Rob is a graduate of the University of Texas with a degree in chemistry and Texas A&M with a graduate degree in environmental chemistry. Rob worked as a consultant at an Austin-based environmental services company during his 40-year career, working principally with the EPA, DOD, and semiconductor industry.

For users of the Google Chrome web browser only, DNA Match Labeling adds colored dot labeling to AncestryDNA matches.
