

In Memoriam William Koehler



William Milton Koehler passed away on April 3, 2009. He was born on July 8, 1925, to William Frank Koehler and Julia Hrncir Koehler of Moravia, Texas.

After graduating from Schulenberg High School at the age of fifteen, he worked briefly in Houston before attending Texas A&M University. His studies were interrupted by World War II, when he was drafted into the Navy and spent time in Guam as a radio/radar technician in Fleet Air Photo Group Two. Upon his discharge, he returned to Texas A&M and graduated with the class of '46 with a degree in Chemical Engineering. He joined Humble Oil and Refining Company, now Exxon-Mobil, and retired in 1985 after 38 years.

While working for Humble on the King Ranch, Bill married Ruth Hardt, a longtime friend, on October 24, 1952. They were transferred to Houston, where they raised their two sons, William Alan Koehler and James Brian Koehler. After retiring to Austin in 1985, Bill and Ruth enjoyed many years of hobbies, including travel, astronomy, and genealogy. They visited the remaining five of the fifty States and traveled to China, Bahrain, and England.

During this time, they became interested in genealogy and joined the Austin Genealogical Society. Bill was Editor of the AGS Quarterly from 1991 to 2002. In 1992, Bill and Ruth published a book entitled Henry Christian Hardt, a Genealogy: 1639-1992 on Ruth's paternal grandfather who came to the Republic of Texas with his father at the age of eighteen. The book was awarded a prize by the Texas State Genealogical Society.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents and two sisters, Gladys Hrncir and Helen Marie Schornack and husband E.W. Schornack. He is survived by his loving wife, Ruth, two sons, William A. Koehler of Batavia, Illlinois and James Brian Koehler, of Pflugerville, Texas, and one niece, Carol Schornack Moore and husband Robert Moore of Bulverde, Texas, and many nieces and nephews. Interment occurred at Austin Memorial Park on Tuesday, April 7, 2009.

In Memoriam Donna McBride

Donna Joann (Hixson) McBride died Friday, February 13, 2009, from complications of a heart attack and stroke. Born 1 August 1933 in Toulon, IL, she was the eldest of four children of Marvin Emery and Ellen (Olivier) Hixson. Donna graduated from Augustana College in Rock Island, IL, with a degree in Speech Pathology-the first member of her parent's families to attend college. On 10 June 1956 in Colona, Donna married Earle Francis McBride, one of her college classmates.

She served as the first Volunteer Coordinator in the Highland Park Elementary School and later became a coordinator and trainer of volunteers in the Community Participation program for the AISD. She spent many years as a troop leader in the Lone Star Girl Scout Council and also held other positions in scouting. She served as fundraising chairperson in various organizations over the years.

She taught herself to crochet and needlepoint, learned how to make ceramics and throw pots on a wheel, make stained-glass window hangings, and designed and constructed clothing for her family. Donna was an active party in the design of the home where she lived for 43 years. She also enjoyed playing the piano at home, singing in the Austin Civic Chorus, and bowling a decade or more with the University Women's Bowling League.

Building on a long-time interest in family history that began in the 1960s, Donna began compiling and writing her family history about 15 years ago. She wrote books totaling over 1000 pages on the Hixson, Olivier, Darling and Rood families. As a member of the Austin Genealogical Society, she served as editor of the AGS Quarterly in the early 1970's.

Prior to a stroke in 2002 that curtailed her travel, she enjoyed visiting courthouses to search for family data in dark, dusty basements. She also enjoyed accompanying Earle on travels to Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Hawaii, and Iceland to attend geologic conferences or do geologic field work. She and her daughters particularly enjoyed a 5-month stay in Perugia, Italy, in 1975, when Earle served as a visiting professor at the university there. Donna enjoyed international travel because it exposed her to many different cultures, and made her more tolerant of diverse cultures, lifestyles, and ideas.

Survivors include her daughters: Deborah Sweatman (Carl); Suzanne McBride; sisters: Janet "Jan" Dailing (Bill), Andalusia, IL; Joline "Jody" McClain (Chris), Dahinda, IL; brother, James "Jim" Hixson (Jackie), Silvis, IL; grandchildren: John, Shaun, Jennifer, and Samantha Sweatman, Cedar Creek, TX; and many nieces, nephews, and friends, all of whom loved her very much and will cherish her memory.

Family of William F. GRIFFIN and Susan Ann STOKER

William F. Griffin was the son of Jacob Griffin and Temperance (Floyd) Griffin. Jacob Griffin was born about 1782 in Nash County, North Carolina and died about 1856 in North Carolina. Temperance Floyd, who died in 1865 in North Carolina, was born around 1796 to Thomas Penuel Floyd and Mary (Beckwith) Floyd. Temperance was a sister to Dolphin Ward Floyd, Alamo defender, and John W. Floyd, who is buried in the Floyd Cemetery in Upshur County, Texas.

William F. Griffin was born in 1821 in North Carolina and died April 23, 1882 in Gregg County, Texas. Per William's obituary in the Longview Democrat,

"Mr. William Griffin, 60 years of age, died last Thursday evening. He had been in feeble health for some time. Mr. Griffin had been for 7 years residing near Longview, and was highly esteemed by the many friends he had made during that time."

William is buried in the Gilmer City Cemetery beside his daughter Janie B. Griffin Johnson and her infant.

William married Susan Ann Stoker on December 27, 1846 in Troup County, Georgia. Susan, daughter of Arnold Stoker and Rebecca Leander Jones, was born April 1828 in Georgia and died sometime after 1927 in Texas. Susan is buried in the Gladewater Cemetery in Gladewater, Texas but I have not found documentation of her exact death date as I have not yet visited the Cemetery.

William and Susan lived in Georgia for several years. After many of Susan's family had moved to Texas, their family also moved to East Texas and settled in Gregg County, about two miles south of the Gregg County Courthouse. They were listed on the 1860 U.S. Federal Census as residing in Marshall, Harrison County, Texas with their four children. William was noted as being a farmer. The youngest child, Janie, was born about 1858 in Alabama, indicating the family migrated to Texas between 1858 and 1860.

William and Susan had eight children:

- 1) John Early, born December 8, 1848 in Georgia, married November 5, 1874 in Gregg County, Texas to Radonia Alabama Lee, daughter of Nathan Lee and Sarah (or Mary A.). John died January 27, 1927 in James, Upshur County, Texas and is buried in Walnut Creek Cemetery.
- 2) James D., born December 13, 1853 in Alabama and died January 30, 1873. 3) Orra A. Griffin, born December 4, 1855 in Alabama, married Henry Levi Sewell. Orra died August 10, 1888 in Texas.
- 3) Janie B. Griffin, born about 1858 in Alabama, married April 30, 1878 in Gregg County, Texas to William Richard Johnson. Janie died on July 12, 1882 in Upshur County, Texas. William and Janie had one daughter, Nettie Belle Johnson born March 15, 1878 in Longview, Texas. She married Alex Young Magrill, son of Alexander R. Magrill and Margaret C. Rucker on October 11, 1898 in Gregg County, Texas. Alex, a railroad

- switchman, was killed instantly on December 4, 1920 in Longview, Texas, while switching railroad cars. Nettie later married Edward F. Winn. She died June 24, 1963 in Dallas, Dallas County, Texas.
- 4) Charles "Charley" T. born December 20, 1860 in Texas, married December 17, 1884 to Lou Cunyus. Charley died August 13, 1887 in Texas and is buried in the Peatown Cemetery in Gregg County. (Peatown was named because so many farmers raised peas and everyone used to say they were going to Pea Town to buy peas and the name just stuck.)
- 5) William Elisha, born September 9, 1863 in Texas and died October 11, 1881. William is buried in the Gum Springs Cemetery.
- 6) Sudie Rebecca, born March 8, 1866 in Upshur County, Texas. Per her death certificate, she died April 16, 1953 in Ellis County, Texas and was married to a Mr. Owens.
- 7) Fannie L., born 1869 in Texas. She married John L. Richardson July 7, 1888 in Gregg County, Texas. 8) Ella A., born November 1872 in Texas. She married David Alfred Phillips about 1893.

1872 Austin City Directory, R. L. Polk Company, Surnames D-H

Surnames A-C were published in the December 2008 (49:3/4) issue of this Quarterly. The introduction is repeated here for the benefit of the reader. - Ed.

A complete Directory of Austin is herewith offered to the public. Our city has grown so extensive-the population so great, such a work has become almost indispensable. The incomplete efforts to compile a Directory, made by strangers, men not identified with Austin nor her interests, have somewhat served to impede us in our Nevertheless. having undertaken the enterprise, the publishers determined to push it through to a successful issue; and we are gratified at the support that been extended to us by the thoughtful and considerate portion of the community.

... The city has been thoroughly canvassedevery home within the corporate limits has been visited, and every effort made to get the name, residence and occupation of the head of families and citizens generally. In spite, however, of all the precautions taken, a few errors and omissions, doubtless, have occurred. Through the inexplicable motive of some who refuse to give the required information, the perversity of others who intentionally or innocently mislead the canvassers, and the difficulty of spelling proper names as pronounced by some of our foreign born citizens, it cannot be wondered at if an occasional error or omission is detected.

... It was the intention of the publishers to have given a complete and full census of

Austin, ...The Directory contains fourteen hundred names, and as six inhabitants for everv single considered a low estimate, it can be assumed that the total population of Austin amounts to about 8,500.

[The 1870 population of Austin was 4,428. "City Population History, 1850-2000." Texas Almanac, 2002-2003- AGS Editor]

It must not be forgotten, however, that this estimate does not include our large colored population, for, as a general thing, it has been found impossible to number them or fix their habitations. In many instances a single room or shanty is made to contain ten or more of them, large and small; and as they do not abide in any location for any great length of time, we have generally omitted the names of all except those who have a local habitation and occupation.

... We have endeavored to impress upon our citizens the necessity of informing us of any change they might make in location after our canvassers had visited them, but have not been materially assisted in this particular; if an error, therefore, should be discovered from failure to notify us of any change we disclaim all blame in the matter.

In the miscellaneous portions of the work, the Municipal, County and State officer have been published in such form as will be found quite useful for reference.

Summer Cousin Camp: Making Ancestral Memories

Homes have a genealogy, too, and some provide a place to sink deep roots. Built by my great grandfather, this house was my first home and the site of a family Cousin Camp in the summer of 2008. I hope others will find this useful as a guide to planning similar events. The history of the house itself follows.

Nine youngsters, all third cousins, had a similar story to tell about what they did last summer, yet most of them had never met before. Their story really began in the late 1850s, when their ancestors immigrated to Columbia County, Arkansas, These great-great grandchildren of Della SMITH and Walter Howard ALLEN gathered at the 1873 W.H. Allen Homeplace in Spotsville, Arkansas in June 2008 for a "Cousin Camp" to find out what it was like to live in south Arkansas between 1850 and 1950, and to honor ancestors buried in four surrounding cemeteries.

I had wanted to gather my own nieces and nephews at the home place for some time, but it was not until the death of an aunt, who had lived in the home, that the idea for an extended family opportunity came to me. Before the house was transferred to another cousin in the family, I approached one of my two surviving aunts with an appeal, and Aunt Jean agreed wholeheartedly. My sister agreed to partner with us to plan and produce a summer camp for anyone in the family between the ages of nine and fourteen. Three cousins, parents of campers, agreed to assist onsite with first aid, transportation, kitchen help, and fishing equipment. Another cousin offered to contribute some of her electronic family tree work and began bringing that up to date.

We began planning at least one year in advance. I began organizing the family tree and stories that I'd been keeping since I was a girl, when my father had taken me on ancestry hunts in Alabama and Georgia. Using my mother's recipes as a foundation, I collected and organized recipes from the older members of the family. Most importantly, I had, since 1978, made and transcribed several oral histories of my parents with stories about our ancestors as well as life on the farm. Some of those stories would serve as the basis for a genealogy book for each camper.

In the spring, Aunt Jean, age 80, had the old well opened up so that the children could experience what it was like to draw water with a pulley and water bucket. She also had a two-

seater outhouse built, and remodeled the old well house into a chicken coop, stocking it with white leghorns. Aunt Doris, 91, the second of the surviving Allen siblings, nine of whom were born and raised in the house, took part as a storyteller.



Eight young cousins arrived from north Arkansas, California, Florida and Texas in time for a venison steak dinner with the extended family on their first day. The cousins made yeast rolls from scratch and baked their greatgreat grandmother's teacakes for dessert. Unlike the old days, when the men had always been first in line, the children ate first and took their places around a large table in the dining room.

The homeplace itself served as the heart of the experience. The Cousin Camp functioned in the era between 1850 and 1950, without TV, electronic devices, or video games. Instead, time was spent in outdoor play, oldtime games, and listening to stories about our ancestors. The young cousins slept in the old homeplace and learned about feather beds, slop jars, and plowing with mules. They listened to stories about how their ancestors had lived on the farm, and learned about chores like shelling peas, washing clothes in a washpot, making lye soap, milking cows, churning butter, hauling water from a well, and cooking on a wood stove. They got to know one another by playing games - wheels and guiders, dominoes, hopscotch, jacks, and marbles – and went fishing in the pond.

Campers ate meals prepared from old family recipes that included chicken and dumplings, chicken pie, peas and cornbread, biscuits and ribbon cane syrup, venison, cornmeal-breaded fish (caught by the campers), squirrel mulligan (killed and skinned by a 12-year-old camper), and homemade 'cranked' ice cream –the food the family ate in the good old days.

Using four nearby cemeteries as the thread for each day's activities, Cousin Campers made grave rubbings and cleaned headstones at each location, studying a different branch of the family each day by reading stories from our Ancestor Books, which were grouped by stories about our ancestors, life on the farm, stories about farm animals and chores, and children's activities.

Surprising some adults, the children were attentive, interested and asked questions during lessons throughout the week. The first of many lessons was about the homeplace and how Eliza Jane GILLESPIE and W.H. Dick ALLEN came to Arkansas and settled in Columbia County. That first afternoon the cousins walked to the nearby Nesbit home, which Dick Allen's daughters and her husband had built, with one of the elder Nesbit cousins as guide. She pointed out where a sawmill had been, near a spring that had been the site of Dick and Eliza's second home in Arkansas. and led us into the woods to uncover the flowing water at Gum Springs, the third site where Dick and Eliza had lived before they built the Homeplace as a dogtrot in 1873. There we heard the story of how Dick and Eliza slaughtered 19 hogs at Gum Springs one winter, hung them in the trees, and found them gone when they returned from church! We learned that Spotsville, formerly Nall's Mill, was settled between 1850 and 1860 by

homesteaders J.M. Hollingsworth, David Hendricks, and Eliza & Dick Allen.

Back at the homeplace, we took turns drawing water from the **well**. The children lowered a bucket more than 70 feet, and doused each other with buckets of the cold water. The next morning, after discovering that all of our chickens had been killed by neighboring dogs, the story of the hog theft took on a deeper significance.

The second day's activities began at Ebenezer Church and its cemetery, where we made rubbings of Dick's and Eliza's gravestones, followed with a picnic lunch under the shade trees behind the church, 'homecomings' and 'dinners on the grounds' are still held. The cousins then piled into the back of Aunt Jean's pickup for a ride through her farm. We fed her herd of cows, watched raking and baling in the hay fields, and picked wild blackberries as we drove through her fields, ending up at the old Booth place. In his later days, Dick Allen had raised jacks at the old Booth place for breeding mules. Two donkeys entertained us with their antics while we listened to the story of how the cousins' great-great grandfather had been kicked by a mule at that site on a cold winter day, laid there overnight, took pneumonia and died. After homemade chicken and dressing that evening, the Campers played outdoor games until dark.

On the third day, after sausage and pancakes with ribbon cane syrup and the arrival of another cousin, we learned about Granny's people, the SMITH and WILLIAMS families, the history of Bethel Church, and the history of the Wilks/Marysville community. First stop was the Marysville Cemetery where we cleaned and made rubbings of the headstone of the campers' great-great-great grandmother, Sarah Ann Eliza Jarrett Williams. Then we headed past Braswell's Corner, where the

Wilks and Braswell's store had been located, toward Mt. Holly to Bethel Church and cemetery, where the Smiths are buried. Here we found the graves of the cousins' greatgreat-great grandparents - Marc & Emma Smith, and of his grandparents - Fate and Eliza Burk Smith, and great-grandparents -Archeles and Patsy Warrick Smith, who hailed from Grainger County, Tennessee and settled in the community around 1844 when the community was still known as Wilks rather than Marysville. On our way back to the Allen homeplace we stopped at the home of Marc and Emma Smith, just west of Braswell's Corner on Highway #82. It was first built as a dogtrot, probably around the time of their marriage in 1880, and later enclosed.

That evening everyone went **fishing** on the pond until dark; the next morning everyone was up at six for more fishing, but thunder and rainfall sent us dashing back for a bowl of steel cut oats. This fourth day included a visit to Aunt Doris with stories about her siblings and parents, as well as a practice run for the next day's final service at the **Bethlehem Church**. At the cemetery we made more rubbings and cleaned multiple gravestones of the Walter and Della Allen family, all born and raised in the homeplace.

Sunday's breakfast of eggs scrambled with ham was followed by a special Sunday service at Bethlehem Baptist Church just down the road – a church their great-great-great grandfather had helped to build. Wearing pioneer clothing and Cousin Camp T-shirts, the campers took over the entire service, to which the whole family had been invited, with an adult cousin accompanying us on the piano as everyone sang old-time hymns. Various cousin campers read scriptures, said prayers, and collected the offering. Two cousins played a trumpet duet, Onward Christian Soldiers; another played Amazing Grace on her violin;

and two cousins sang a duet complete with hand motions. Since each night at the homeplace had ended with "Taps," the trumpeters ended the service in the same manner.

Everyone was invited to the homeplace afterward for a 'Sunday dinner' that included samples of chicken and dumplings, fresh vegetables, chicken and dressing, squirrel mulligan and many of the family recipes. And one set of grandparent-cousins from California celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with a big cake.

Cousin Campers each received an Ancestor Book filled with about 150 pages of family stories, genealogy charts (including a blank family group sheet for each camper to fill out), a map with the locations of the cemeteries, short histories of each community and church we visited, a family timeline, biographies of several individuals, family recipes, and photos of people and household quilts and furnishings, as well as an audio CD of stories to take home to their families. Aunt Jean prepared for each camper a shoebox of small mementos from two aunts who had passed away last year.

Cousin Camp was so popular that 11 of the 13 first cousins, grandparents of the campers. traveled to the homeplace for a gathering in October and placed orders for their own Ancestor Books. While there, we scanned every photo in the house and compiled them on a CD. Later a couple of us loaded the family tree onto geni.com, sharing many of the family photos, and watched as the family blossomed in number as the computer-literate adults added their spouses, children and inlaws. Then a request from a 12-year-old on my mother's side of the family led me to add the Kinards, and that side of the tree began blossoming as well. This inspired me to purchase my first genealogy software (I've kept handwritten records since I was a teenager). I found I was able to download a GEDCOM file from the Geni.com site that added 333 relatives to start my Reunion tree!

It is the memories made in those five June days, however, that will never be forgotten by any of the participants, young or old. Only time will tell if the "genealogy bug" has bitten anyone, but the seeds have been planted.

A History of the W. H. Allen Homeplace

A few years after their 1852 marriage in Alabama, William Henry 'Dick' ALLEN (1832-1901) and Eliza Jane GILLISPIE Allen (1834-1900), left their home in Alabama with one mule and one son, Albert, who was born in Alabama in 1856. They came by boat as far as the Alabama Landing on the Ouachita River in Louisiana. Carrying everything they had, they walked across the country looking for a place to settle.

It is believed that William Henry's older brother Albert and his wife, Harritt Shannon Allen, also made the journey from Alabama. The Allens first settled in the **Ebenezer** community, a few miles south of Stephens, Arkansas; they joined the Ebenezer Church and are buried there. The community's closest Austin Genealogical Society Quarterly, 50 (2)

neighbors were in Mt. Holly, Atlanta and Calhoun. The nearest store or market was in Camden.

In 1859 Dick Allen bought a tract of land in Columbia County from the government, and by 1863 he owned 312 acres. In 1869 he obtained title to an additional 400 acres of land at a cost of \$800. The family moved to Nall's Mill, 15 miles southeast of Magnolia, living for several years near Gum Spring, about a half-mile southwest of their future homeplace. While Allen was away during the Civil War, his wife raised the crops, carrying her wheat and corn to Braswell's Mill to have it ground. Her only means of travel was by ox cart, and it was necessary to ford nearby Hurricane Creek along the way. Plow lines for

the mules were made out of peeled bark, which she used to dye cloth for the quilts she made. She was afraid of bears in the woods.

After the war, Allen built a dogtrot style home measuring 28 by 42 feet at the present location of the homeplace in Spotsville 1, near the area known as Nall's Mill 2, an early water mill that later became a steam mill, saw mill and gin. The Allen home was built on the old Magnolia-El Dorado road in use before the modern highway was built. The family moved in on Christmas Eve of 1873. Dick Allen began farming with oxen but switched to breeding jacks and raising his own mules. One of the first successful farmers in the area, he also raised corn and hogs and made loans to neighbors. Cotton became his main cash crop. The cotton was picked by hand in late August or September using cloth sacks or woven hickory baskets. Allen had a mule-pulled gin behind his home that ginned up to two or three bales a day. The gin was shut down when neighbor Abe Hendricks put in a new steam gin. Eliza Allen used a spinning wheel to spin the cotton into thread.

The original five rooms of the homeplace were built of hand-planed lumber with square nails and 16-foot ceilings. The original sills were hand-hued from timber on the property and joined with wooden pegs. Most of the lumber was acquired in Camden and brought to the site by ox-drawn wagons. A separate log kitchen out back had a large fireplace where the cooking was done, and where the family spent their evenings in the cooler weather. An open hallway ran through the center of the main house, offering cool sleeping quarters in the hot summers, and two chimneys were constructed in rooms on each side of the hallway for winter warmth.

One room was used as a general store; it carried groceries, dry goods and hardware. A

blacksmith shop and smokehouse were also on the property.

Five children were raised in the original fiveroom house: Hezikiah Allen, Drucilla Allen (Nesbit), Martha Allen (Morgan), Jeff Allen, and Walter Allen. In 1899, Walter, the youngest, married Minnie O'Della SMITH at her parents' home near the Union-Columbia County line on what is now the Magnolia-El Dorado Highway #82. He brought her to live with his parents. who passed away soon after their marriage. Walter and Della enlarged and remodeled the old dogtrot in 1907, adapting it to the needs of a larger family. A kitchen and four more rooms were added, the dogtrot was enclosed, and a decorative porch was added across the front façade. The store was moved to a separate building.

Timber for the 1907 expansion was cut on the farm and sawn at a mill one mile from the house by Bill Cheatham and his sons, who were the carpenters for the remodeling. A Delco gasoline powered generator provided light beginning in 1923, when running water was installed. The smokehouse sat behind the house and was always full of hams, bacon and sausage; an adjacent room stored field peas.

The house appears today much the same as it did after the 1907 renovation. The wide veranda sweeps the entire width of the house, and a hipped metal roof, similar to an early metal roof, was added in more recent years. The cornice on the porch is marked by decorative spindle work, and the current green and white colors echo the original colors.

Walter Allen had a small orchard and farmed cotton, corn and field peas. Lest the family's house and field hands be forgotten, it must be noted that up to eight tenant families (the family never owned slaves) lived on the property over the years, raising ribbon cane,

sorghum, peanuts and other crops. One African American family that moved into the area around 1915 still has descendants living on the property. In his childhood 'Uncle Randle' had been a slave for the Easter family, who had a farm on the Union-Columbia County line. He and his wife, 'Aunt Mary,' lived on the Allen farm until their deaths. Mary Easter and their daughter, Effie Easter Mach, worked with Della in the Allen home and helped raise the Allen children.³

Walter and Della Allen also ran the general mercantile store on their property. Like his father, Allen also made and sold caskets until the 1940s, when undertaking establishments became common. The store's location on the old Magnolia-El Dorado Road offered a good lunch stop for the many passing travelers,

muleskinners, and wagons pulling timber or oil field equipment on the dirt road.

Twelve children were born to Walter and Della Allen in the home, nine of whom reached adulthood and two of whom still live in the vicinity: Oswell Allen, Gertrude Allen Sewell Stover, Docia Allen Brashier, Hubert Allen, Curtis Allen - whose family lived in the home between 1934 and 1950, Doris Allen Roberson of Atlanta, Geraldine Allen Talley Gunnels - who owned and lived in the home from 1950 until her death in 2007, Harold Allen, and Emma Jean Allen Gunnels Hendricks of Village. The four-generation home was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976 as a representation of early settlement in the area.

¹ Spotville is the official name, but locals refer to it as Spotsville. It was called 'Allentown' by local African Americans.

² Nall's Mill: Water propelled mills were located on Hurricane Creek just north of the bridge; parts of the levee are still visible. Village Creek, one mile west of the Allen Homeplace, also had a mill. Nall's Mill could have been on Big Cornie Creek, two miles west of Village Creek. The spring comes out of Mr. Charlie Byrd's pasture in Village, where it begins Village Creek. The creeks all run into Big Cornie, which runs into D'Arbonne in Louisiana. Walter Allen and his sons fished all three creeks. Local residents voted at Nall's Mill for a long time, even after it was called Spotsville.

³ One story 'Uncle Randle' told the children was about a coachwhip snake squeezing him when he was a small child and whipping him until he hollered for his brothers to help. Randle Easter also said that his master, Mr. Easter, once shot two Indians out of a tree because they would not work for him as his slaves.

My Uncle Leroy

Everyone should have an Uncle Leroy. Mine was a large man for his generation, a jovial person with a zest for life, and nearly always with a cigar in his mouth. Born in 1887 near Nacogdoches in Swift, Texas, which was named after his father, he married my mother's sister, Bess. They had no children. Uncle Leroy always told everyone: "Bess had no children." (As though he were uninvolved) This left my sister and I the life-long recipients of his attention. He was funny, exciting, and un-conventional according to many of my mother's standards. Sometimes disapproval made him seem all the more fun to me.

Aunt Bess was the basic breadwinner of the family. She was a telephone operator for Western Union until retirement. In the meantime, I recall, he sold filing cabinets, was a "Texas Ranger" during the Texas Centennial

in 1936, worked for a Railroad Commissioner, and during WWII worked for the IRS. However, there were apparently a lot of gaps in his employment and he spent them playing dominoes, and going to the horse races with a fellow named Col. Daniel.

When I was five, our family joined Uncle Leroy and Aunt Bess on a trip from Dallas to Corpus Christi. During part of the trip I was allowed to ride with Uncle Leroy. He drove a car at two speeds: stop and fast. It was very exciting to ride with him and one thing that intrigued me was that every time we passed a train he waved and hollered "Hi ya Newt!". The engineers always waved back. impressed that he knew every single one and I assumed that they all had the same name. At Corpus we stayed at his cousin Robert Hall's tourist court on the north beach where the cabins were built over the water. Uncle Leroy insisted that we go out in the "big boat" which turned out to be a great adventure when "Dutch" the deckhand, hooked and caught a huge tarpon. It was probably eight feet long because it was twice my height when they displayed it for pictures

Later that year at a family gathering at our house in Oak Cliff, my father and the uncles wanted to go inspect lots owned by my father which were about two blocks away. My father, having grown up on a farm in Wisconsin, still liked to grow things and had corn and other vegetables planted. The men were going to walk and I said that I wanted to ride. Uncle Leroy whipped out his keys and gave them to me and said, "OK here's the key". His Essex had the new feature of starting when you turned the key. So as the men started walking up the street, I started the car, which was in gear, and began "driving" toward them. They quickly hopped on the running boards and steered me into the curb. Embarrassed, I hid behind the sofa the rest of the afternoon. That was probably the last time Uncle Leroy invited a five year old to drive his car.

Men were hired during the Texas Centennial to be "Texas Rangers", riding horses over a certain territory to guide the public around the

grounds, keep order, and generally be an official presence. Uncle Leroy managed to become a "Texas Ranger" which made going to the Centennial much more fun for me. As a nearly nine-year old I would catch the Seventh Streetcar in Oak Cliff, deposit my three cents, and ride all the way across town to the Fair Grounds. I had a forty-punch pass to get in, three cents for car fare home, and ten cents in my pocket to spend, so, once in, I would go looking for Uncle Leroy. When I found him, he would help me up on his horse and I would ride his beat with him. When I was ready to get down, he would usually give me a dime to spend, and I would entertain myself all day at the Centennial with my twenty cents, saving back my three cents to ride the street car home. This arrangement was alright with my parents as Dallas was safe for young boys in 1936. However, my mother did get somewhat disturbed when she found that one day Uncle Leroy took me with him as he walked through the Big Apple-- a girlie show.

As a youngster I was a finicky eater, which disturbed some of our relatives at family gatherings. Uncle Leroy felt he had the solution, however. He would bribe me! If there was something I didn't want to eat, he would offer me a nickel to eat it. My parents didn't believe in bribing young souls, but didn't like making a scene at family gatherings. The bribery didn't work. However, Uncle Leroy had one trick up his sleeve that did. One time he tried to get me to bet him on something. Once we agreed on a bet he said: "Will you pay if you bet?" I naively said of course I would, so he reached out his hand and said "Pay me." That trick worked only once, although he tried it on me many more times.

He was a great tease and one way of teasing us was to confront us with the question: "Do you suppose you'll ever amount to anything?" The first few times he asked me, I didn't know

what to say. Through the years I decided to tell him I did think I would amount to something. The truth was that he was quite proud of us and as my sister and I went through high school, college, careers, marriage and kids, he would tell us he was so proud of us that he was about to "bust his buttons."

I'm sorry my ten grandchildren didn't get to know Uncle Leroy. My five kids did and enjoyed him. When my older son, Rick, brought his fiancee, Kevyn, to see Uncle Leroy, he told Rick he was glad to meet his "chum". So 32 years later Kevyn still occasionally calls her husband her "chum."

Aunt Bess died ten years before Uncle Leroy. When he died in 1980 at the age of 92 and we went to the services at the funeral home, the handful of people (including two older sisters) were visiting just like we were at a family picnic. That would have been just the way he wanted it. He loved everyone and loved to visit. And as far as I'm concerned he enriched my life and certainly did "amount to something."


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
