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Dear Ones,

As I write this on Memorial Day weekend, I'm remembering times of decorating graves with my cousin Sheryl Moehring Steger. Sheryl and I have relatives buried in several Central Texas cemeteries, and we like to put flowers on graves on holidays and birthdays.

Memorial Day started as a decoration day in the South, when women began decorating graves before the end of the Civil War. And Memorial Day is still a decoration day in many parts of the U.S, particularly as a time to put flags on the graves of our veterans.

This Memorial Day, our family has one more grave to decorate with a flag. My Uncle Red Moehring – Sheryl's Daddy – died in September. As a Navy Seabee, Red drove heavy equipment to build a runway at Subic Bay in the Philippines.

All four of the Moehring brothers from Round Rock and Georgetown were military veterans. The oldest, Robert Howell, who died in 2001 and was my Daddy, flew B-25s during WWII and spent 20 years in the U.S. Air Force. Charles William, the next Moehring boy, was also Navy man. He died in 1998. Red was the third Moehring brother, and the youngest, Joe, who died in 1989, also served in the Navy.

Kids and grandkids of these brothers carry on the military tradition in our family. My brother Bob is retired U.S. Army, his wife Vicki served in the U.S. Air Force, and their sons Josh and Zak are currently in the U.S. Army. Josh served in Korea last year, and Zak served in Iraq. My Uncle Joe's son David is a Marine who just got back from a tour in Afghanistan. And my niece Julia Hayles Barnes is in the U.S. Air Force, with orders for Iraq in September.

Wherever you were this Memorial Day weekend, I hope you were safe – and maybe doing a little genealogy. Looking at photographs, listening to stories, figuring out connections, putting out flags on graves.

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## Daughters of the Republic of Texas: DRT timeline in Travis County in the early years

*"On the second floor of the old Land Office building every Tuesday afternoon from 4 to 6 o'clock, Mrs. Fred Cloud, secretary of the DRT, and official hostess of the museum, entertains visitors with real Texas hospitality. Mrs. Cloud is herself a native-born Texan and is thoroughly conversant with the history and tradition of her native State. With her humorously twinkling eyes, Mrs. Cloud is an interested observer of folks and their foibles.*

*"Miss Lillie Robertson, chairman of the museum committee of the DRT and one of those through whose efforts the museum is today in existence, may often be found assisting Mrs. Cloud in entertaining visitors.*

*"Miss Robertson enjoys the privileges of living in the only house ever built and owned in the U.S. by a foreign representative to this country. This house is the old French Embassy in Austin, which was purchased by Dr. J.W. Robertson many years ago from Count de Saligny, French Ambassador to the Rep of Texas.*

*"A battered table which is over 100 years old occupies a place of prominence in the museum. This table was in the pioneer home of Dr. J.W. Robertson, father of Miss Lillie Robertson."*

The William B. Travis Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Austin's first DRT chapter, made this 1917 newspaper story possible with the foresight in 1894 to begin collecting artifacts of the Republic of Texas. Before the DRT Museum was housed in the historic Old Land Office, itself an artifact of Texas' days as a republic, the Daughters of William B. Travis Chapter managed to secure a room in the Capitol for their artifacts. And even before that room, the chapter kept photos and relics in a member's home. Indeed, DRT history in Austin and Travis County begins with the William B. Travis Chapter.

### William B. Travis Chapter - 1892

DRT's William B. Travis Chapter of Austin, Texas, was the third DRT chapter organized in Texas.

The chapter organized on June 5, 1892, with these officers: president, Mrs. Rebecca J. Fisher; first vice president, Mrs. S.H. Darden; second vice president, Mrs. F.R. Lubbock; secretary, Miss Julia Pease; treasurer, Mrs. C.B. Tolman; and historian, Miss Rosine Bryan.

Charter members: Mrs. Wm. Allen, Mrs. Dora Fowler Arthur Barrett, Mrs. Dora W. Byron, Miss M.K. Burleson, Miss L.K. Burleson, Mrs. Annie Darden Brown, Mrs. S.F. Darden, Mrs. John W. Dancy, Miss Duffau, Mrs. Rebecca Jane Fisher, Miss Marie Graham, Mrs. Thomas Glasscock, Miss Ella Dancy Hall, Miss Lena Dancy Ledbetter, Mrs. F.R. Lubbock, Mrs. G.W. Massie, Mrs. Andrew Niell, Miss Julia Pease, Mrs. O.M. Roberts, Miss Rosine Ryan, Mrs. C.D. Tolman, Mrs. C.M. Wilcox, Mrs. Martha Owen Breckenridge.

The chapter organized with the goal of maintaining the State Cemetery, a volunteer work begun by Lillie Robertson. In 1893 a chapter committee began systematic care of the cemetery,

identifying and decorating graves. Committee members Mrs. Ella Dancy Hall and Mrs. Dora Waller Byrne, reported, "the care of the State cemetery is the first and most important work assumed by the chapter."

Greathouse, Miss Emma Kyle Burleson, Lily Burleson (MacDonnell), Hally Bryan (Perry), Chole Taliaferro (Langford), Berta Askew (McLaughlin), Lillie Robertson and Clara Driscoll.

Mrs. Albert Sidney Johnston was made a member of the chapter because of her donation of family relics, and Elisabet Ney was made the first honorary member in 1903 because of her devotion to Texas and its heroes. Other early honorary members were Mrs. Percy B. Pennybacker, Mrs. Fannie Chambers Gooch Iglehart, Mrs. Pearl Cashell Jackson, Miss Harriett Smither, Rev. L.U. Spellman, Mrs. L.W. Kemp and Judge John W. Hornsby.

### **DRT Museum - 1903**

In 1894 Mrs. Albert Sidney Johnston gave the William B. Travis Chapter photos of her family, including her husband, Texas' Secretary of War in 1938; a case of relics and "the famous book of wild flowers," her sketches and diaries called "Texas Wild Flowers."

For many years, chapter members maintained the relics in a member's home, and in 1903 the chapter received permission from the 28<sup>th</sup> Legislature to set up in a room in the Capitol building. The State controlled the room, but the chapter was custodian of this first museum. Museum committee members in 1903 were Miss Emma Kyle Burleson, Miss Lillie Robertson, Mrs. Maude W. McDonald, Mrs. C.M. Alford and Mrs. Louise Hale Connerly.

In 1917, William B. Travis Chapter members moved their relics to the old Land Office on the southeast corner of the Capitol complex, where the museum was maintained by DRT and Texas Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy until 1989, when the DRT Museum moved to North Austin.

### **Texas Veterans' Association - 1907**

In 1907 in a ceremony at the State Capitol, Texas Veteran's Association turned its work over to Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

DRT officers at the time were president, Rebecca Fisher; first vice president, Clara Driscoll Sevier; second vice president, Mrs. Charles Milby; third vice president, Mrs. A.H. Geissler; fourth vice president, Mrs. Joseph Carnal; fifth vice president, Mrs. M.H. Newton; historian, Mrs. Nettie Houston Bringhurst; and secretary, Mrs. Fred Cloud

### **Reuben Hornsby Chapter - 1919**

Reuben Hornsby Chapter of Hornsby Bend organized on April 23, 1919, documented as the 26<sup>th</sup> or 27<sup>th</sup> DRT chapter in Texas. All members are descendants of Reuben Hornsby. Officers were president, Miss Evelyn Hornsby; first vice president, Mrs. Kate Hornsby Platt; second vice president, Mrs. Sarah Hornsby Smith; historian, Miss Irma Robertson; recording secretary, Miss Exa Hornsby; corresponding secretary and registrar, Miss Ruth Robertson; and treasurer, Mrs. Mollie Hornsby Platt.

**Stephen F. Austin Chapter - 1933**

Stephen F. Austin Chapter of Austin organized on April 21, 1933, at the University of Texas, and all members were UT women. Officers were president, Mrs. C.M. Miller Jr.; secretary, Miss Roberta Little; historian, Mrs. Tass D. Waterson; registrar, Miss Mary Catherine Decherd; vice president, Miss Marian Judd; corresponding secretary, Miss Mary Jane Murray.

Officers in 1935-1936 were president, Mrs. Tass D. Waterston; first vice president Miss Isabella McLeod; second vice president Miss Nell Gault; secretary treasurer Miss Mary Louise Tipps; registrar, Mrs. Edward W. Meier; historian, Miss Mary Jean Murray; reporter Miss Helen Fay Passmore; and sponsor, Miss Fannie Ratchford.

Early chapter members were Miss Althea Klumpp, Mrs. C.M. Miller Jr., Miss Nell Gault, Mrs. David R. Ergle, Mrs. Jimmy Matthews, Miss Mildred Alice Webb, Mrs. Ed. W. Meier, Miss Helen Fay Passmore, Miss Ann Schleicher, Miss Isabella McLeod, Miss Mary Louise Tipps, Miss Shirlireed Walker, Miss Florine Hopkins, Miss Esther Houston Doom, Miss Fannie Ratchford and honorary member Regina Brelsford.

## Andrew J. Stovall: An outline of his life

- Born on August 30, 1843 in Itawamba County, Mississippi. *Article written in 1898*
- Parents were David Joseph and Susan Blain Stovall, farmers and Baptists. AJ was the seventh of eleven children. *Article written in 1898*
- AJ was able to receive a basic education. *Article written in 1898*
- AJ's mother died and his father married the widow, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Mackey Thigpen, in 1857. Mary was the oldest child of Zilphy Harder Mackey and John Mackey. *Itawamba County Marriage Licenses*
- Stovall Family, presumably including AJ, moved to Tennessee about 1859 and resided there for a couple of years. *1860 Wayne Co TN Census, Article about his niece, Martha Stovall Mackey, daughter of J R Stovall and wife of William Drew Mackey*
- Family returned to Itawamba Co and there A J enlisted in the army.
- Enlisted as private in Company K of the 19th Mississippi Infantry Feb 26, 1862 in Baldwyn (Itawamba Co), Miss by Capt. W H H Tison. Unit was mustered in on April 4, 1862 near Yorktown, VA. Stovall was 19 years old. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On May 25, 1862 Stovall was admitted to Chimborazo Hospital Number Two Richmond, Va with what is referred to as Inter fever. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On May 27, 1862 he is transferred to Farmville. On May 28, 1862, Stovall was admitted to General Hospital in Farmville, VA with rheumatism. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- He was released from Farmville Hospital on June 13, 1862. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- During the Seven Days Battles Stovall was wounded. The nature of the wound is not known. Specific day is not known, June 26, 1862 – July 1, 1862. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit was mustered on Dec 31, 1862 for pay. Capt Bounds paid soldiers. Stovall is now listed as a corporal. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit mustered on Feb 28, 1863 to be paid by Major Hearsey. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit mustered on April 30, 1863 to be paid by Maj Hearsey. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*



- On July 9, 1863 Stovall was admitted to Mississippi Soldiers' Hospital in Richmond, VA for the treatment of Debilias (dysentery). *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- He was released on July 15, 1863. At this time he gave his residence as Itawamba Co, MS. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit mustered on Aug 31, 1863 to be paid by Maj Hearsey. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit mustered on Oct 31, 1863 to be paid by Maj Hearsey. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Unit mustered on Dec 31, 1863 to be paid by Maj Hearsey. Stovall is now listed as a sergeant. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On April 11, 1864 Stovall received at least one item of clothing. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On April 20, 1864 Stovall received at least one item of clothing. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On April 27, 1864 Stovall received at least one item of clothing. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Stovall was believed to have been killed May 12, 1864 *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- By August of 1864 Stovall is no longer considered dead, but missing since May 12. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On Aug. 13, 1864, AJ received, as a prisoner, from some unknown party \$5. *Fort Delaware Records*
- By September of 1864 Stovall is known to be a prisoner of war having been captured on May 12. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- When unit was mustered on Dec 1864 (error on card) Stovall is absent from the unit, being a prisoner of war. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On roll of Prisoners of War at Belle Plains Landing, VA having been captured near Spotsylvania Courthouse on May 12, 1864 *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Arrived at Fort Delaware from Belle Plain, VA on May 21, 1864 having been captured at Spotsylvania, VA on May 12, 1864. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- According to Ft Delaware Historical Society, AJ was assigned quarters in Division 9 which was a room of about 100 men in the enlisted prisoners' barracks out on Pea Patch Island. *Email*

*from Fort Delaware Historical Society*

- Fort Delaware records show he spent most of his stay at Ft Delaware in Division 11. *Fort Delaware Records*
- On March 5, 1865 Stovall was admitted to Fort Delaware hospital. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- On June 11, 1865 Andrew J Stovall signed an Oath of Allegiance to the United States, subscribed to at Fort Delaware, Delaware. He was released that same day.
- On June 11, 1865 Stovall gave his place of residence as Pontotoc Co, Miss. Presumption must be that his parents had moved during his time in the army. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- Stovall's complexion was light, his hair was dark, his eyes blue. He stood five feet six inches. *Stovall's Compiled Military Service Record (CMSR)*
- 1866 After returning home he read medicine, we do not know with whom. *1898 Article on Stovall*
- 1866 he married Fannie Parker, of Mississippi. *1898 Article on Stovall*
- AJ and his brother George were among a group of men who helped establish the Kaufman County Agricultural, Mechanical and Blood Stock Association which was incorporated by an act of the Texas state legislature on January 14, 1873. Presumably this is the antecedum of the county's fair but have not been able to find the exact history of the Kaufman County fair. *Special Laws of the State of Texas Passed At The Session of the Thirteenth Legislature Begun and Held At the City of Austin January 14, 1873*
- March 17, 1874 sold five acres of land in the northeast quadrant of the Cartwright Survey along the Muddy Cedar Creek now thought to be under the lake. Land was sold to his brother-in-law James Tyre Mackey, the husband of his only full sister, Martha. *Copy of recorded deed*
- The earliest federal census to list A J Stovall as a physician is 1880. This is two years before he graduated from medical school. No medical degree was required at that time to practice medicine. Some counties and states required licensing, others did not. Not sure about Kaufman Co, Texas. In 1870 census he is listed as "merchant." *Federal Census*
- In 1882 Stovall was graduated from Kentucky's University of Louisville medical department (<http://www.library.louisville.edu/kornhauser/gfdb/s.asp>) 1898 article says Univ. of Kentucky – this is an error. The records are clear. <http://www.library.louisville.edu/kornhauser/gfdb/s.asp>
- In Austin on April 26, 1887 Stovall was accused of being a "quack and empiric," a partner of his, Dr. W G Hardin, being formally charged by the Texas State Medical Association with "Unprofessional Conduct." *Transactions of the Texas State Medical Association, 19th Annual Session, Held at Austin, Texas, April 26, 27, 28 and 29, 1887*

- Professional notices for Drs. Dumas and Stovall in the February 23, 1889 Terrell Times. Were no doubt regularly run in the paper. *Copy on file*
- According to article in the Terrell Times Star on Feb 21, 1896, on Feb 16, 1896 Drs. A J Stovall and W P Dumas treated wagon accident victim Jesse LaFayette Jones. "[Jones] was immediately taken to the Terrell hotel where examination by Dr. W. P. Dumas, and Dr. A. J. Stovall disclosed his skull fractured and crushed, the clavicle broken, the left arm broken near the shoulder, the end of the broken humerus puncturing the fleshy part of the arm and penetrating the left side of the body. There were also severe bruises about the left ribs and body. . . Mr. Jones was placed under the influence of opiates and a portion of the humerus bone sawed off in order to get it back in position. He gained consciousness but suffered distressing pain until death relieved him at 7 o'clock Sunday morning." *Transcription of article on file*
- On April 6, 1896 Stovall wrote a paper on Diphtheria that he read before the Terrell Medical Association. The paper was then published in the June 1896 issue of the *Texas Courier Record of Medicine, journal of the Texas Medical Association*.
- Married Sadie, his second wife, on April 9, 1912. Her last name is unknown. When first wife, Mary Francis "Fanny" Parker died or where she is buried is unknown. Sadie was encouraged to apply for a widow's confederate pension which she did but was denied because of her young age. She was born in 1867 after the war. *AJ Stovall's Texas State Confederate Pension Application file, Mrs. A J Stovall's Texas State Confederate Pension Application file*
- On March 29, 1915 Stovall applied to the Texas Confederate Pension Board for a pension. He said in the application that he owned no house and had no other (real) property. Two of his witnesses in the application were his brother William James Stovall and Foster Axon Bonnett. AJ and William had served in the 19th infantry together and Foster Bonnett was in Ft Delaware POW camp with AJ. Application was approved. (Bonnett married Sarah McDonald, the sister of Mary Ann McDonald who married Joe Rice.) *AJ Stovall's Texas State Confederate Pension Application file*
- On May 29, 1919 A J Stovall died. Cause of death unknown. He was 76 years old. *Obituary*
- AJ and Fannie had six children: Katie, Hattie, Annie, Lawrence, Fannie and Jennie. *Obituary*
- AJ was a Mason and a member of the Christian Church. *1898 article (obit indicates preacher at funeral was pastor of large Dallas area Christian Church)*



*Footnote from AGS member Connie Perdue:*

*Andrew J. Stovall was the half-brother of my great-great-grandfather, Thomas Pinckney Stovall. The Stovalls, along with many of their relatives and friends, came to Rose Hill, Kaufman County, Texas in 1866 in a wagon train led by Thomas' son, Dr. James Richard Stovall.*

## Remembrances

My mind was flooded with memories on a recent morning walk in Austin. The primary triggers that morning were plants, flowers and vines.

My usual path is along Great Northern Blvd. in north Austin, which parallels the MoPac railroad tracks between Northland and Anderson Lane. Immediately adjacent to the tracks is a 40-foot swath of trees, underbrush, vines and seasonal flowers. While we routinely drive on Great Northern, I don't pay attention to the strip between the street and the tracks

One morning, as I turned on to Great Northern, I was suddenly aware of four- and five-foot tall Johnson grass. The spring and summer rains had stimulated its growth and it did get my attention. Our friend Janelle would share stories about her family and growing up on a blackland farm in Allen, Texas, not too far east of Dallas. Her father's obsession with Johnson grass was legendary. If he was driving to town or church and saw any Johnson grass, he'd pull off on the shoulder, get out, even in his church clothes, retrieve his hoe from the back of his pickup and dig up the devil's grass. He would say, "We've got to keep that from going to seed and getting in our fields and pastures." So, the sight of the tall Johnson grass, swaying in the light morning breeze, brought back Janelle's stories about her childhood and her father.

Particularly in the spring, but as recently as last week, I saw honeysuckle blooming. It immediately reminded me of granddaughters Lindsey and Beth. When they lived in Austin, I had the great pleasure of showing them how to get the nectar from a honeysuckle bloom: Pinch the base of the bloom, then, while holding the base, slowly pull the stamen out, which would bring with it a drop or two of the nectar of the gods. We continue to share spring time e-mail reminders that "the honeysuckle is in bloom!"

Along my route are several beautiful rose beds, unfortunately none large enough to call a rose garden but still enough to evoke some sweet memories of beautiful roses. Our former minister and dear friend Jill loves roses and has a "rose thumb." Her back yard in Austin was devoted to roses with a path among the various specimens. And in her front yard was an hourglass-shaped bed exclusively for miniature roses. With her tender care, hers was a yard to envy. On a church trip to Brenham, there was an option to tour historic homes or visit the antique rose garden nursery. Jill led the rose garden group!

Another spring pleasure is the trumpet vine that has entwined itself on the bushes and is draped from trees along Great Northern. The bright red, trumpet-shaped blooms are like outdoor Christmas ornaments. They remind me of the days when my family lived in the country. One of my chores at age nine was to walk about a half-mile every other day to get milk from a neighbor who had extra to sell. My route took me through the woods on an old cow trail. A huge trumpet root-vine clung to the side of an old oak tree while its lesser vines trailed down from the tree branches. The many, many bright red blooms were gorgeous to behold. Some were even low enough that I could break off a stem to take home to my mother and brighten our one room cabin.

One part of my walk takes me over Shoal Creek on White Rock. This evokes the opposite memory to the trumpet vine – dislike and apprehension. Growing on the bank along Shoal Creek, covering an adjacent chain link fence and up a utility pole is my nemesis, poison ivy. There was some poison ivy when we lived in the country but I never had any severe allergic reaction. However, in 1958 I had a severe encounter. I was a rookie scoutmaster and had taken the troop on a weekend campout on a ranch near the intersection of FM 2222 and RR 620. We camped in a

nice meadow. In exploring the area, we found a natural spring flowing gently into a dish-like pool.

Being a warm day, we splashed our faces with the cool water and continued on our way. There were a lot of feathery vines with three leaves on a red stem around the spring and pool. We pushed our way through and continued on our hike. That evening, some of the boys and I began to have a rash on our arms that itched to high heaven. Yes, we had waded through a very large growth of poison ivy. Several of the scouts and the scoutmaster had to go to their doctor for an allergy shot. A bad experience with bad memories.

Regularly, I note the muscadine vines as I walk Great Northern. In the spring, the vines draped from the trees are loaded with tiny BB-size clumps of grapes-to-be. As the season moves into summer, the tiny grapes have grown to small green-pea size. By mid to late July, the grapes are almost marble size, still green and quite hard. Fortunately, there are no deer or possums in this part of town to strip the vines. The good rains through the spring and early summer this year have produced a bountiful crop of deep red, marble-size muscadine grapes.

At the Spearman ranch, there were also muscadine vines and we made many jars of delicious jelly from the grapes. Allegedly, no personal experience of course, the grapes can be used to make a full bodied red wine, muscatel or known locally as muscadine wine. Naturally, I had to sample this year's grape crop. Yuk! Perhaps they had not been on the vine long enough for the sugar content to rise or the soil was not right. Nonetheless, I relived the grape harvest at the ranch.

Perhaps you've read about or been visited by the wild monk parrots which live in Austin. We've had them on the bird feeders in our back yard, walking up and down the feeder support wires like aerialists. One morning last year, as I entered an open area on Great Northern, at its intersection with White Rock, I froze. Ahead of me was a patch of sunflowers in full bloom. The surprise that caused me to stop was that at least six to eight, maybe more, monk parrots were perched on sunflower blooms eating the seeds from the flowers. I watched for several minutes and they did not fly as I crossed the street to avoid disturbing them. I looked up and there was another monk parrot perched on a utility wire. It was holding on to the utility line with one foot while in the other it was holding a large sunflower. Completely fascinated, I watched as it would repeatedly lean over and take a seed from the bloom. With its sharp beak, the parrot had cut the flower from the stalk and flown up to its lofty perch, perhaps to avoid competition or because, that while it was the look-out bird, it was enjoying its breakfast. Who knows? But what a serendipity that morning.

I've seen two new guard cats to add to my "guard cat" story and there will be more walking stories. Did I ever tell you about the boy who. . . . but you'll have to wait for that one.

# Schmedenstedt, Germany: Researching Wilhelm Möhring

## I. The Ceremony

It is amazing to think that working as an engineer for a world-wide company could result in the expansion of family ties. This is what happened on an extended business trip to Germany in 2005. I left for Erlangen, Germany, in April and was followed soon after by my wife, Christy. For several weeks we soaked ourselves in the culture, visiting castles, restaurants and museums.

On Friday, May 14, we were on our way to a little town in the Hannover region called Schmedenstedt. The only thing we knew about this town was that my great-great-grandfather's sister's headstone in a Texas cemetery listed it as her birth place. We went on with hope to find records of Wilhelm Möhring's life in Germany and enjoy visiting some very old small farm towns in the heart of Germany.

As we drove toward the town it was interesting to see how the villages in the area are all very compact. It was as if someone drew a line around the town and said "do not build on the other side." It appears that the farm land continues to be very important. The roads into the towns are lined with large full trees to break the wind from crossing across the farm land.

As we passed the little yellow sign "Schmedenstedt" I felt like I was entering an area that was welcoming. The architecture of the old buildings is not very different from other towns nearby. Schmedenstedt is a very old village, believed to have been established some time before 1166<sup>1</sup> from references found in church documents. At that time, well before Luther's Reformation, the documents were from the Roman Catholic Church.

When we saw the tall steeple of the church from a distance, we knew where we wanted to go. It only took about one block's distance towards the church to realize that something was going on in town. We noticed a large crowd consuming the entire street. Christy remained in the car, while I took off to see what was going on.

The crowd had moved to one side of the street. I walked passed the crowd and noticed a large stone memorial wall with the names of the men who had lost their lives in the two world wars. There was a Wilhelm Möhring (1906-1943) listed, and given the small size of the town, I figured that he was likely related to our ancestor.

A wreath was placed, snare drums played and then a respectful moment of silence. Within just a couple of minutes the crowd relaxed to a social gathering with much talking, heading to the outskirts of town for a three-day festival with lots of activities and good beer. I approached the closest group I found and asked about the ceremony and also explained that I had come to the town to find any records of our ancestor's history. One of the young women, Ilka Köther, answered and graciously suggested we talk to her mother about what we might find in the church records. Her mother, a teacher, would be familiar with the records of Kirche St.Georg, Schmedenstedt's historic church.

We and her friends took a short walk down the road to her mother's home. Ilka introduced me to her mother, Inge Köther. They explained Frau Köther would be able to get a key to the records room, however not until Monday, which was a holiday in Germany. After meeting back with my very patient wife, we left town to spend the next two nights in the nearby town of Peine.

## II. The Meeting

We met Ilka and her mother at the church in Schmedenstedt as the Whitmonday service let out. After reviewing the information about Wilhelm Möhring on the memorial wall, we walked to the building that serves as the church school and where the records are held. This structure was built in 1786 according to the words carved over the entrance to the building.

Frau Köther showed us the different books that they had for each set of years, and how the information was organized. She started searching for the Wilhelm Möhring born in 1906. She found him right away and began taking down information left and right. Time passed quickly and we found additional Wilhelm Möhrings. Before we finished, it seemed as though the three Möhring's from Hannover who we had previously found on a ship manifest arriving in New Orleans in October 1877<sup>2</sup>, (Wilhelm Möhring, Auguste Möhring, and Elise, the wife of Christian Wilkens) may have been cousins rather than siblings. But nothing was certain since some information was not matching up.

According to Frau Köther, there are still Möhrings living in Schmedenstedt, and they run a local Gasthof (an inn). She walked us over to the H.G. Möhring Gasthof. Along the way she explained that in the past the Möhrings have had a number of buildings forming kind of a compound. However, it appears that today there are only a few that remain. We were told that none of the Möhrings in the town speak English, so if we wanted to talk with them we would need an interpreter, but unfortunately Ilka's mother had something to get to. We left open the possibility of another visit. We thanked her for her help and stayed to take some photos, then we headed back to Erlangen.

## III. The Return

Several weeks later we were able to visit Schmedenstedt again. We tried to get a room at the Möhring Gasthof, but one was not available. Our research found that the inn's owner, Hans Günter Möhring, is the great-grandson of our Wilhelm's first cousin. The records also showed that the Wilhelm named on the memorial wall was H.G. Möhring's father.

We arrived at the church in Schmedenstedt for our meeting a little early, and a passerby asked if we needed anything. We told her that we were researching ancestors, and she immediately knew who we were. Apparently word had made its way around the small town about us. She was very nice to us, and offered to show us around the inside of the church. She took us inside Kirche St. Georg and showed us some of the historic features in the church, and told us some history of the church, not just of the building.

The church has some gothic features, including the church's original "flügelaltar" (flying altar) dating back to 1472 in the Late Middle Ages. An Antependium, a painted panel hanging on the wall to the side of the altar is from 1330-1350.<sup>3</sup> The steeple that we saw as we entered Schmedenstedt is from the original structure of about 1230.<sup>4</sup> From the balcony we had an even better view of the beautiful ceiling paintings and of the amazing architecture. The historic artistry is something to be seen.

We took some more photos and thanked our guide for showing us the church. We found Frau Köther a few minutes later.

Previous to this meeting I e-mailed questions to Ilka and her mother that we were hoping to get answered and a list of our ancestors we most wanted to find. It turned out that Frau Köther had spent hours researching our questions already. She presented us with her findings. We followed some of the information a little further and found there was an additional Wilhelm Möhring that we had not seen before. It turns out that this new Wilhelm was my grandfather's

grandfather. Once we made that connection, we were able to quickly find his father and confirm that the others that came with our Wilhelm to Texas were indeed siblings. We tried to verify that again by searching unsuccessfully for any of their death dates.

We found a tremendous amount of information, the most significant to us was about our Texas patriarch, who died in Washington County on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of February, 1917:

Heinrich Lüdwig Wilhelm Möhring was confirmed in Kirche St.Georg in Schmedenstedt on the 12<sup>th</sup> of April 1874. The confirmation record indicates that he was born in a nearby village of Bühle on the 30<sup>th</sup> of November, 1859, and was the son of Johann Heinrich Wilhelm Möhring and wife, Ilse Dorothea Elisabeth Berckhoff/Berghoff.<sup>5</sup>

With our notebooks full, and our hearts filled with gratitude for her efforts, we said goodbye to Inge Köther and walked through the town once more. As we left, we drove by the Möhring Gasthof, wishing we had a chance to talk with the Möhrings. At least that gives us a reason to try to visit Germany again.

## 1840 Settlers of Austin, Texas: Judge Brewster Helme Jayne and Juliet Tims Brown Jayne

New Orleans passenger lists reveal that B.H. Jayne departed Matagorda, Texas on the ship Henry and arrived in New Orleans, Louisiana, on 4 August 1840. Brown's Annals reports that the family came to Texas in 1840 from Mississippi and settled north of Austin. A point of confusion in researching had been the actual boundaries of Austin at various times. In 1840, maps had a large area divided into lots. Austin was laid out on 640 acres fronting on the Colorado River, bordered by Waller Creek on the east and Shoal Creek on the west. The city plan was a 14-block square bisected by Congress Avenue and extending to Capitol Square. The importance of this will become evident later.

Brewster Helme Jayne was born 19 August 1789 in Setauket, Suffolk Co., New York and was the son of William Jayne and Mary Helme. Three Jayne brothers; Brewster, Anselm and Samuel moved to Mississippi and were fairly prominent. Samuel is credited with founding Brookhaven, Mississippi and Brewster was a judge. The brothers were also store keepers and property owners.

Juliet Tims was born 6 May 1809 in Chester, South Carolina; the daughter of Amos Tims and Mary Cabeen. Her first marriage on 20 April 1826 was to William Love Brown born 1802 Abbeville District, South Carolina, son of Isaac and Nancy Calhoun Love Brown. They had one son. William died in 1828 in Greene County, Alabama. Her second marriage was to Brewster Helme Jayne on 30 September 1828 in Greene County, Alabama.

The Brewster H. Jayne household was enumerated on the 1830 census for Greene County Alabama. There was one male under 5; one male, 20-30; one male 40-50; one female 10-15 and one female 20-30.

Brewster H. Jayne was a veteran of the Vasquez Campaign, having served in the company that was detailed to guard the city of Austin in 1842. There are twelve records online under Republic Claims which provided this and other information about B.H. Jayne. It was interesting to note that the Republic of Texas had a Department of Army and Navy.

Lamar Moore granted B.H. Jayne 1280 acres, Travis District, Hays County in patent number 57, dated 22 February 1841. Nevi Chamberlain granted Juliet Jayne 640 acres, Travis District, Hays County in patent number 53, dated 22 February 1841. This raises questions about where the land actually was because Travis County was formed from Bastrop County in 1840 and Hays County from Travis in 1848. The class of patent was Travis Bty.

Known family members were Brewster, Juliet, 14-year-old son from marriage to W.L. Brown, Marcissa N. Jayne born about 1833 in Alabama, Juliet Jayne born about 1837 in Mississippi, Amos Jayne born about 1839 in Mississippi and Caroline B. Jayne born about 1842 in Texas.

Quoting from Frank Brown's "Annals of Travis County:"

*Judge Jayne — Judge Jayne immigrated with his family to Texas in 1840, and settled north of Austin. In the fall of 1842 a number of Indians made their way into the settlement and came very near the town. They were first seen on the eastern slope of the hill where the University now stands. Mr. Davis had been out riding, and had alighted to let his horse graze. He discovered Indians rapidly making towards him. He had not time to bridle his horse, but*

*jumped into the saddle and put spurs to him. He fled down the valley, crossed Waller creek, passed over the hill where the Blind Institute now stands, and made his way into town. Judge Joseph Lee, who had been about a mile north of town, saw the Indians pursuing Davis. He ran into town and gave the alarm.*

*The Indians pursued Davis only a short distance, and then turned back in a north-westerly direction. As they went they saw a Mr. Larrabee on foot, and chased him a short distance, but he gained a thicket and escaped.*

*When the Indians reached Judge Jayne's house they rode up to the fence and saluted him. They claimed to be friendly, saying they were Tonkawas. Judge Jayne walked out to the fence with his little son in his arms. Another son about fourteen years old went out with his father, and got outside of the fence and began talking with the Indian. A hired hand of Judge Jayne's also went into the yard. When Judge Jayne reached the fence, an Indian took hold of his little boy and tried to pull him out of his father's arms. The father became alarmed, pulled his child away and started into the house. As he did so an Indian raised his gun and shot him through the body. The Irishman was then shot and killed in the yard. One of the Indians snatched up the fourteen-year-old boy behind him. The whole party then fled as fast as they could.*

*Judge Jayne reached his door when he fell and expired in a short time. His wife and little boy, who was also wounded by an arrow were all that remained of the family. Judge Joseph Lee arrived at the house a few minutes after the Indians left, just as Mrs. Jayne, with her little child in one arm, was attempting to pull her husband in the door with the other. The remains of Judge Jayne were laid away near the dwelling and still repose there, not far from the west gate of the Lewis Hancock place. Formerly a heap of rocks indicated the grave, but they have been moved, and there is no mark to show the place, the ground being in cultivation.*

The ultimate fate of the 14-year-old Brown son is unknown. The little son was probably Amos Jayne and later censuses and family histories confirm that there were three Jayne daughters.

After a convoluted search for the site, evidence suggests that this would be the present day Aldridge Place. Brown's description of the raiding party's course of travel necessitated adjusting for mixed time periods and locating landmarks. The research of maps from 1850 through present led as far west as Oakmont, property owned by Lewis Hancock in 1891 near a location of the Blind Institute. He also had land further west but not to the east. A 1910 map was located which showed land owned by Lewis Hancock that was closer to town. Another researcher knew about the various locations of the Blind Institute including the south corner of M. L. King Blvd. and I-35 known as the "Little Campus of the University of Texas." The most valuable lesson from this was that the information had been there all along but over-thinking caused the obvious to be overlooked.

A patent issued by the Commissioner of the General Land Office, dated 1 September 1846, sold to Juliet Jaynes (Jayne) lots 74, 75 and 72 in Division "D." situated in the Government Tract adjoining the City of Austin. Aldridge Place is in out lot 74 Division D. The Heritage Neighborhood in out lots 72 and 75 Division D. The date of the transaction and word sold were misleading.

Juliet Jaynes sold out lots seventy two, seventy four and seventy five in division D on 28 February 1848 to A. N. Hopkins, who already owned adjoining out lot 76. Over the years the land changed hands. In 1891, it was still just outside the city limits of Austin, north of present day 29th Avenue. The State Lunatic Asylum was just to the north and Hyde Park was just to the northeast. Out lot 75, Division D, included most of what was called "Gypsy Grove." In 1912

Lewis Hancock developed the restricted neighborhood called Aldridge Place on part of out lot 74.

Juliet Jayne and her children Marcissa Jayne, Juliet Jayne, Amos Jayne and Caroline Jayne were living in Rankin Co., Mississippi in 1850. Juliet Jayne bought land in Mississippi in 1859.

In 1860, Juliett Jayne and her daughter C.P. (Caroline Paulene) Jayne were living in Rankin Co., Mississippi with her daughter M.N. (Marcissa) Williams and her family; husband W.B. Williams and son J.B. Williams. W.B. Williams was a prosperous farmer (\$13,500 and \$74,500) and was noted as being deaf and dumb. Caroline Jayne had property worth \$1,600 and \$3,200. She married Thomas Jefferson McFarland in 1864 in Mississippi.

Juliet Jayne may have gone back to Texas on business. There is a claim dated 20 January 1857 (?) with an affidavit by Robert M. Elgins and Joseph Lee that personally attests to Juliet's identity. The 20th day of January 185 are clear. This is probably the same person as Brown's Judge Joseph Lee. He was the notary on a document.

In a document dated July 1<sup>st</sup> 1858 to the Hon. Commissioners of Claims: "Dear Sir, Please find inclosed the head right certificates of Bruster H. Jaynes heirs; Enoch King, and Thomas M. Penick (?) for 640 acres each for adjudication. Also John Patton & Bazel Wheat." These named heirs have not shown up in research and nothing is known about them.

Juliett (Juliet) Jayne moved back to Texas. On the 1880 census for Groesbeck, Limestone Co., Texas, Juliett Jayne was head of a household composed of her son, Amos (surveyor), and grandson, Oscar Williams (in school) born about 1862 in Mississippi. The next household consisted of her daughter Juliett (Jayne) Camp, her husband, Grey Camp, physician, and children Belle L. Camp born about 1874 in Texas and Maggie (Margaret Adams) Camp born about 1876 in Texas. Juliet Tims Brown Jayne died 26 July 1886.

Oscar Williams was located on the 1900 census for Justice Precinct 6, Grimes County, Texas. He was a physician and the family consisted of wife Florriel (b.1870 Kentucky), Juliet (b. 1890 Texas), Oscar (b.1892 Texas), Annie (b.1895 Texas), Benford (b.1896 Texas), Mildred (b. 1899 Texas).

The family was enumerated in Justice Precinct, Limestone County, Texas in 1910. Oscar W. Williams' occupation was listed as real estate and he had his own office. Also listed were wife Florine W., Juliet, Oscar W. Jr. (clerk at railroad depot), Annie, Mildred and Gertrude (b.1906 Texas) and Jesse A. Calloway (b. 1887).

The family remained in Limestone County and was found in 1920 with O.W. again occupied as a physician in general practice. Florine and Gertrude were also listed.

Florine and Gertrude were located on the 1930 census for Corsicana, Navarro County, Texas. Gertrude was a bill clerk for the railroad. In the next household was the Carroll family consisting of Tom T. Carroll, his wife Belle (b.1898 Texas), Mildred (b.1915 Texas), Theda M. (b. 918 Texas), Florine (b.1921 Texas) and Vaden Carroll, mother (b.1861). There is no established connection but the names and birth places warranted notice.

Margaret "Maggie" Adams Camp, daughter of Gray and Juliet Jayne Camp was located on 1920 census in Justice Precinct 1, Limestone County, Texas. She was a music teacher and was married to Joseph G. Cockrum (b.1876 Texas), a public school teacher. Children were Margaret (b.1906) and Josephine (b.1980). Boarders were Elisha Webb (b.1862) and John Porter, Sr. (b. 1886).

The family was listed in Groesbeck, Limestone County, Texas in 1920. Joseph G. Cockrum was a salesman in a hardware store and Marguerite continued to teach music in her



home. Children were Marguerite, Josephine, Camp (b. 1912 Texas) and Cannie (b.1915 Texas).

Thomas Jefferson McFarland, husband of Caroline Paulene Jayne was born 1 July 1836 in Alabama. His parents were Gasaway D. and Mary Poe McFarland. Dr. McFarland was graduated by Tulane Medical School in 1862. He served as a Surgeon Major in the CSA for the duration of the war. His biography is included in "The Medicine Man in Texas." He was an outstanding person.

The family was located on the 1870 census in Galveston County, Texas. T. J. McFarland was a physician and the couple had three children: M.M. (male b. 1865 Miss.), Pauline (female b. 1868 Texas) and T.C. (male b. 1870 Texas).

Precinct 4, Lavaca County, Texas was the family's home in 1880. The children were: Minter, Pauline, T.C., V.E. (male b. 1874), Juliette (b.1876) and A.J. (female b.1878).

Thomas J., Caroline P. and Belle McFarland (b.1884 Texas) were living in Lavaca, Calhoun County, Texas on 1910 census. Dr. McFarland continued to have a private practice of medicine. Dr. McFarland died 24 February 1914.

Unverified information in an Ancestry Community Family Tree has information that M.M. or Marion Minter McFarland born 7 August 1865 in Mississippi married Irma Del McCullough (b. 19 February 1878, Ark; d. July 1965 Austin, Texas). Birth records indicate that Marion Moreland McFarland, their daughter, married Arne Bodholdt Nelson. Their daughter Natalie Nelson was born 14 December 1942 in Travis County, Texas. This links the family back to Austin one hundred years after Judge Jayne's death.

It is very likely that descendants of Judge Brewster Helme and Juliet Tims Jayne continue to live in Texas and Mississippi. Perhaps the 14-year-old son of William Love and Juliet Tims Brown survived and has descendants. It is hoped that this information will be of interest to them.

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# The Austin Genealogical Society

## General Information

**PURPOSE** Austin Genealogical Society was organized in 1960 as a not-for-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas. Its purposes are to collect and preserve genealogical and historical information about the people of Texas, particularly pertaining to the City of Austin and to Travis and surrounding counties; to instruct and assist members in genealogical research; and to publish public and private records of genealogical interest. In addition, the AGS supports the Texas State Library's Genealogical Collection and Austin Public Library's Austin History Center by donations of books and other genealogical material. Gifts and bequests to AGS are tax-deductible to the full extent permitted by law.

**MEMBERSHIP** is open to all upon payment of annual dues. Classes: Individual: \$20; Family (two in the same household): \$30; Patron of AGS: \$100; Lifetime: \$500 (\$300 if over age 65). All classes entitle one copy of each issue of the Quarterly and the monthly Newsletter, as well as two pages apiece (a total of four pages for Family or higher whether one or two people submit listings) in the Ancestor Listing issue, the June Quarterly. **After July 1, dues are \$10 for the balance of the year**, but you will receive only the publications produced after the date you join. Membership includes a copy the annual Membership Handbook, which is published each spring.

**DUES FOR EXISTING MEMBERS** are payable on or before January 1 of each year for the ensuing year. If dues are not received by February 1, the name must be dropped from the mailing list. If membership is reinstated later and Quarterlies and Newsletters have to be mailed individually, postage must be charged. (Back Quarterly issues are supplied only if available). **MEETINGS** of the general membership begin at 7:15 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday of each month except August and December. Members are encouraged to come at 6:30 p.m. when the Help Desk opens. Meeting Place: **Highland Park Baptist Church, 5206 Balcones Dr.** Take Northland (RR 2222) exit off Loop 1 (Mopac). Go west one block to Balcones Dr., then left 1½ blocks. The church and parking lot are on right. Visitors are always welcome. The Board of Directors meets at 6 p.m.

**ANCESTOR LISTING PAGES** for the June issue of the Quarterly must reach the Editor at 3310 Hancock Dr., Austin, Texas 78731, or [alanasuzy@earthlink.net](mailto:alanasuzy@earthlink.net) by May 20, preferably by electronic means, either in an e-mail or as an attachment to an e-mail. When an electronic version is not possible, typing, handwriting or printing must be black and legible. Months must be spelled or abbreviated, not in figures. Show dates in accepted genealogical style: day, month. Leave 1-inch margins at both sides and at top and bottom, and hand-number pages on the back of each page. Carefully check horizontal pages (reading in the 11-inch direction) so that one-inch margins are on top, bottom and both sides so no information is lost in stapling. No 8½ x 14 sheets, please. You may submit lineage or family group charts, ahnentafels, narratives, memoirs, letters, cemetery inscriptions, Bible records, census data, queries or a combination of material, just so it is not under copyright. Proofread your material for accuracy and clarity so we will not publish faulty or incorrect data. Consult a recent June AGS Quarterly for suggestions.

Remember, individual membership secures two facing pages, and family or higher membership allows you four pages.

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
