."

Guadalupe became Georgetown Road after W. 29th at one time in Austin. This does not correspond to present-day Mt. Bonnell Rd., but raises questions.

John Hildingen was listed for lot 4. In the 1898-99 City Directory, Jacob J. Hildinger's residence was 926 W. 31st St. J.G. Duffield was listed for lots 1-18, blocks one, two and three and for lots 1-13 in the J.J. Tobin Subdivision from 1897-1900.

Dr. J.J. Tobin was a druggist and investor. The 1900 census for Austin, Travis County, Texas, gives his birth as about 1838 in Alabama. His wife's name was Fanny Ida. Brown's Annals of Travis County and the City of Austin reports that in 1888 property of the Austin City Railroad passed into the hands of Dr. J.J. Tobin, and he sold it in 1894 to his brother, Dr. William H. Tobin.

On 20 July 1895, J.J. Tobin deeded various property of all kinds to J.L. Hume, trustee (Vol. 131, starting with page 223). Included were lots 5 through 34 in Parrish and Walton's subdivision of part of out lot 72, Division D which had been deeded to J.J. Tobin by W.H. Tobin (Book No. 133, page 69).

Edward M. House sold lots 5 through 34 of Walton and Parish's subdivision of part of out lot 72, Division D to Austin Real Estate and Abstract Company for \$2,000 on 11 April 1902 (Vol. 172/page 646).

T.A. and Jennie B. Doxey sold eight and two-thirds acres, part of out lot 75 with all improvements to Austin Real Estate and Abstract Company on 7 January 1902 for \$1,750 gold (Vol. 173/page 457).

The Austin Real Estate and Abstract Company, Gen. William H. Stacy, president, dedicated the Oakwood subdivision 14 January 1903. This was recorded 24 June 1903 (Vol. 2, page 148). It was a re-subdivision of a part of lots 72 and 75, Division D Austin, Texas. In the city register it was described as a re-subdivision of J.J. Tobin subdivision. Gen. Stacy was the developer of several well known Austin subdivisions, a civic leader, gifted singer and active in the Tenth Street Methodist Church.

Oakwood was a larger subdivision than the ones it replaced and extended to W. 32nd Street. The north-south streets were West Avenue, Grandview Street, San Gabriel Street and Oakwood Street. East-west streets were W. 30th, W. 31st and W. 32nd streets.

On 29 June 1903, having recently arrived in Austin, Judge Robert L. Penn bought lots 55 through 65, also that part of a 16-foot alley lying between lots 55 and 56 on the east and lots 65 and 66 on the west, all in Oakwood Subdivision of a part of out lot 75, Division D (Vol. 183 page 330).

This included the house at 3112 known as the Penn or Heritage House. The purchase price was \$2750 cash and a note for \$3,000. The note was paid, and release was dated 2 June 1908 (Vol. 23/ page 342).

On 8 August 1903 Judge Penn bought lot 7 in Oakwood subdivision for \$100 (Vol. 183 page 380). Judge Penn bought other properties in the neighborhood, which will be discussed later. His widow, Ada Read Penn, developed the properties after his death in 1909 while rearing nine children.

The most interesting discovery is the different names for what is now West Avenue from 31st St. north to what was the State Asylum grounds.

The first currently known street names originate in the Smyth's Addition. There is no date on the plat for the subdivision of out lot 75 in Division D (Vol 1/page 6), but it was probably 1877 or before.

North-south streets are King and High; east-west street is Quen (sic). Owner of land to the east of Smyth's was Crews, and owners north were John O. Johnson and Fritz Tegener.

Austin city directories confirm the street names for this plat. There is more land in the neighborhood described as Smyth Addition/Subdivision. In 1893-1904 directories, High was described as "2 d. w of Guadalupe, begins W. 31st St. ext. n. to Lunatic Asylum Grounds." King was "1st w. of Guadalupe, begins W. 31st St. ext. to Lunatic Asylum Grounds." Queen (or W. 33rd) was shown as "33d n of Colorado River begins King ext. w. 2 blocks. Thirty first n. of Colorado River begins Lampasas ext e. to Duval, w. to Shoal Creek."

In the 1905-06 city directory, High became Asylum Avenue, south of asylum grounds, begins 31st St. and extends north to Insane Asylum grounds. King Street was the same, but High, Queen, Oakwood Avenue (3 d. w. of Asylum Ave begins W. 30th ext. n.) and Penn Avenue (Penn's Add "2 d. s. of Spring, begins Asylum Ave. ext w. 5 blocks") were no longer listed.

A mystery remains about this Penn's Addition listed in the 1900-01 city directory. It was before the arrival of the Judge Robert L. Penn family. In 1900 Austin there was only one Caucasian Penn, a man who lived in a hotel. Most of the Penns were African-American and no

history has been uncovered about this Penn Addition. In 1903-04 city directory, two streets in Penn Add. were: Champa "(Penn's Add) w ext 34th, begins Asylum Ave. ext w 5 blocks" and Wabash "(Penn's Add) 2 d w. of Asylum Ave., begins Spring or W. 38th ext N. 4 blocks."

In 1907-08 city directory Asylum Ave. now changed to continuation of West Ave. See West Ave. north of 31st. In 1909-10 city directory Asylum Ave. "(4th ward) 2 d w. of Guadalupe, begins 500 w. 34th or State, ext. n. to Asylum grounds," changed to "West Ave. also known as Oakwood Ave."

An interesting document which adds to the street name confusion is the purchase of property by R.L. Penn 13 February 1906 from Carl Belisch, V.R. Phillips and Lula May Phillips. The property was lots 11 and 12, in block two of Smyth's Subdivision of a part of out lot 75, Division D. Each lot was 75 feet in width, fronting on High Street, but actually had a width of 154 ½ feet on High Street. The depth was 198 feet. R.L. Penn paid \$300 and "the State, County, and City taxes for the present year, 1906" (Vol. 207/page 259).

Louisa D. Matthews, W.J. Matthews, D.B. Matthews, J.S. Matthews, R.H. Matthews and R.P. Matthews sold R.L. Penn lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 in block six of Smyth's Subdivision of part of out lot 75, Division D for \$650. These were the same lots conveyed to Louisa D. Matthews by William Smyth and wife, E.A. Smyth, by deed dated 29 December 1877 (Vol. 218/page 453).

R.L. Penn bought two promissory notes executed by Isabel Suter and her husband, W.J. Suter to Mary Teasdale and Walter T. Green, each for the sum of \$500, bearing date 10 September 1907. The notes were a vender's lien on property described as "A part of out lot No. 75, Division D, of the city of Austin, Travis County, Texas and described as follows:

"Beginning in the East line of said out lot 75, at a point seventeen feet from the S.E. corner of said out lot,---Thence in a Northerly direction, with the West line of said out lot, one hundred and nine feet to a stake---Thence in a Westerly direction, parallel with the North and South lines of said out lot, Three hundred and eight feet to the N. E. corner of a lot fifteen feet in width by one hundred and nine feet in depth which was conveyed by us to Mary E. Frank by deed dated January, 28th, 1904, and now recorded in Vol. 184, page 415,Thence in a southerly direction, with the East line of said Mary E. Frank's lot, one hundred and nine feet to the S. E. corner of said lot---Thence in an Easterly direction, and parallel with the South line of said outlot No. 75, three hundred and eight feet to the place of beginning, to have and to hold the said interest in said premises unto the said R. L. Penn...."

The lien was sold "for a valuable consideration to us in hand paid by R.L. Penn...." on 12 September 1907 (Vol. 218/page 603). Mary Teasdale was joined by her husband, R.E. Teasdale, in the transaction. Walter T. Green's wife was unnamed.

Joseph E. Baker of Philadelphia, Pa.; LeRoy Baker of St Louis, Mo. and Marcia E. Eberlein, joined by her husband, Walter P. Eberlein of Jasper County, Mo. sold R.L. Penn a parcel of land described by metes and bounds which consisted of 5 5/8 acres of land containing lots 1, 2, 9 and 10 in block six and all of block five of Smyth's subdivision of out lot 75, Division D. The price was \$500 plus Penn's having to settle any claim by Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York based on an instrument signed 7 November 1898 by Joseph E. Baker and his wife, Waity O. Baker, now deceased. This agreement was signed 24 February 1908 (Vol. 218/page 610).

On 4 May 1908, Joseph E. Baker released the property as R.L. Penn had paid off the \$500 lein (Vol. 228/page 353). R.L. Penn paid \$600 on 11 May 1908 to the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York to settle the Baker debt and have the property released to him (Vol. 229/page 567).

Mrs. R.L. (Ada) Penn dedicated a subdivision of blocks 5 and 6 of the Smyth division of subdivision of out lot 75, Division D on 29 August 1911.

North-south streets were named West Ave., San Gabriel Street and Penn Ave. The plat included the Penn residence on a lot of 314 ft. by 308 ft., with 32nd Street, running east-west, as north boundary of residence land and State Street as the north boundary of the subdivision. Block Five had 16 lots, and block six had 10 lots (Vol. 2/page 223).

Mrs. Penn filed another plat of blocks 5 and 6 on 13 May 1914, which included a 15-foot cut through lot 4 of block six, leading to a playground and tennis court. Dimensions of the lots varied from the 1911 plat. The 1914 plat apparently was drawn by M.C. Welborn, city engineer, and Romie Raser, draftsman, dated 5 July 1913 (Vol. 3/page 18).

In September 1909, Rev. Shepherd Halsey Werlein, formerly pastor of Austin's Tenth Street Methodist Church, sold lots 6, 10, 11, 18, 19, 22, 26, 27, 30, 31, 37, 38, 41, 42, 45, 46, 70, 73, 78, 79, 85, 86 and the east half of lot 69, all in Oakwood Subdivision of out lots 72 and 75, Division D to Stacy-Robbins/Covert Company for \$1,726.70 (Vol. 238/page 148). He was living in Pulaski Co., Arkansas.

On 18 May 1914, Rev. S.H. Werlein "remised, quit-claimed and released" the north 20 feet of lot 37 and the south 30 feet of lot 38 of Oakwood Subdivision to the Stacy-Robbins Company for \$1 (Vol. 267/page 105). He was living in Orleans Parish, Louisiana, where his family was prominent. Werlein Music was the first publisher of Dixie.

The "Mary Alice Comeskey Subdivision" was a resubdivision of lot 7 and the north 37 1/2 feet of lot 8, block two of Smyth's Addition, a subdivision of a portion of out lot 75, Division D. It was south of 34th Street and East of West Avenue. The Mueller Subdivision of out lot 76 was north, with the Hillview Addition west of Mueller across West Avenue. Assmann's Addition was to the West with Penn Subdivision south of Assmann's Addition (Vol. 15/page 5). Of interest is: history of Mrs. Comeskey's property, which was deeded by George P. Assman to Patrick Comeskey on 9 November 1897 (Vol. 143/page 605-606).

Although all parts of the neighborhood were not covered; hopefully this information will contribute to future researchers.

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Glascock II Cemetery

Glascock II Cemetery is 6912 Old Bee Caves Road, past Oak Hill Cemetery, directly behind Oak Hill Body & Paint on private property. Take Hwy 290 west of Oak Hill, turn right on Old Bee Cave Road.

The business owner has taken good care of the cemetery over the years and will allow entry for visitation during normal business hours with advance notice. There are eight marked and two unmarked graves inside a cedar post fence. Numerous cedar trees and irises add to the beauty of this historical family cemetery.

William D. Glascock was Oak Hill's original settler in about 1846. His burial is believed to be the first in this cemetery in 1853 although no marker exists. There is one other unmarked grave alongside his, which is believed to be his wife Salina Glascock Nichols.

William was born in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, about 1815. He is the son of Thomas Glascock and Sarah Finney Coleman. His lineage dates to colonial Northern Neck Virginia where the Glasscock ancestral home "Indian Banks," completed in 1699, still stands. He is descended from original American colonist Thomas Glascocke, who received his first land patent in 1642, in Rappahannock County, Virginia.

William D. Glascock first visited Texas about 1835 while living in Alabama. Following the death of his first wife he married Salina Anne Chambless in Alabama in 1837. The couple

migrated from Madison County, Alabama, in late 1837 with daughter Anne Elizabeth to settle in Bastrop County near Sandy Creek on 640 acres. About 1844 the family settled along north of Williamson Creek in a pecan grove in what is now Oak Hill. He and Salina had six children: Anne Elizabeth, Thomas Anderson, Leman Pike, Francis Marion, William S., and Louiza "Nannie" Nancy.

The land on which the cemetery is situated remained in the family about 100 years. William D. was deeded an additional 320 acres adjacent to his land by his uncle Dr. Thomas Anderson in 1850. He also owned other acreage in Oak Hill, Bastrop, Austin, and Walker County, Texas.

William D. Glascock was a Bastrop Volunteer in the Republic of Texas militia and served in the Battle of Vasquez in 1842. It is believed that William D. fought in the Battle of San Jacinto alongside his cousin Washington Anderson. But, as with many men who fought the day of the Battle, no official record exists to substantiate this oral recorded history. William had two brother: Zebulon Pike and Thomas G. Glascock.

After William died, Salina married Wiley B. Nichols in 1857. The couple had two children, Rufus Shaw and Mary Nichols, who are both buried in Fiskville Cemetery in Austin, Texas. Salina died about 1877.

William's son Francis "Frank" Marion and wife Mahala Tombaugh farmed this land until Frank's death in 1922. Frank was a Civil War veteran, Travis County commissioner, Justice of Peace of Oak Hill, school board trustee and a Mason in Onion Lodge #220. His wife Mahala was born in Indiana, migrating to Texas from Michigan. Her family was of Pennsylvania Dutch descent. Mahala was the last burial in the cemetery in 1941. She and Frank had twelve children: Laura, William Marion, Selinah N., Albert Peter, Francis Walter, Russell Aubrey, Daisy Mae, Belt, Bell Reed, Ruth "Allison", Virgil Earl, and Arthur Coleman. Albert and Belt's headstones were carved by an American Indian.

Glascock II Cemetery was designated by the Texas Historical Commission in 1998. A marker has not been erected due to strict regulations requiring 24-hour public access.

Maul Cemetery

Recorded by Mary Stewart Hicks, September 2007

Maul Cemetery is in Yaupon Subdivision off Lomann's Spur near Lakeway. This was once the Maul Ranch. The cemetery is protected by an adobe wall and wrought-iron fencing. The cemetery is on private property and a key must be obtained from the leaser of the property.

At the intersection of RR620 and Lohmans Crossing Rd., turn off RR620 and go down Lohmans Crossing a short distance until you come to Lohmann's Spur. Turn left onto 2300 Lohmann's Spur and about half-way up the road you will see the entrance to Yaupon Creek (Meadowland Rd. new construction). Turn in and make the first right turn (sign says residents only) into the swimming pool parking lot.

Early Teen Years: A John Miller Memoir

In previous memoirs, I've mentioned the years we lived in the country about 30 miles north of Houston, near Aldine. I'm not certain why we moved to the country and subsequently back to our Houston house, but the country was a wonderful experience, and I have many warm memories about the years 1940 to spring 1944.

The move occurred just as the final six weeks of the spring semester was beginning. I was assigned to an eighth grade home room, my level at Aldine. There was a small problem: At Aldine, when the Texas Education Agency mandated that 12 grades were required for graduation, I was in the fifth grade when that semester ended. In the fall, I was in the seventh grade. Aldine had just renumbered the grades; consequently, I skipped a grade. Yes, I graduated in 11 years but I believe that skipped grade ultimately hurt me.

The ninth grade at Pershing Jr. High was a new experience for me. I guess there were too many distractions and probably the curriculum at Aldine was not as hard as at Pershing. As and Bs in the country, Bs and Cs in town, and I just could not learn Spanish. I ended up dropping it.

Both of my parents were educators and among their friends was a couple, both of whom were educators. They had a daughter, Barbara, age 12, one year younger than me. The Maddens lived three blocks away but by going through our back yard and across several vacant lots, I could get there in about three minutes. Our parents encouraged us to get better acquainted.

Finally, I asked Barbara for a date, my first, and probably hers too. It was a Sunday afternoon date to go to the movies. The Village, in southwest Houston, near the Rice campus was in its infancy but there was a movie theatre. We walked the two blocks from the Madden's house to the bus stop on Bellaire Blvd. Fare was probably five cents for children. A 15-minute ride and another two-block walk to the movie. I believe the show was *Gaslight*, with Charles Boyer. Tickets were maybe 15 cents – "Dutch treat" just popped into my mind. Barbara may have wanted to pay her way but my parents had said that the boy pays on dates. No doubt I tried to hold her hand during the show but she would have none of that, especially on a first date. No doubt her folks had talked to her also. After the movie, we stopped at the corner Walgreen and had a fountain cherry coke or a similar beverage of the era. The bus ride back, a somewhat formal hand shake, the perfunctory "Thank you, it was a lot of fun." There were other movie dates, but in the fall we moved into phase two of our relationship.

The Maddens had a wind-up Victrola and a good selection of 78 rpm records, from big bands to Jerome Kern and Cole Porter. After school, I would go over and we'd listen to records and maybe try a few dance steps, without much success. Perhaps my mother suggested I would like to take dance lessons since Barbara and others my age would be enrolling at Laura Dorman's Dance Studio, conveniently located in the Village. "Sure, why not," I thought and I wouldn't have to study.

So for the fall and spring, once a week, it was off to Mrs. Dorman's. The parents worked out a car pool. I didn't do too well over all – no rhythm or coordination but did pretty well with the box step. Still do that one today on those rare times that we have the opportunity to dance. Mrs. Dorman also taught jitterbug, waltz and Latin steps. I did OK with the conga line.

At the end of the fall class, Mrs. Dorman had a formal dance for the students.

Not a recital with parents watching but this was just for the kids: long dresses for the young ladies and coat and tie for the young gentlemen. My dad had to tie my tie. Barbara wore lipstick. Parents drove us to the studio and told us to have a good time. Dancing was mandatory,

no skipping a dance. Mrs. Dorman would announce the music and tell the boys to ask a young lady to dance. There were a few ladies choices, in the interest of gender equality, I suppose, and a mixer, where two circles, girls on the inside, boys on the outside moved in opposite directions till the music stopped. Then each person would dance with the person opposite them. The dance ended at 9:30 and parents were there for us. The ritual was repeated in the spring.

Another flashback to 1944-1945 was a Saturday bicycle outing. Barbara and I and two other teachers' children, Monte and Norma, planned to take a bicycle ride. Today, I don't have a clue as to why we decided to ride 20 or so miles round trip to see a teacher friend of our parents who lived in River Oaks. Perhaps, we were going to ride through River Oaks and look at the pretty homes and yards and just drop by to say Hi to the teacher. Remember, this was when Houston was a large town, not the mega city it is today.

We rode toward the Village and then headed north on Kirby Lane to Westheimer and into River Oaks. We found the teacher's home. She was not there, gone shopping and on errands but her teenage daughters and their friends were so gracious, "Won't you come in and cool off? Would you like some ice water? Mother will be disappointed that she missed you." In thinking back about the drop-by visit, I realize we were dumb, inconsiderate, rude and other adjectives. I can only justify it as 13- and 14-year-olds not knowing good manners.

This self-incrimination leads me to one last episode. Previously, I've written about delivering the Houston Chronicle, which had a Sunday morning edition. On Sundays, I would get up about 5 a.m. and bicycle several blocks to pick up my papers. Barbara lived on the way so I would detour to her house, park my bicycle on the sidewalk, walk up their neighbor's driveway to her back bedroom window and softly call to her through the screen and open window. We would talk for a few minutes and then I'd head on to pick up my papers and she'd go back to sleep, I presume. After a couple of nocturnal visits, I thought I'd surprise her. Rather than talking through the screen, I'd just undo the inside screen hook with a bent coat hanger wire. I practiced on my window screen and got the hang of unhooking. The next Sunday a.m., and it was quite dark, I did my "break-in technique," gently opened the screen and softly touched her arm. She was in the twin bed next to the window. No kisses or anything intimate but we did hold hands and talked.

I modified waking her up by using my flashlight and gently touching her arm or cheek. One morning, I did my usual "stop-by, good morning, how are you?" routine. I reached over, turned on my flashlight and touched her arm. An old, old woman with wild hair and even wilder eyes raised up in that twin bed next to the window. I don't know who was more scared! I turned off my light, ducked out under the screen and literally ran down the drive way. Later, I found out that Barbara's grandmother was visiting and had the window bed to get more of the cool night breeze. Barbara told her that it must have been a bad dream but that ended my nocturnal visits. Never again! Measured against today's standard, that could have been very serious business.

Researching African-American Ancestry

Gather Information

The first step in *any* genealogical journey is to gather information from home and family sources.

All researchers should diligently seek out bits and pieces of paper upon which are written fragments of genealogical information. As you journey through your home, filing cabinet, or attic, collect “souvenirs” from your family’s life: birth, marriage, or death certificates, newspaper clippings, military discharges or pensions, and obituaries—to name just a few. Then extend this pilgrimage to the homes of your parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins.

Collect and share, copy and scan! This information will become the signposts on the road to discovering your ancestors.

Organize Information

The second step is to organize all that collected material into an easily readable, accessible format. Family Group Records and Pedigrees charts will map your way through your family’s genealogical trails. You can write the information on paper copies of Family Group Records and Pedigree Charts, or you may want to use computer software in which you can enter the data and print out the forms and charts created by the software.

There are many different software programs created specifically for genealogists: Personal Ancestral File (PAF) (free download at www.familysearch.org), Legacy, Ancestral Quest, and FamilyTree Maker, to name just a few.

Collect Oral History

The next step is to go back to your living relatives and collect oral history and stories. Use the charts and forms you have created to help you stay on track when a family member is talking and to prompt questions you may want to ask. It is important that you collect full names, nicknames, any dates, and relationships. Have a clear understanding of the players in any story or event that is told to you.

Does your family have a history of slavery? If so, get as many specific details about ancestors who lived in slavery as possible: where they lived, plantation name, slave owner’s name, family relationships, etc.

Did your ancestors escape from slavery? Again, get as many details as you can about that story. Interview more than one relative, interview the oldest living relative you can locate, and interview them more than one time.

One technique is to interview several relatives at the same time. Be sure to transcribe the interviews so that you can read them and have ready access to the information given.

Begin Research

Now you are ready to begin researching other records in which your ancestors may have been recorded. Begin searching census records—correctly identify your ancestors in census records from 1930-1870. Notice the years are listed backwards—this is the correct way to research. Your ancestors were moving forward in time, but if you want to find them, you have to backtrack on their trails! Be creative and open-minded about names, nicknames, and spellings.

Search other common genealogical records as well: wills, probate packets and files, military records, land deeds, etc. Be thorough, so that as you continue to move backward in time you will have lots of signs to point the correct direction.

There are a few things you need to keep in mind as you search:

- Old records used words and terminology to describe African-Americans that are not appropriate.
- Your African-American ancestor may be listed in a separate set of records labeled "Colored" registers. The county clerk may have kept segregated records—either a separate book entirely, or a separate list in the same book. Be sure to look for your African-American ancestor in the "white" registers as well—their race may not have been accurately recorded.
- You may not be able to find your African-American ancestor in prepared or published indexes. It is known that some of the indexes created deliberately excluded African-Americans. If you can't find your ancestor in an index, be sure to check the original record.
- Look for different surnames for members of the same family. Some African-Americans changed their surname several times, and not all siblings used the same surname.
- Many African-Americans (especially those born in slavery) did not know their age or birth date. Do not exclude a possible ancestor on the basis of what you think may be an incorrect age. Use other factors to determine if you have identified the correct ancestor.

The year 1870 is where the paths for those seeking African-American ancestors will most likely fork off onto a different, albeit parallel, path from those researching other ancestry. Why? Statistically, from 1790 to 1860 the great majority of African-Americans were slaves. In 1860, 89 percent of all African-Americans were slaves. Therefore, for many people seeking their African-American ancestors, they are seeking slaves. If you have indications or know that your ancestors were former slaves, there is one critical piece of information you need to focus on finding—the name of the *last* slave owner.

Search Records Created After the Civil War

You will want to search groups of records that were created after the Civil War (1861-1865) that contain information regarding former slaves or people of African descent. These record groups are:

- Slave Narratives
- Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands
- Freedmen's Bank Records
- Southern Claims Commission
- Military – U.S. Colored Troops (USCT)
- Newspaper Accounts
- Histories and Biographies

Slave Narratives The Slave Narratives consist of more than 2,300 interviews that the Works Progress Administration (WPA) conducted with former slaves from 1936-1938. These

interviews were typed. Some have accompanying photos of the person interviewed. These interviews are available at the Library of Congress' website *American Memory: Slave Narratives from the Federal Writer's Project 1936-1938*

<<http://memory.loc.gov/ammem/snhtml/snhome.html>> These interviews often reveal names, dates, and places where slave ancestors may be found—one more signpost to point in you in the right direction!

Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands The Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands was established by the War Department on 3 March 1865, one month before Lee surrendered at Appomattox Courthouse. The Bureau continued to function as a major governing body until it was abolished on 30 June 1872. The responsibilities of the Refugees Bureau were great: they assisted former slaves in negotiating labor contracts and indentures; they provided relief in the form of clothing, food subsidies, and medical aid; they provided for education; they prosecuted criminal cases; they provided assistance in reuniting former slaves with family members in other areas or other states; they assumed custody of confiscated lands and property in the former Confederate States; they legalized or performed marriages for former slaves.

The Bureau's records are the National Archives and Records Administration's Record Group 105. They have been largely unavailable in the past, but more and more are becoming available on microfilm. Most of the microfilmed records are from the Field Offices. For more information and a fuller description of what is available, see <<http://www.archives.gov/research/guide-fed-records/groups/105.html>>.

The website *Freedmen's Bureau Online* <<http://www.freedmensbureau.com>> has transcripts of some records, as well as links to other websites.

Ancestry.com (a subscription website) has a database titled *Freedmen Bureau Records of Field Offices, 1865-1872* which contains digital images of the original records. The database has a search box that leads you to believe these records are indexed, but they are not, as of this writing. (There is a Name Count Estimate of 102,010 at this point in time. It appears these records have been partially indexed.) To access the collection, select a state and the type of record you want to browse and hit "search." You will need to browse through the entire collection in hopes of finding a relevant record.

As an example of the type of information you may find can be seen in a labor contract made between the Rev. Hector McLean of Robeson County, North Carolina and "his servants who remained with him soon after it was known they were declared freedmen." These former slaves were given as Henry (age 40); Suzy (age 45), and her three children Nancy (age 14), Lenah Queen (age 12), and Andrew Tom (age 11). A contract is also made with Pleasant (female, age 18) and her children Jinny (age 3) and Neill (age 3 mos) and her (Pleasant's) "two little brothers" Ben (age 11) and Charlie (age 9). What a fantastic amount of genealogical information, along with the name of the former slave owner.

Freedmen's Bank Records Another collection of records that may greatly aid you in identifying family members and former slave owners are the Freedmen's Bank Records. The Freedman's Savings & Trust Company was chartered in March 1865 by Congress. Unfortunately this bank failed in 1874, and many depositors lost their money. This bank had thirty-three branches that operated in the following cities:

- Florida: Jacksonville, Tallahassee
- Georgia: Augusta, Savannah
- Kentucky: Lexington, Louisville

- Louisiana: New Orleans, Shreveport
- Maryland: Baltimore
- Mississippi: Natchez, Vicksburg
- Missouri: St. Louis
- New York: New York City
- North Carolina: New Bern, Raleigh, Wilmington
- South Carolina: Beaufort, Charleston
- Tennessee: Memphis, Nashville
- Virginia: Norfolk, Richmond

If your ancestor lived in a rural area, it is unlikely that they would have become a depositor. However, if another family member lived in a city, your ancestor may have been mentioned in that person's deposit record. The information collected included name, date of application, where born, where brought up, residence, age, complexion, occupation, employer, name of wife/husband, names of children, names of father, mother, brothers, and sisters.

The record for Andrew Marshall Murchison, who applied in 1870, tells us that Andrew was born on the Sherman Place 15 miles from the city of Savannah, Georgia; that he was raised at the same place; currently resides "near the cemetery," age 14; complexion black; his father is Peter Murchison, a farmer on the Springfield Plantation, and his mother Amelia is now dead; his brothers Marcus and David live in Savannah, as does his sister Susan. What a great family map! The bank record gives names and places that can be used to locate other family members and the former slave owner.

The Freedmen's Bank Records have been microfilmed by the National Archives, and are micropublication M816 (27 rolls). The digital images and a searchable index are available at Ancestry.com (a subscription website). A searchable transcript of the records is available on CD and can be ordered at www.ldscatalog.com for \$6.50, item no. 50120.

Southern Claims Commission The Southern Claims Commission was established by Congress on 3 March 1871 to reimburse claims of losses for Southerners who could prove that they "remained loyal adherents to the cause and the government of the United States during the war..." The claims had to be filed between 3 March 1871 and 3 March 1873, but the cases and the claims were sometimes continued for the next decade. Only one-third of the claims made were paid! It was very difficult for a Southerner to prove that they had remained loyal to the Federal government, and that they had provided goods to the Union. However, these claims are of great benefit to genealogical researchers because they contain the testimony of family members, former slaves, former slave owners, and neighbors.

Gary B. Mills compiled an index titled, *Civil War Claims in the South: An Index of Civil War Damage Claims Filed Before the Southern Claims Commission, 1871-1880*. The NARA has microfilmed this group of records (Record Group 233), and these images are also being made available through Footnote.com (a subscription website).

Military – U.S. Colored Troops (USCT) The War Department established the Bureau of Colored Troops on 22 May 1863, although some states had formed units comprised of African Americans prior to this time. There were 175 regiments comprised of more than 179,000 free blacks and freed slaves.

Records of these troops can be found in the NARA's Compiled Service Records and pension files. The NARA is in the process of microfilming the records of the USCT. Ancestry.com has a database titled *U.S. Colored Troops Military Service Records, 1861-1865*,

which contains images of the compiled service records. It is not known how complete the database is at this time.

You can find physical descriptions of soldiers, as well as where and when they enlisted, and some details of their military service. In the case of Henry Ryan, he enlisted on 30 November 1863 in Company G of the 17th USCT. At the time of enlistment he stated that he was born in Morgan County, Alabama and was a farmer at that time. He was described as having a “light” complexion, black eyes and black hair. He was 21 years old and 5 feet 5 inches tall. On 1 March 1864 he was appointed Corporal.

How does this military record help with finding Henry’s family and former slave owner? Morgan County, Alabama was the home of many *white* Ryan families—a member of this family potentially a former slave owner.

Other Records Don’t overlook other records such as newspaper accounts, local histories, or church records that may contain information about your African-American ancestor.

Identify the Last Slave Owner

Hopefully, by this time, you have been able to gather some clues that point the correct direction. You are now ready to try to identify the last slave owner. Once you have found the last slave owner, it is in the records of that white family that you will find records of your African-American family. (You are now on that parallel path.) These records may include wills or other probate records that list slaves, deeds or bills of sale in which slaves are mentioned, doctors’ records for medical treatment of slaves, court records, or newspapers accounts that may reveal slave information. These are just a few of the types of records in which you may find your ancestor mentioned.

First, you need to correctly locate your ancestor in the 1870 census. Based on their location in that census, there are a few research strategies you can use to identify the last slave owner: (1) the Same Surname approach; and (2) the Same Neighborhood Approach.

Same Surname Approach

Your African-American ancestor may have taken his *last* slave owner’s surname as his own. However, your ancestor may also have taken his surname from a *former* slave owner, his *first* slave owner, or his *favorite* slave owner.

- Does your ancestor carry the same surname as a white family who previously owned slaves?
 - Locate your ancestor on the 1870 census. Copy 10 census pages before and 10 census pages after your family. Look at the white families with the same surname living near your ancestor.
 - Locate those same white families living in the 1860 census of the same area.
 - A slave-holding family will have a fairly large dollar amount written in the 1850 and 1860 census columns for “personal property.”
 - Look at the 1850 and 1860 slave schedules that were taken at the same time the federal census was taken. See if your ancestor fits into one of the lists of slaves (listed only by age) owned by a white family with the same surname.
 - Determine which white family is a possible last slave owner.
- Begin researching that white family: their genealogy, all records related to them.

Same Neighborhood Approach

This strategy is the same as the Surname Approach above, but you disregard the surnames of white families—just concentrate on white neighbors who owned slaves prior to the Civil War. Using the same steps listed above, determine a most likely neighbor, and then research the white neighbor and all records related to that family.

Research the Slave Owner

The strategy to researching the slave owner is that you are trying to find mention of your slave ancestors within the records created by that slave owner. The types of records you will want to search are: bills of sale (may be found in deed books), deeds, court records, probate and wills, plantation records, church records, doctor's records, diaries, etc. Be creative and be thorough!

Example of a bill of sale "I...do bargain, sell and deliver one negro woman slave named Selah, one negro boy slave named Ben son of said Selah, Selah about 16 years of age, Ben about nine months..."

Example of an estate sale (probate record) "Sale of the estate of Adam Finch. One negro man Tarlton \$142, one woman Pat \$80, 1 boy Hardy \$110, 1 girl Hannah \$90, 1 girl Milly \$62. Purchased by A. Harper." From the format of this record, it is possible that this was an entire family, listed in order of age, which was purchased by Mr. Harper from Adam Finch's estate.

Example of a will (probate record) "I, Eliza Williams...give and bequeath...the following negroes (viz) Evelina and her two children: Nanny (Nathan's daughter) and her child [unreadable], and a negro man named Lovelace, brother to said Evelina."

By thoroughly researching a possible last slave owner, you will hopefully be able to identify your ancestor. As you continue the trail backward, you may be able to identify earlier generations. You will likely need to research the siblings and in-laws of the white, slave-owning family to do so. You may also need to research several different white families if your first attempt does not succeed.

The key to success in *any* genealogical endeavor is to be positive, be open-minded, be thorough, and be creative in seeking out records. Stay on one track until it reaches a dead end, then get onto another path and see where it leads you. You *can* be successful!

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The Austin Genealogical Society

General Information

PURPOSE Austin Genealogical Society was organized in 1960 as a not-for-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas. Its purposes are to collect and preserve genealogical and historical information about the people of Texas, particularly pertaining to the City of Austin and to Travis and surrounding counties; to instruct and assist members in genealogical research; and to publish public and private records of genealogical interest. In addition, the AGS supports the Texas State Library's Genealogical Collection and Austin Public Library's Austin History Center by donations of books and other genealogical material. Gifts and bequests to AGS are tax-deductible to the full extent permitted by law.

MEMBERSHIP is open to all upon payment of annual dues. Classes: Individual: \$20; Family (two in the same household): \$30; Patron of AGS: \$100; Lifetime: \$500 (\$300 if over age 65). All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. **After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year**, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterly issues are supplied only if available). MEETINGS of the general membership begin at 6:45 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month except August and December. Members are encouraged to come at 6:30 p.m. when the Help Desk opens. Meeting Place: **Highland Park Baptist Church, 5206 Balcones Dr.** Take Northland (RR 2222) exit off Loop 1 (Mopac). Go west one block to Balcones Dr., then left 1½ blocks. The church and parking lot are on right. Visitors are always welcome. The Board of Directors meets at 6 p.m.

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ANCESTOR LISTING PAGES for the June issue of the Quarterly must reach the Editor at 3310 Hancock Dr., Austin, Texas 78731, or alanasuzy@earthlink.net by May 20, preferably by electronic means, either in an e-mail or as an attachment to an e-mail. When an electronic version is not possible, typing, handwriting or printing must be black and legible. Months must be spelled or abbreviated, not in figures. Show dates in accepted genealogical style: day, month. Leave 1-inch margins at both sides and at top and bottom, and hand-number pages on the back of each page. Carefully check horizontal pages (reading in the 11-inch direction) so that one-inch margins are on top, bottom and both sides so no information is lost in stapling. No 8½ x 14 sheets, please. You may submit lineage or family group charts, ahnentafels, narratives, memoirs, letters, cemetery inscriptions, Bible records, census data, queries or a combination of material, just so it is not under copyright. Proofread your material for accuracy and clarity so we will not publish faulty or incorrect data. Consult a recent June AGS Quarterly for suggestions.

Remember, individual membership secures two facing pages, and family or higher membership allows you four pages.

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
